Potter - Alsabrook Well Regarded As Biggest in Field

Locations were being made in the Kleiner oil field north of Cisco today for at least three new wells and completion work had been finished on two wells. A third well in the pool had topped the pay horizon and was cored.

Locations were being prepared for the Potter and Alsabrook No. 2 Kleiner, for the Lone Star Producing Company No. A-3 Kleiner and for the Lone Star No. 3 Daniels.

The well came in Sunday afternoon. The casing was perforated from 3,985 to 3,950 feet after 133 feet of Mississippi lime was cored. After the perforation, the formation was treated with 500 gallons of acid and the well flowed oil without swabbing in less than 10 minutes.

Lone Star reported that their No. 2 Daniels flowed 12 1/2 barrels through a 16-64th choke on a potential test of 24 hours. The second 24-hour test, it flowed 190 barrels and the flow was increasing as the well cleaned itself out. This was described as "an outstanding well."

Drilling in their Kincaid A-6, Lone Star topped the Mississippi lime at 3,904 feet and began coring at 7 p.m. Wednesday. The first 50-foot core showed heavy oil saturation, indicating good prospects for a substantial producer. Coring work was continuing today.

Elsewhere in the pool, the situation was reported to be "looking up" at the Hedrick and Howell well, a Hickok farm-out location. It is northeast of the Potter and Alsabrook 40-acre tract.

Gift Packages To Foreign Countries Under Regulations

Provisions for sending gift packages to foreign countries and the various import regulations of each country are available from the Department of Commerce offices, Ray L. Miller, regional director, has announced.

Each country's regulations on unsolicited gift packages sent from one individual to another are radically different; some countries permit the importation of items of necessity duty free, while others prohibit entirely the importation of many items even when included in gift shipments, Miller said.

Meeting the U. S. export control requirements is another regulation which must be complied with, Miller stated.

Information on sending gifts to U. S. service and civilian personnel is obtainable from the Commerce offices, upon specific request, mentioning the country and the article.

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MILITARY ALLIANCES

Within the very near future, this country will start serious work on preparing the draft of a military alliance with a group of foreign nations. That would have happened before, had not this been an election year. As it was, the State Department and the other agencies involved thought it best to postpone it until after the election, in order to keep it above and beyond partisan political considerations.

It is a remarkable thing that such a proposal should be seriously made in a country which, until recently, had religiously followed Washington's admonition against entangling foreign alliances. It is a still more remarkable thing that some kind of a military alliance has every chance of being approved—that, indeed, the odds are overwhelmingly in its favor. There is no better illustration of the fact that the world has shrunk tremendously, looking at it from the military and foreign relations point of view, and that America's ocean-made geographical remoteness from Europe is no longer considered to be a guarantee of territorial security.

It and when the alliance comes into being, it will be the result of the Soviet Union's postwar attitude—and, more particularly, the obvious intent of that power to dominate all of Europe and destroy every possible vestige of Western democratic influences. Had Russia even gone through the motions of cooperating with the Western nations in implementing the peace, and had she shown even a modicum of restraint in her dealings with the little nations that border on her boundaries, it is doubtful if the American Congress and the American people would have approved anything resembling an effective foreign alliance. However, that is water under the bridge, and the world being what it is we are taking more and more of the spotlight on the international stage.

According to John M. Hightower, an AP foreign editor, "State department officials plan to consult leaders of Congress and the major political parties to find what they will support in the final drafting of a proposed treaty to create a North Atlantic mutual defense system." The countries which will be initially involved, besides the U. S., are Canada, Britain, France, Belgium, Luxembourg, and The Netherlands. Preliminary talks have already been held between the ambassadors of these nations and the Undersecretary of State Lovett, who has been doing a great deal of quiet but important spade-work for the future while his chief, General Marshall, has been occupied with current problems.

Mr. Hightower reports that diplomatic authorities feel that a number of major points will survive negotiations and be formally enacted. Among them are: 1. The participating nations will form the nucleus of the non-communist alliance. 2. Other non-communist powers should be included. 3. If any of the nations involved is attacked, all the others will consider that they have been attacked as well. 4. Thereafter, each nation would take "appropriate action" in accordance with its own particular constitutional processes.

