Second National Guard School To Be Held At Eagle Mountain Lake

Eagle Mountain Lake, Oct. 29. The Command and General Staff College has initiated its second special course in Texas this week at the National Guard Base on the shores of Eagle Mountain Lake. Colonel James V. Ware, Instructor in Charge, announced today.

The Eagle Mountain Lake course is the second to be held in the State of Texas, the first having been conducted at Fort Saco, Houston, from Oct. 4 through 16. Two more special courses are scheduled in the Fourth Army area by this group of instructors; at Fort Sill, Oklahoma from November 14 through 27, and at Camp LeRoy Johnson, New Orleans, from the 6th through the 18th of December.

The purpose of the course is to provide instruction in the light of World War II latest and modern developments and to prepare student officers for duty as division commanders and general staff positions.

The scope of the course includes instruction in the latest type of combat division, tactical employment, and command and staff functions in employing these divisions. The course also includes discussion on air support of the combat divisions, amphibious and air-borne operations.

Officers who are attending the course have been carefully screened and selected before being permitted to attend. They must have had a minimum of seven years commissioned service, be graduates of an advanced military school, not have attained their fifty-first birthday, and be physically qualified for general service.

CAA Asked To Change Some Of Requirements

COLLEGE STATION, Oct. 28. A recommendation that the present Civil Aeronautics Board free control spin recovery requirement for personal aircraft be changed, was voiced by a majority of representatives at a meeting of aircraft manufacturers and others at Texas A&M College.

Purpose of the meeting was to discuss the present changes in thinking on the problem of airplane spinning and to recommend research to the personal aircraft research center, Fred E. Weick, A&M, is director of the center and was chairman of the meeting.

Weick pointed out that most of the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics spin research has been carried out for military which is permitted to recover from spins with full opposite controls. "For this reason there is little data on free control recovery available to the personal aircraft field," Weick said.

The manufacturers representatives recommended that the Personal Aircraft Research Center give top priority to work on control at the stall. Other projects recommended as important are free-control spin recovery, design of spin-proof aircraft, development of a "straight flight" arrangement, survey of design requirements for spin-proof airplanes and means to achieve major increases in the speed range of personal aircraft. The latter project is already receiving some attention, since the center has a NACA contract for research on optimum high lift device arrangements for personal airplanes.

Attending the meeting were manufacturers of six personal aircraft manufacturers including M. J. Gordon of Beech, J. H. Gertels of Cessna, H. A. Sutton of Ryan, H. G. Erickson of Luscombe, D. C. McGary of Texas Engineering and Manufacturing Company, H. F. Kueck of Aerocor, R. Sanders of Ecoupe, J. E. Boudwin and C. W. von Rosenberg of the Civil Aeronautics Administration; J. M. Chamberlain of the Civil Aeronautics Board; A. I. Neihouse of the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics; E. E. Brush of the Aeronautical Engineering Department and Fred E. Weick, director of the Personal Aircraft Research Center, Texas A&M College.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 29.—The Air Medal has been awarded to Curtis C. Gamblin, 2113 C. Ave., Brownwood, Texas, Eighth Naval District headquarters announced here today.

Formerly an aviation machinist mate second class in the Naval Reserve, Gamblin was commended for "meritorious achievement" in aerial operations over the Japanese-held Marshals, Marianas and Bonin Islands from Aug. 1944 to July 1945.

A graduate of Cisco high school, Gamblin is a trucking contractor in Brownwood, where he lives with his wife and daughter.

Reformation Day To be Observed By Lutheran Churches

Both the Grace Lutheran Church, 18th and D Ave, and Christ Lutheran Church, six miles south of Cisco, will observe Reformation Day in their regular services Sunday, it was announced by Rev. G. T. Naumann, local pastor.

On this day, Lutherans, as well as other protestants, will commemorate the beginning of a reformation movement which led the way for the emancipation of the Christian Church, the announcement said.

In his announcement Rev. Naumann said: "For when Martin Lther nailed his 95 sentences to the door of the Castle Church of Wittenberg on October 31, 1517, challenging the ecclesiastical authorities of his day to a debate on controverted issues, he began a movement which was destined to re-discover the basic Christian freedoms which are now the common heritage of many protestants."

In completing the announcement Rev. Naumann said: "If Luther was living today, he would no doubt point modern Protestantism to the words of the scripture 'Stand fast, therefore, in the liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free, and not be entangled again with the yoke of bondage.'"

