Major Surles returned with him to the United States will be his wife, the former Miss Marjorie Jean Sorenson, daughter of Mrs. B. A. Sorenson, 716 Brazier Court, Salt Lake City, Utah, and their two children Sharron Lee and Douglas D. Surles.

Major Surles arrived in Japan during April 1946, and assumed command of the 20th Combat Mapping Squadron at Yokota. This is the 31st Reconnaissance Squadron. During October 1947 he was transferred to Headquarters, Fifth Air Force where he took over duties as the photo reconnaissance officer of the Fifth Air Force, aiding and directing the Post Hostilities Mapping Project of the Japanese occupation area.

Major Surles graduated from Cisco High School in 1935 and Randolph Junior College, Cisco, Texas, in 1937. He also attended the University of Texas, at Austin, Texas, and was employed by the Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company of Cisco, Texas. He graduated from Aviation Cadet training at San Antonio, Texas, during June 1940 and was awarded his pilot's wings and commission.

During his last overseas tour Major Surles purchased a government jeep which he remade into a modernistic, post-war car. This was of his own invention, appropriately named the "Surles-mobile". Word was received by Mr. and Mrs. C. S. Surles that their son Major Donald C. Surles and his family had arrived in the States and that they would arrive in Cisco within a few days.

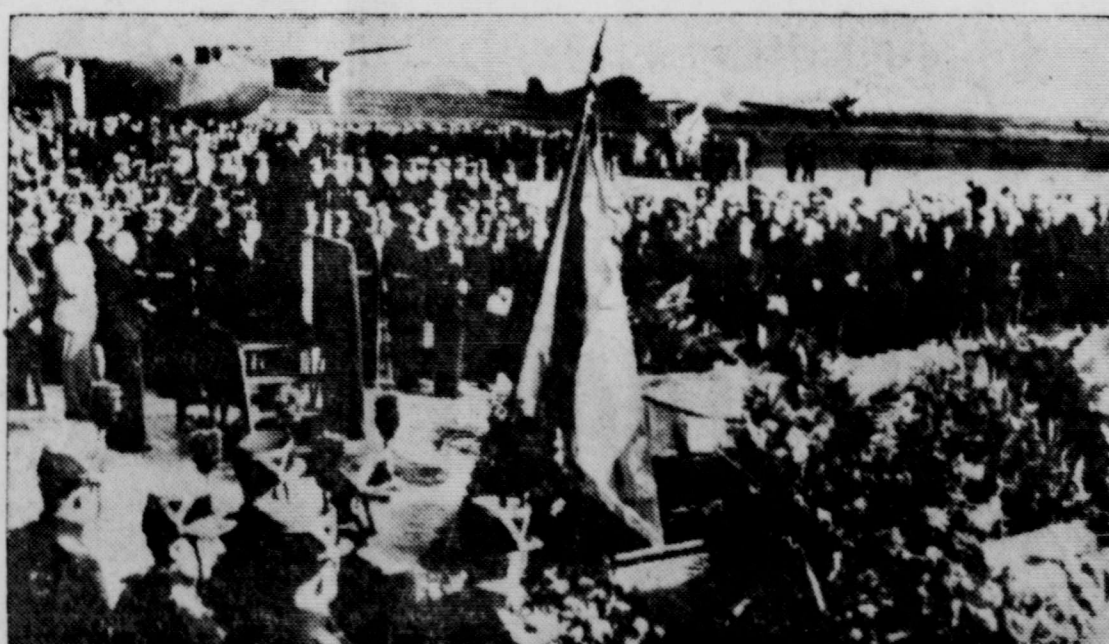
Lone Star Active In Cisco Oil Area

Lone Star Producing Company was drilling at 2,912 feet in Barnett shale today in their No. 1 Fon Mitcham, some seven miles north of Cisco. A wildcat well, considerable interest has been shown in the test.

The Lake-sand was cored and a drill stem test was run from the section at 2,550 to 3,583 feet. Recovery was 3,000 feet of water in the casing during a 30 minute test.

Lone Star had staked location today to drill their No. C-7 Mitcham eight miles north of Cisco, drilling to begin as soon as rig is available. It is in the firm's Lake field.

Something New In Politics ! ! Do Politics Confuse You? Pixiecrats Offer Solution To Plexing Problem

AUSTIN, Texas, Sept. 22—Citizens! Do politics confuse you? Do you find yourself disagreeing with Dewey, Truman, Wallace, and Thurmond?

Do you wonder how our country survives if just half the things politicians say about each other are true?

If you can answer "yes" to any of the above questions, you ought to be a Pixiecrat. The Pixiecrats (no kin to the Dixiecrats, son, except they're all 'crats under the skin) are organizing a national convention.

It will be held at Austin, Oct. 12, just a few hundred years to the day after Columbus discovered America.

The Pixies think this would be a good time for Columbus to undiscover us. They are willing to return the country to him, slightly used up, at least until after the political campaigns are over.

The Pixiecrat convention, unlike most political conventions, will let the candidates listen. The program will be devoted to letting politicians see and hear what newspaper men really think about them. A series of acts will tear down the guys who spend their time trying to present a good good front in the newspapers.

There will be nothing personal about Pixiecrat criticism, of course. The Pixies ain't mad at nobody. Anybody can be their candidate. Every Pixiecrat is a member of the party's national committee. That's how democratic (damn that word!) the Pixiecrats are.

Who are the Pixies? Several weeks ago, capitol correspondents at Austin spent a hot-ternoon planning a political party that would be strictly for fun. They had the charter done up neatly with gold ribbon. Everybody wanted to get in on the ground floor, from Gov. Beauford H. Jester to the capitol stenographers.

Pixiecrats suddenly became a national movement, with spontaneous publicity in national magazines, radio programs, and newspapers across the country. This seemed to be the comic relief the Perplexed Public is looking for in this election year.

Wick Fowler, Dallas News writer at Austin, invented the name and idea of Pixiecrats. Thousands of fellow Americans, completely confused, have joined him.

Maybe there's no point to it. But neither is there a point to the yo-yo, except to soothe one's jangled nerves. The Pixies believe that whether or not you win at politics you can relax and enjoy it.

Keep The Surplus

Over in East Texas the regional Chamber of Commerce, remembering what the last state Legislature did in the way of new appropriations, has gone on record as favoring a "hold the line" when the solons meet again next January. And their ideas appear pretty sound.

Leaders of the organization issued the following statement: "Texas has not increased its tax rates for the past six years, but the income of the state from taxes has during that time more than doubled. By virtue of increased tax income, the state has paid all its debts and has now accumulated a large surplus, which will amount to about 100 million dollars when the next Legislature meets in January. Demands for expenditures aggregating several times that amount will be urged upon that Legislature.

Since with the continuation of the tax rules, a substantial reduction in the income of the state would result from a decrease in the present level of prices, it is urgently important that the Legislature not appropriate in the exception of continuing income such as is now being received. Such appropriations in Louisiana are resulting now in destructive increases in taxes. Accordingly, we of the Texas Association of Commerce urge five policies upon the people of Texas and upon the next Legislature.

1. No increase in current tax rates.
2. No new sources of revenue.
3. No new types of expenditures.
4. No increase in recurring expenditures except to meet emergencies as to existing services.
5. Use of present surplus only for nonrecurring and necessary capital expenditures."

The East Texas Chamber with the other two regional chambers, has adopted these policies and is urging support of local chambers and civic groups in all parts of Texas.
