Dividends From Range Grasses **Shown in Test**

grasses pays big dividends in increased yields of forage per acre. acording to clipping test made on the Jesse Reynolds ranch near here last week.

Farmers and ranchers of the Morton Valley, Cisco No. 1, and Cisco No. 2 Conservation groups met on the Jesse Reynolds ranch to observe two pastures, one of which had received light grazing for several years, while the other had been heavily grazed.

Seated in the tall, lush foilage of the properly managed pasture, the group discussed reports from early pioneers, fathers of some of the men in the group, that these very grasses which they were observing had at one time "reached the stirrups on the hills and hid a cow in the valley, while one could look for miles without seeing a tree.

Henry Turney, of the Soil Conservaton Service, discussed the factors which caused our ranges to deteriorate from this once excellent condition, to the present barren state of most of our pastures, and gave several instances where a good management sys em, which included proper stock ing rates, and a planned sequence of June to frost deferments, had paid off in more pounds of higher quality beef per acre-hence,

On April 23, 1947, and again or March 30, 1948, all vegetation down to the ground level was clipped and removed from both plots, so as to secure only the current year's growth. On Sept. 9, 1947 the good pasture had produced 1671 pounds of good quality forage per acre, while the poor pasture had produced only 223 pounds of poor quality forage. This year the better pasture produced 1144 pounds of grass and 54 pounds of weeds, whill for the school system and public N. Whitehead __188 211 204-603 the poor pasture produced 490 of weeds. Thus in the two years, Foncille Brooks 172 181 157-510 the good pasture has produced _187 194 188—569 2815 pounds of high quality forage, while the poor one has 185 182 184-551 yielded only 713 pounds of low quality grass.

Probably the most significant fact observed by the group, how-Francis Tarver 179 186 169-534 ever, was that after one summer's deferment, the poor pasture produced more than twice what it had last year, despite continued

dry weather. This lead the group to believe that it is both possible and prac 163 173 156-491 tical, by using one of several management systems, which various ranchers had found suited their individual needs, to begin on the "road back" from our present low ebb production, to the high tide of forage production, and pounds of beef per acre, which our country once produced, and is capable of producing again.


