#### YOUR NATIONAL GUARD DIVISIONS CONTINUE THE OLD TRADITIONS

This is the twelifth of a series on the lufantry and Armored Divisions of the new National Guard. They are presented to acquaint you with the organization which will be an M-Day Force, trained, equipped and available for immediate service.

37th INFANTRY DIVISION-"Oblo's Own" in two World Wars, the 37th Infantry Division of the National Guard carries on today is the old tradition. Nicknamed the Buckave Division" in honor of the state that n August of 1917 for service in World War its four infantry regiments—the 145th. 48th 147th and 148th-entered the line in he Boccarat Sector, southeast of Metz, in

Mouse-Argonne offensive, battled stub-bornly on the St. Mihiel front, pushed shead searly nine miles in the Ygres-Lys drive, and still were

pursuing the Germans when the Armistice came.
Inducted for Paderal service on October 15, 1940, under the command of Major General Robert S. Beightler, the 37th went through the maneuvers of 1941 before World War II began. It sailed for the Southwest Pacific in May of 1942. After fortifying the slands, the Buckeyes moved into newly-won Guadalcanal in April of 1943. Despite hard and frequent serial attacks, they con-

finued training there for the coming battles.

Two of the 37th's infantry battalions, attached to a Marine Raider Battalion landed in the Bairoka Harbor Sector of New Georgia Island, July 3. Then the entire 37th was committed in the drive that took Munda airtield August 3. In late 1943 and 1944 the 37th was on Bougainville, protecting

American airstrips and engaging in patrol action. Then the Jap Sixth Division attempted to push the Americans to the sea. In two weeks this drive was proken, and the 37th counted some 8,000 of the Emperor's troops dead before its guns. Moving to the Philippines, the Chicans in January of 1945 raced

inland from their assault beachhead in Lingayen Guil. Jap resistance lightened as they seared Clark Field and FL Statemberg. but main strips were taken in three days of savage fighting. On February 4, columns of the 148th Infantry Regiment entered Manila. reached the Pasig River next day and seized Billbid Prison to liberate some 2,000 American intersees. From Manila the Buckeyes went to the hills of northern Luyon

crashing Jap positions around Bagnio, at Baleta Pass and in the Cagavan Valley. They were still allminating isolated Jap Defendere when nostilities ended in August. Unit citations went to part or all of three World War II regiments—the 129th, 145th and 149th, and to the 172th Engineer Combat Battalion. Now reorganized in the new National Guard, the postwar division

includes two regiments which lought with it in both wars the 145th and 148th pluf the 147th, which was with the 37th Division n World War I but served as a separate unit on the islands of longer in New Calendonia and on Guadalcanal in World War II.
