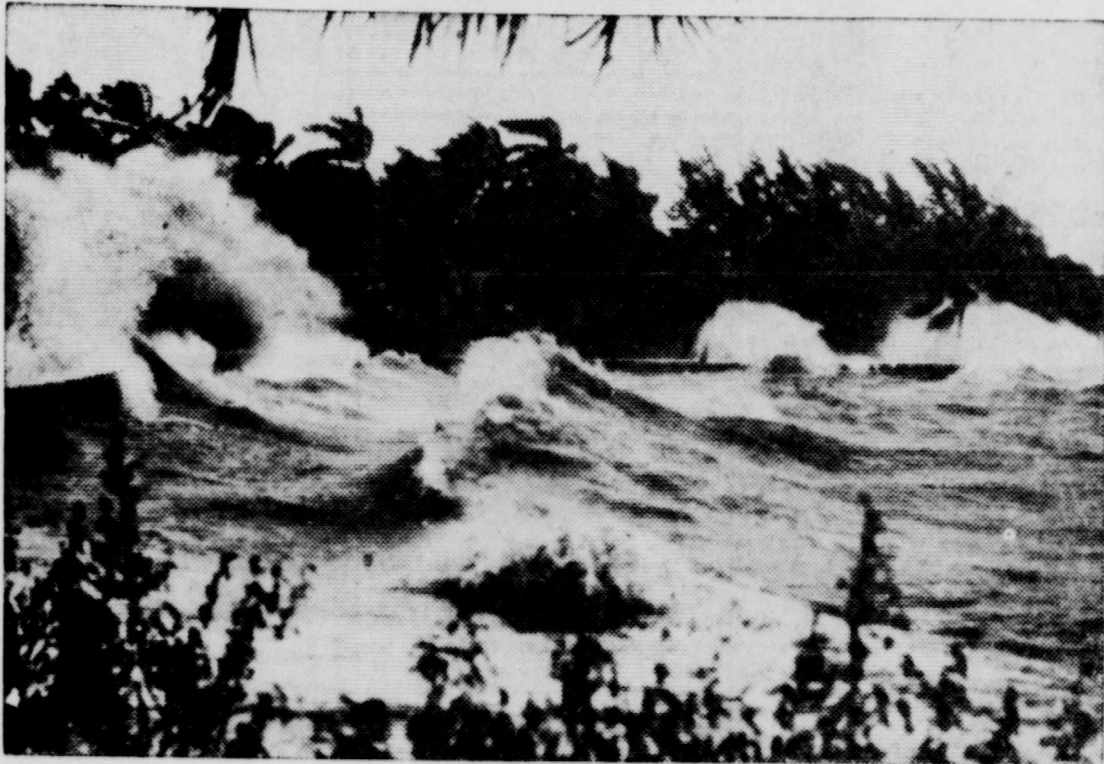

Dallas Man To Head Polio Body In NE Texas

New York, Sept. 22—A. D. Faries Jr., of Dallas, has been appointed to represent the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis in northern Texas. Foundation president Basil O'Connor announced today.

As a National Foundation representative, Mr. Faries will supervise and coordinate activities of the organization's chapters which provide March of Dimes-financed services to polio patients in 55 northeastern Texas counties.

Mr. Faries, born and educated in Dallas, studied business administration at Metropolitan College.

Weather Favorable For Fall Harvest In Most Sections

Open weather in most areas of the state again favored harvesting operations but continued detrimental to growing crops. Southern, south central and southeastern areas and eastern counties of the Edwards Plateau were adequately supplied with surface moisture but remaining areas continued dry. Harvesting operations were delayed in southwest Texas by wet fields but as a whole harvest of remaining matured crops made good progress. Some wheat and other small grains were dusted in during the week in the northwest but soils in most small grain areas were dry and many growers were waiting for another rain.

Progress of cotton harvest was regarded in upper coastal counties by wet fields following heavy general rains, and there was some delay caused by morning dews and scattered showers in north central counties. In most areas, picking and pulling proceeded at a rapid rate under favorable weather conditions. Cotton was maturing rapidly and harvest was getting underway over the High Plains area where pulling was expected to be in full swing within a few days. In the southern High Plains counties, deterioration had been checked to some extent by scattered showers and cooler weather but conditions of non-irrigated crops remained generally poor. Prospects continue usually good in the northern High Plains. Harvest was past the peak in central and east Texas where good yields were being realized. Damage from insects has been heavy in north central counties.

The sorghum crop in the important High Plains area was deteriorating and yields were light as harvesting was getting underway. Late feed crops prospects were improved in southern counties by recent rainfall, but were in need of moisture in remaining areas. Harvesting of corn was active in north central and eastern counties, but was delayed by wet fields and showers in southeast counties. Harvest of early peanuts was underway in northern areas. While yields were mostly light, many crops were turning out better than had been expected.

Problems and procedure in tuberculosis control will be the subject of the 38th annual meeting of the Texas Tuberculosis Association meeting to be held in San Angelo September 24-25. The St. Angelus Hotel will be the headquarters for the two day meeting which will be attended by physicians, public health workers and lay leaders from every section of the state.

The commissioned ranks have been opened to all qualified National Guardsmen through extension courses known as the "10-series" in an effort to obtain badly-needed junior officers for the expanding National Guard. Previously enlisted men could earn commissions only by attending the regular nine-month Army officer candidate courses, unless they were eligible for direct commissions through wartime service as first three graders.
