Eastland County Drys Organize to Defeat Legalizing Sale of Beer

The organization of the Eastland County United Drys and the election of officers was the main business brought before a meeting of Eastland County citizens interested in carrying on a campaign to defeat the proposed legalizing of the sale of four per cent beer at the coming November 2 election. The first meeting was held Wednesday evening at the First Baptist Church in Eastland.

The building was filled to capacity with people from Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, Carbon, Rising Star, Olden and other communities in the county. Some of the towns not represented sent communications to the meeting pledging their support to the campaign. The United Drys plan to raise a minimum of \$1,500 to carry on the campaign and approximately \$500 was raised at the meeting in cash and pledges.

Rev. Loyd M. Chapman, minister of the First Baptist Church in Eastland presided over the meeting until the permanent organization was established. Joe Tom Poe of Cisco, ministerial student of Baylor University, was in charge of the song service and led the singing.

Officers elected to direct the campaign were: J. L. Ciern of Ranger, chairman; R. L. Ellis of Ranger, vice chairman; Alfa Elder of Eastland, secretary-treasurer; Cecil Stowe of Cisco, chairman of transportation; W. E. Hallenbeck of Eastland, chairman of prayers.

Dr. T. R. Havin of Howard Payne College, Brownwood, former member of the Texas State Prison Board, was the principal speaker. His talk covered many of his experiences, especially those connected with his service on the prison board. He pointed out that of the approximately 6,000 persons now imprisoned in the Texas penitentiary system, 90 out of each hundred were there because of the influence of alcoholic beverages in some form or another.

Judges Retirement Plan to Be Voted On November 2

AUSTIN, Oct. 22.—Adoption of a retirement amendment for Texas judges on Nov. 2 will "go a long way toward answering many of the complaints about the slowness of the Texas court system."

That was predicted today by William N. Bonser, Houston attorney, who was in Austin coordinating efforts for the passage of Amendment No. 8, the judges' retirement proposal.

"One of the often-overlooked reasons for slowness and delays in Texas courts is the fact that in Texas we force many of our judges to work when they are ill or disabled and unable to carry on their duties," he said.

"Adoption of the retirement amendment, which is last on the ballot, would clear the way for a pensioning aged or infirm jurists to step down from the bench."

"This amendment would, also," he pointed out, "save the taxpayers the high cost of delays and slowness caused by inability of some jurists to discharge their duties as rapidly as necessary."

Bonser said, also, that the amendment "is one of the most practical and most needed changes in our judiciary system offered to us in a long time. I wholeheartedly urge every voter to consider it and vote for it on November 2."

There are 31 states that now have judges' retirement plans similar to the one suggested for Texas.

Technical Writers Needed by Army

The drought is broken, as far as Coach Jack Everett's boys are concerned!

Cisco Junior College's embattled Wranglers roared back for three touchdowns in the last quarter Thursday night at Chesley Field and rode Doug Garner's sure shot strategy and jackrabbit running to a spintangling 26-7 triumph over a heavy Decatur Baptist College eleven.

The desperate Wranglers, unable to get going in the first two quarters, gathered together bottled fire power for one of the grandest comebacks the Western Junior College Conference ever recorded. Garner, absent from his workhorse tasks since the Hardin-Simmons clash, unlimbered his once shackled legs and turned in a performance in the second half that surpassed the running and passing exhibitions of the entire Decatur team combined.

George Owens, regular line mainstay, started catching passes from all angles. Jack Gauntt, 143 pound wing back, blossomed into a terrific broken field artist. Hefty Jack McGuire, running partner to Garner, started pulverizing the Indian's forward line with bulling plunges. There just wasn't anything the visitors could throw up against the Wranglers as they rolled 63 pulse-thumping yards in 11 plays for the touchdown that snapped Decatur's backbone.

The Wranglers scored again as the result of a pass interception by Center Gene Milsap, but the mighty comeback surge within 7 minutes of play was the real payoff. It not only bolstered the Wranglers stricken prestige but gave notice to the some 2500 fans, who marveled at the sudden grit and rugged playing, that they were back up to par.