The Cisco Lobo Pups, playing lackadaisically in the first half, allowed the junior mountaineers from Mineral Wells to push over two touchdowns in that portion of their game in Mineral Wells Thursday night and came back in the second half to push their opponents all over the field and pile up 9 first downs and tremendous yardage but were unable to cross into the enemy end zone.

The first half saw Mineral Wells go for six first downs and 12 points while the Lobo "B" boys were held scoreless and without a first down to their credit.

Sheriff's Office Issues Plea For Added Caution in Cashing Checks

Eastland County Sheriff, J. B. Williams, today issued an appeal to exert more caution in cashing checks for strangers. He pointed out that complaints of forgeries and hot checks were coming into the office at a greater rate than in recent years and contributed part of the cause to the fact that so many new people had moved into the county.

He stated that oil booms usually brought about an influx of these swindlers. They are usually not connected with the business, but follow the booms to take advantage of the situation. These hangers on cause trouble in every oil center, he pointed out, and move from place to place to practice their swindles.

Williams urged merchants to have positive identification before cashing checks for any stranger. He said that social security cards and drivers license were easily changed or stolen and were not the best identification. Personal identification is always the safest, and a check with local credit reporting agencies is advisable.

He stated that an honest person seldom objected to an investigation and that any business lost from demanding proof would be made up in cutting swindle losses.

It is the publication department's third year of successfully publishing news and events concerning the junior college located here.

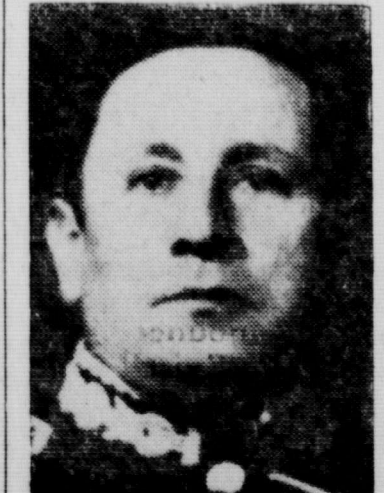

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## THE MEANING OF AMERICA

Recently two great Americans have given impressive testimony of the meaning of our American way of life—Eugene Holman, president of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, who was born in Monahans, Texas, and Herbert Hoover, only living ex-president of the United States, speaking on his 74th birthday at his birthplace, a small town in Iowa.

Both these men, with modesty and humble thankfulness, mentioned their successes—merely as examples of what any boy has a chance to do in America. Both starting out as poor boys in small towns, these men have demonstrated by their lives of achievement what we mean when we say the American way of life.

"I cite this bit of personal history," says Mr. Holman in the September American Magazine, "not because it is in any way unusual but precisely because it is typical of the way things happen in this country." He says that "human resources, not material resources, constitute the key to national prosperity." America's wealth and power flow from freedom of opportunity under the law.

"Your success or failure as an individual," Mr. Holman says, "rests upon the use you make of the opportunities democracy affords."

And Mr. Hoover, in his old age, comes back to his childhood home after a remarkable career to acknowledge that his success was made possible by our American freedom of opportunity.

"I have had every honor to which any man could aspire," he said. "There is no place on the whole earth except here in America where all the sons of man could have this chance in life. I recount all this in order that, in Quaker terms, I can give my own testimony.

"The meaning of our word, 'America,' flows from one pure spring. The soul of our America is its freedom of mind and spirit in man. Here alone are the open windows through which pours the sunlight of the human spirit. Here alone is human dignity not a dream but an accomplishment."—Hubert M. Harrison.

## Bootleggers Flourish In Wet Territory

Advocates of repeal said it would lawfully regulate the liquor industry and stop bootlegging. The traffic is more lawless than ever. In the first place the licensed liquor and beer dealers are the prohibition bootleggers. The traffic is lawless and can no more be regulated than lightning and thunder, rattlesnakes or hornets. Last year with over 400,000 legal outlets operating full blast the Federal Agents broke up more than eight thousand moonshine stills and caught 11,000 bootleggers in wet territory throughout the nation.

Advocates of repeal said the old saloon would not come back. Prohibition closed 177,000 of the old saloons. Repeal opened nearly half a million repeal drink shops. But of course they are not called "saloons". They are called cafes, filling-stations, drug-stores, package-stores, night-clubs, cocktail lounges, and every conceivable name under the sun except saloons. A thousand and one names but you never see the name saloon. We changed the name on the front of the building but we did not change the stuff in the bottle.

