### The Gay **Crippled Children** Philosopher **Aided By State Health Department**

AUSTIN, Oct. 14. In an effort to familiarize every person in Texas with the services offered by the Crippled Children's Division of the State Health Department, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health officer has released the following statement:

Every crippled child in Texas under 21 years of age, and of normal mentality whose parents are unable to pay for needed care, is entitled to assistance from this Division

Crippling conditions which may be treated are infantile paralysis, osteomyelitis, club feet, harelip and cleft palate, burns urvature of the spine, arthritis, ow legs, rickets, tuberculosis of the bone, flat feet, congenitally dislocated hip, muscular dystro

The uniforms are the latest arm, style. They are 100 per cent wool and are tailored to fit. The per sonnel equipment includes all that will be necessary for field trips and for drills.

Capt. Odom has received that the remainder of the equip ment has been shipped and should arrive in Cisco soon.