After the second half kickoff, with CJC bringing up the rear in score, three of the Wranglers' 6-pointers were jammed in the last quarter of play, scoring the second after a mighty 46 yard punt by Gerald Jones that was returned to the Wranglers' 47 before being halted. Here Gauntt, tearing loose, dashed around left end for 12 yards, McGuire picked up 17 on a spinner play and Garner butted center to cross over from the eight. A try for conversion was nullified.

The Indians' solo score came early in the game, 4 minutes after the Wranglers climaxed a long downhill thrust to the goal. A blocked punt and a pass interference penalty set up the drive and the ball was resting on the three. From the three Bill Boyd, who gathered 24 yards in all, crashed off tackle and crossed

following a pile up in the end zone. An accurately handled place kick bounced the Indians from behind into a 1-point lead before the half ended.

The final touchdown thrust came after a sustained drive from the 48.

McGuire, guided with beautiful interference, blazed the sidelines with a 25-yard jaunt. Two plays following, Garner, lugging the ball, sped around right end to tally the winning touchdown in an upright position. Mosley converted the kick.

Don Price, at right tackle; Melvin Nobles at left tackle; Raymond Penn at left guard; Wesley Rutherford at end and J. M. Moore, all a leading factor in the smothering defeat over the Indians, turned in sparkling performances for the evening, while Jack Leveridge, Homer Tompkins and James Gann assisted the breaking-away twins with the ball handling chores in the backfield.