This is indicative of the progress the West is making in cementing its strength against possible aggression. It is reasonable to assume that such an alliance would be followed by outright military aid on a large scale to the countries of Europe which join. All of them are militarily weak, to varying degrees, and they want planes, tanks, ammunition, and so on. And, in the view of many, an alliance on paper wouldn't mean much unless it were solidly backed up by material power.

Traveling Team To Tell of Air Cadet Training Program

Young men interested in an officer's career with the United States Air Force may learn first hand about the Air Force's Aviation Cadet-Pilot Training Program from a special traveling Aviation Cadet Procurement team which is scheduled to arrive in Abilene the 22nd of November.

Captain Wayne Hall, Commanding Officer, US Army and US Air Force Recruiting Main Station in Abilene, said today that the traveling team will be prepared to provisionally qualify immediately all men who meet the USAF requirements. The team will have its headquarters at Hardin-Simmons University and will interview non-students as well as those enrolled at the school.

To be eligible for pilot training with the Air Force, men must be between 20 and 26½ year old, in good physical condition and unmarried. The Air Force also requires an applicant to have two or more years of college, or be able to pass an examination to measure the equivalent. Non-college men interested in the training will be able to take the educational qualifying examination when the Air Force team arrives in Abilene, Captain Hall said. Arrangements for an interview with the team may be made through the local Recruiting Station.

Graduates of the 12-month Air Force pilot training course are given their silver wings and commissions as 2nd Lieutenants in the Air Force Reserve, and assigned to active flying duty with the Air Force. Classes in flight training begin March 1, July 1, and October 15 of each year, and top graduates of each class are offered direct commissions with the regular Air Force. All Aviation Cadet graduates are given the opportunity to apply for and qualify for regular commissions during their active duty tours. During active flying duty, officer pilots can earn approximately \$4,000 a year in pay and allowances.

Basic phases of the flight training courses are given at the following bases in Texas: Randolph Air Force Base, San Antonio; Goodfellow Air Base, San Angelo; Porrin Air Force Base, Sherman; and Waco Air Force Base, Waco. Aviation Cadets

Army Offers Plan For Young Dentists

AUSTIN, Nov. 15. — Further adopt the Army Dental Corps as a career was announced by Colonel Oscar B. Abbott, Senior Army Instructor for the Organized Reserve Corps, here today. Senior dental students may be commissioned Second Lieutenants in the Reserve Corps, and placed on active duty with full pay and allowance until they complete academic requirements for their degrees, or until the completion of the year for which they are enrolled.

At the end of that time they may apply for commissions as First Lieutenants in the Dental Corps Reserve, and may be offered commissions in that grade in the regular army.

Officers so appointed will serve at least two years on active duty. Application forms have been sent to deans of dental schools. Further information can be obtained from the Headquarters Organized Reserve Corps Instructor's Office at 201 Federal Bldg., Waco, Texas.

