Oil Strike in Nimrod Community Appears Certain

Rathke Well Flows From Ellenburger To Open New Sector For Cisco Area

A major oil strike for the Nimrod Community, ten miles southwest of Cisco, appeared a reality today with reports that the Rathke Oil Company's No. 1 Carl Stroebie, a rank wildcat, was flowing oil from the Ellenburger formation. Completion work had been in progress at the well for several days.

Oil men at the Location today estimated that the well would be good for between 150 and 200 barrels of oil per day with no water. The well was flowing intermittently through a 5-inch casing.

The Ellenburger was topped at 3,907 feet where an oil and gas days ago. After pipe was cemented, it was drilled to 3,912 feet and treated with acid with no result. Drilled to 3,923 feet, the well began flowing by heads without treatment.

The Rathke Company, a Wichita Falls concern, said they would run tubing and complete the well at its present depth. The hole was sunk with cable tools. The firm has some 1,000 acres in the drilling block.

The Thos. D. Doswell No. 1 Mitcham, drilling ten miles south of Cisco, was reported today to be fishing for a piece of drill stem that had been twisted off. The hole is some 3,500 feet deep and is to be an Ellenburger test. Oil shows already have been logged in the Caddo and Marble Falls formations.

In Cisco's Kleiner pool, Lone Star Producing Company's No. A-5 Kincaid was coring in Mississippi lime below 3,900 feet today. Completion of the well would be a substantial extension to the proven territory of the pool.

Nearby, Hedrick and Howell's No. 1 Lockridge was drilling at 3,200 feet. This is the field's northern outpost.

President Proctor of the Rotary Club and President Westfall of the Lions Club urged all members to attend the joint meeting, and invited local citizens to attend and hear the talk.

Approximately 75 graduating seniors of Cisco High School were handed their "Class of '49" rings in assembly Tuesday morning, Principal C. J. Turner reported today.

The rings, of white and pink gold, with the Lobo crest engraved on both sides and a crystal C, were bought by the individual senior through arrangements of the school. A special student committee was appointed to select the rings.

Mrs. E. L. Hazelwood, Marie Winston and Buck Overall, class sponsors, assisted in distributing the rings. Speaking to the seniors, Principal Turner emphasized the significance of wearing a class ring. "It somewhat resembles a diploma, showing the outside world your achievement in the continuing of your education and life's fulfillments," he said.

Hardin-Simmons To Begin Classes In Eastland Soon

County School Superintendent Carl Elliott announced today that plans for the opening of extension classes in Eastland County by Hardin-Simmons University had been completed, and that the classes would be held in the Eastland High School building each Tuesday beginning at 6 p. m.

The courses are to be in English and Education, and the work can be fully accredited on a Bachelors or Masters degree. Mr. Elliott invited all area teachers to attend the classes.

Instructions on Mailing Overseas Packages Issued

Washington, D. C., October 12—Christmas packages for Army and Air Force personnel and Department of the Army and Air Force civilian employees stationed overseas should be mailed between October 15 and November 15, Major General Edward F. Witsell The Adjutant General, who operated the Army's system, has announced.

If the suggested mailing period is used, there is more definite assurance that Christmas packages will arrive just before or during the holiday season.

Gifts should be packaged securely, General Witsell advised, in box materials of metal, wood, or very strong fiberboards. He also recommended that the addressee's name, together with a list of the contents be written on a slip of paper inside the box. This will enable delivery to be made if the outside address should be obliterated in handling.

The address should be placed directly on the box or wrapping and not on gummed labels, which may become moist and lost from the package.

The weight limit is 70 pounds and maximum measurement: 100 inches length and girth combined. This is approximately the size of a foot-locker.

Greeting cards sent first class (three cents) also should be mailed within the suggested period. Air mail deliveries are expected to be handled on normal schedules and greeting cards sent by air may be posted as late as December 1.

Army Recruiting Officer to be in Cisco

A representative of the US Army and US Air Force Recruiting Station in Eastland will be in Cisco at the Post Office each Wednesday from 9:30 until 4 p. m. it was announced today by S/Sgt. James Hendrick, NCO in charge.

The Recruiting Sergeant will be prepared to discuss in detail all phases of the current Voluntary Enlistment Program and the Selective Service Act of 1948.

Applications are being accepted now from qualified men who desire enlistment in the US Army and Army of the United States for periods of one year through six years, depending on age and prior service. Qualified men may enlist for service in the European Command, Far East Command and the Alaskan Department if they enlist for at least three years. Certain individuals with prior service may enlist for service in the 4th Army Area and at units in other parts of the United States.