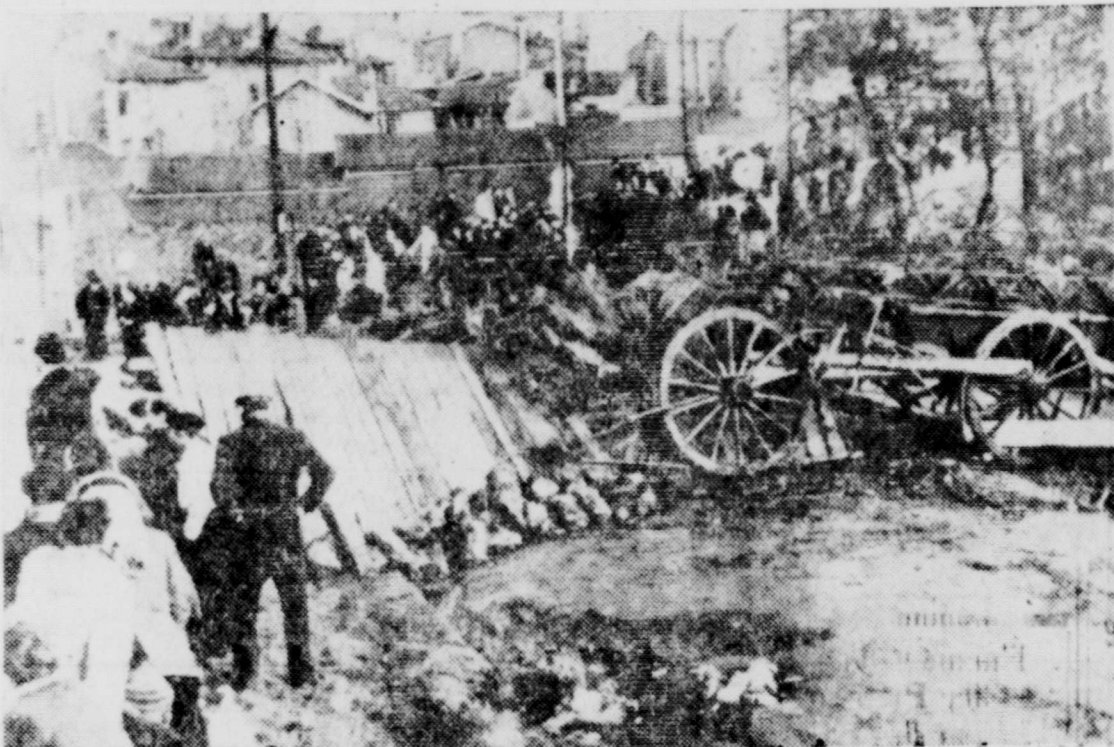

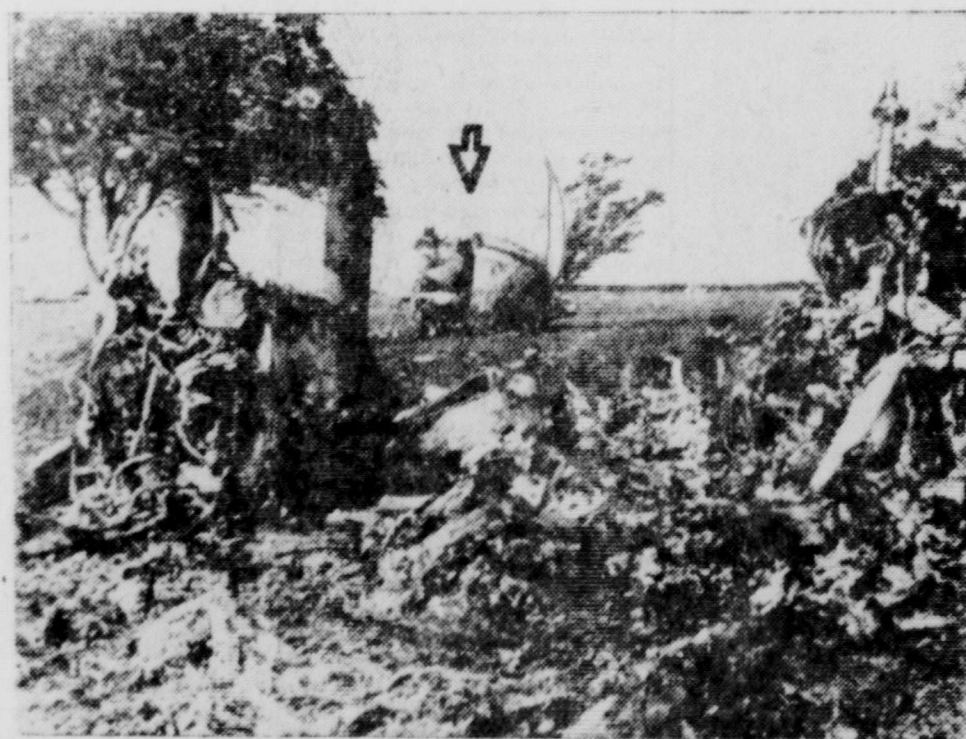

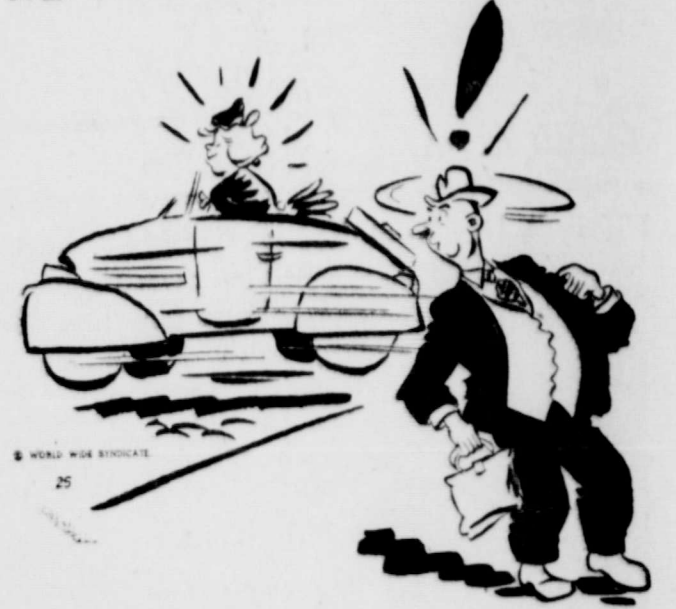
DUTCH AIRLINER CRASHES