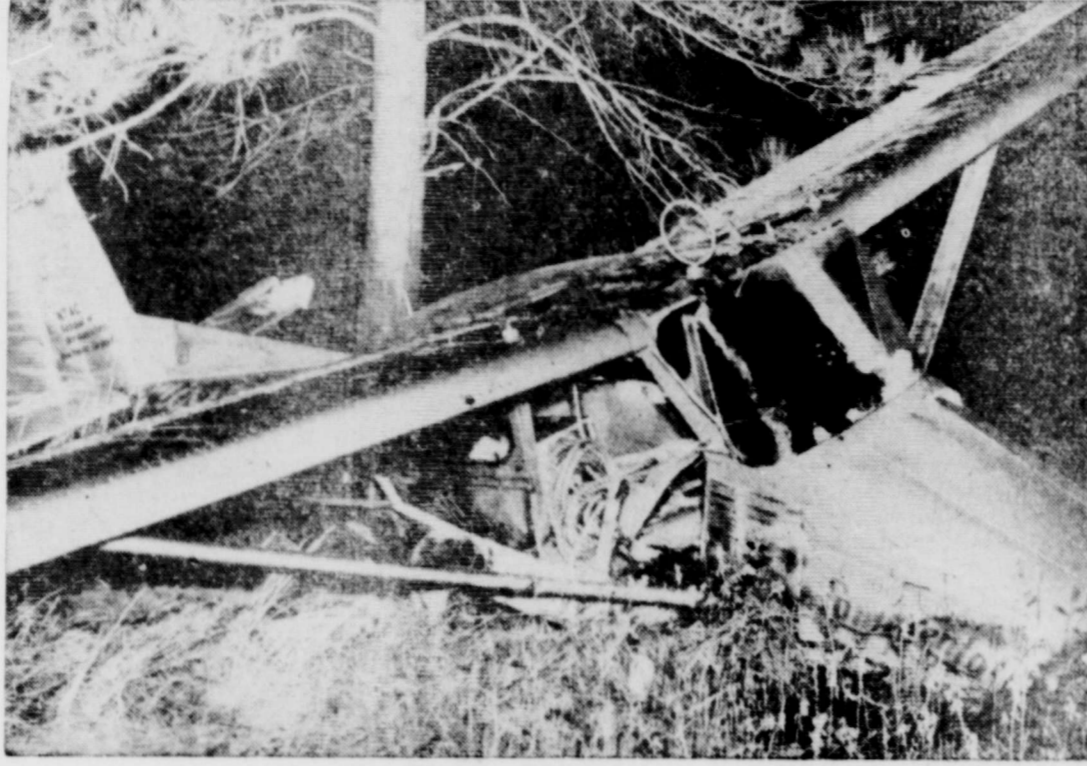

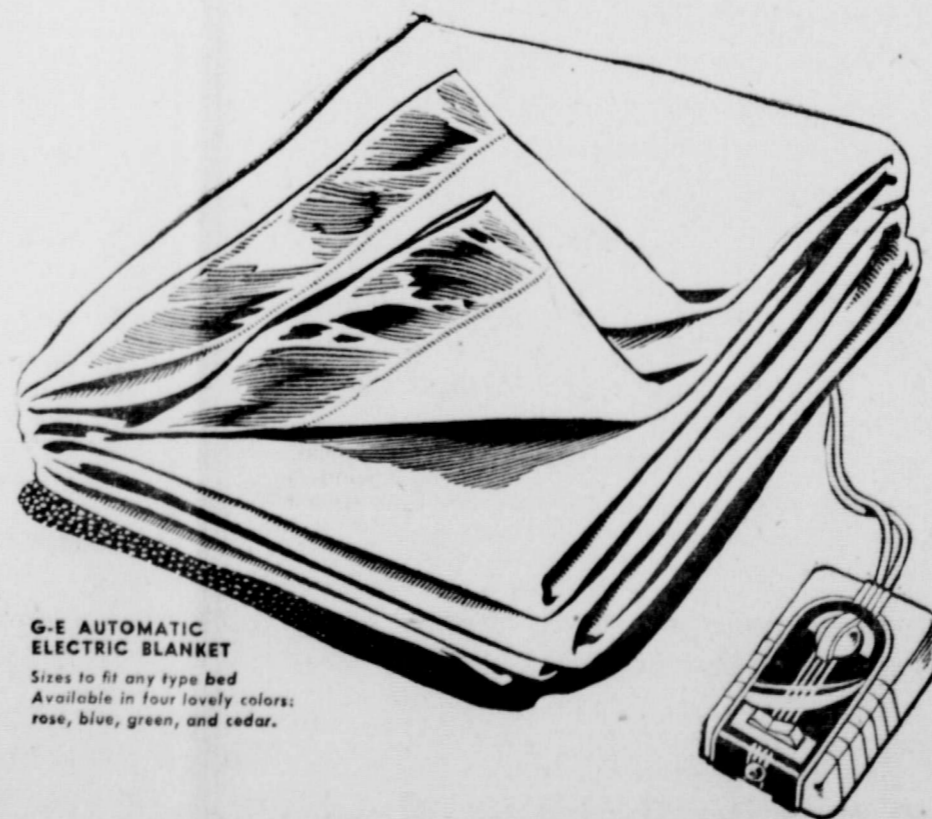
