These people propose changing the calendar as of Dec. 31, 1950. Under this plan the years are all the same. No leap years. Each quarter begins on Sunday and ends on Saturday-contains three months, 13 weeks or 91 days Month-dates always fall on the same weekdays, for example the first is always on Sunday and Christmas is always on Monday.

The calendar provides two world holidays each year-June 31 and December 31. Each year has 365 days plus the two holidays. The proposed calendar is balanced in structure, perpetual in form and harmonious in arrangement.