A limited number of applications may be taken for those desiring enlistment in the US Air Force. Minimum enlistment period is three years except in the case of a few 18-year-olds who may enlist for one year.

The WAC and WAF enlistment program has been re-opened to women 18-34 years of age who can meet the necessary requirements.

Officer Candidate Schools are expanding their ranks and have lowered age requirements from 20½ to 19. A high school education is necessary for Army OCS and two years of college or the equivalent is required for Air Force OCS.

GUARDSMEN TO RECEIVE EQUIPMENT

Preliminary issuing of field and personnel equipment to the 32 officers and guardsmen of the 961st Field Artillery, Cisco National Guard unit, will be main business in the command's regular meeting tonight at the Cisco Junior College Armory.

Navy Announces Competitive Exams For Officers' Training Program

The Navy announced recently that the second nationwide competitive examination for its Officer College Training Program has been scheduled for December 11, 1948, and will be open to high school seniors or graduates within the age requirements. Successful candidates will be given a four-year college education at government expense and will be commissioned as officers in the Regular Navy or Marine Corps upon graduation. Application forms must be forwarded to the Naval Examining Section, Princeton, N. J., in time for receipt by November 15, 1948.

Students selected through the medium of this competitive examination and who meet other qualifications required by the Navy will be offered entrance into the Naval Reserve Officers' Training Corps (NROTC) Units in 52 colleges and universities throughout the country. Those entering the program will attend the college or university of their choice in so far as practical where they will receive from the government the cost of their tuition, books, and normal fees and \$50.00 a month for a four-year period of education. Upon graduation, they will be commissioned in the Regular Navy or Marine Corps and will be required to serve a minimum of two years on active duty after which they may apply for retention in the regular services or transfer to the Reserve and return to civilian life.

High school seniors who are interested in the Navy College Training Program may contact the Deans or Registrars who are acting as the Navy's civilian representatives for the program. The Principals and Deans will be pleased to provide specific information about this program including the places of competitive examination, information bulletins, application forms, and necessary age and scholastic qualifications.

Naval ROTC Units are established in Texas at The Rice Institute in Houston, and at the University of Texas in Austin. The Professor of Naval Science at those institutions or the Office of Naval Officer Procurement, Dallas, Texas will be pleased to give any information desired by parents or interested students concerning the program.

U. S. Highway 80 Traffic Increases

U. S. Highway 80, the nation's shortest transcontinental trafficway, is booming with increased travel, according to the California Department of Agriculture.

From Savannah, Ga. to San Diego, Calif., more and more motor vehicles are traveling the improved 2600 mile coast to coast highway.

Because it is the southernmost coast to coast route, Highway 80 is the popular winter travelway, particularly when more northerly routes are apt to be more difficult.

In recent statistics released by the California Dept. of Agriculture, showing traffic entering California, it is noted that the number of out-of-state cars entering Yuma on highway 80 during hot July was 20% greater than July of 1947. The number entering at other California ports of entry decreased approximately 9%. From January to June traffic entering California on "80" increased 16%, while other ports showed decreases of 23% to 28.7%.

The growth of travel over U. S. 80 is said to be due to improved road conditions and to local promotion by travel minded communities located on the highway. The National U. S. Highway 80 Association plans a full scale national program to increase travel on the all-weather cross-country expressway.

OIL PROGRESS DAY

On the 14th of October, "Oil Progress Day" will be observed throughout the country. It will mark a simultaneous activity by the oil companies of the nation, large and small, to further inform the public about the industry's achievements. Local oil men will carry the brunt of the work. Authoritative speakers will be available, many plants will be open for public inspection, in some places essay contests will be held for school children, and so on.

It is to be hoped that the day attains its objective. For, of all the great industries of America, none has a finer record of essential service than oil. It lay at the very heart of the Allied war effort, and our enormous superiority in the quantity and quality of oils available was a major factor in speeding the victory.

After the war, the industry naturally expected that there would be a breathing spell—a period of substantially lowered demand. But the opposite happened. Demand not only held up, but has actually exceeded the vast level of war-time. The industry responded to this by putting into effect an expansion program, affecting every phase of production, refining and distribution, which prevented serious shortages and brought us our oil with a minimum of delays and dislocations.

In addition, American oil companies are the leaders in developing, under international agreements, foreign oil resources. The most dramatic example of this is the Middle East, where the greatest untapped reserves in the world are located.

Oil Progress Day will symbolize an achievement which has a tremendous bearing on American industrial power—and on the strength of the entire Western World.
