The well came in Sunday afernoon. The casing was perforated from 3,985 to 3,950 feet after 133 feet of Mississippi lime was cored. After the perioration, the formation was treated with 500 gallons of acid and the well flowed oil without swabbing in less than 10 minutes.

Lone Star reported that their No. 2 Daniels flowed 129 barrels through a 16-64th choke on a potential test of 24 hours. The sec ond 24-hour test, it flowed 190 barrels and the flow was inceasing as the well cleaned itself out. This was described as "an outstanding well.'