The old saloon is not back but the old drink is back. You may paint a pump handle until you are black in the face but that won't change the water in the well. You may call saloons night clubs, taverns, inns—any name you care to choose—but that

Alcohol in beer, wine or won't change the booze. whiskey is a habit-forming, narcotic, poisonous drug that befuddles brain, depresses the nerves, retards muscular reaction, and releases inhibitions. Changing the name on the front of the building where it is sold, legalizing the sale of it, giving Uncle Sam revenue from its sale, hiring a pretty girl to serve it, and using revenues from it to build schools and pay old age pensions will not keep it from making people drunk and causing them to kill and murder, to steal and rob, beat their wives, starve their babies, curse God and go to the devil.

The real issue is over what booze is and what it does, not over who makes it, who sells it, and a bottle of legally made, or who gets the money out of it. Legally sold and legally drunk beer, wine or whiskey will cause just as much drunkenness, sin, sorrow, shame and grief as will a bottle of bootleg hooch.

More booze, more drunkenness, more crime, more staggering women, more delinquent youth, more drunken drivers, more wrecked homes, and more ruined lives have followed in the wake of the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment. And just as General Douglas MacArthur and his fighting Yanks island-hopped back across the Pacific to recapture the Philippines and conquer Japan, so the Bible-believing, Christ-honoring, humanity-loving, sin-hating, high-souled, high-minded, sober hearted men and women of this nation who love the Lord and the church and their little boys and girls are driving this relegalized liquor out of state after state, county by county, and precinct by precinct.

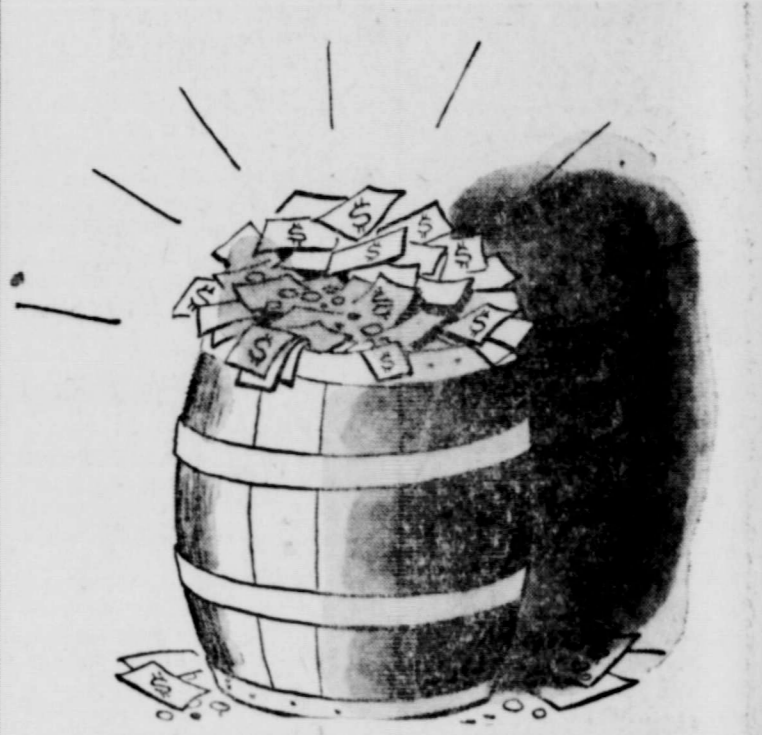

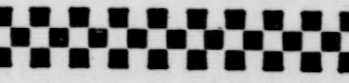

STEVENSON, AND THE RESPONDENT, LYNDON B. JOHNSON, FOR DEMOCRATIC NOMINEE FOR UNITED STATES SENATOR FROM TEXAS. (Boldface capitals ours.)**
4. The Court finds that the giving of effect to the fraudulent returns, heretofore mentioned, will result in depriving the complainant, Coke R. Stevenson, and interveners, H. L. Poole, A. G. Johnson and F. A. Harkrider, of their civil rights, in violation of the Constitution and laws of the United States.
5. The Court finds that each material allegation of the amended complaint and the trial amendment is sustained by the evidence.

Justice Hugo Black of the U. S. Supreme Court said Judge Davidson had no right to pass on this matter. **NO COURT HAS EVER SAID THAT JUDGE DAVIDSON'S FINDINGS OF FACT WERE INCORRECT.**

These findings are a matter of record and have never been set aside. You can find them in Civil Action No. 1640, filed Sept. 25, 1948, in the U. S. District Court at Fort Worth.
