Local Army Man Gains Fame From Car Designed and Built While in Japan

The fame which started in Japan for Major Donald Surles, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. S. Surles of Cisco, has followed him to his home country where he is now on a leave of absence from his duties as Reconnaissance Officer with the U. S. Army Air Forces. Turning an idea into a reality has brought international publicity to the former Cisco Army officer. Upon being transferred to Japan almost three years ago and expecting his family to join him some three months later, Major Surles was faced with the problem of finding a means of transportation. In the back of his head had always been some ideas on how an automobile should be made so he brushed out the cobwebs and went to work.

First, he purchased a wrecked army jeep and stripped it down to the chassis. From some unrevealed source he found sufficient sheet steel to form the body. Using parts from wrecked planes and automobiles supplemented with some electrical equipment procured in the States he came out with the first edition of the "Surlesmobile."

The "Surlesmobile" is a masterpiece in streamlining—incorporated into it are the ideas the Army man had stored in the back of his head: the electrically operated doors—the adjustable seats and the ability to turn the automobile into sleeping quarters by adjustments of the front and rear seats. Vandals Warned Against Destroying Or Damaging City Street Markers

City street markers, recently placed at intersections throughout the City of Cisco through the efforts of Junior Chamber of Commerce, are being tampered with and destroyed by thoughtless individuals, it was brought to the attention of the City Street Department today.

A number of markers in the west residential section of the city have been damaged or destroyed said authorities who are seeking to prevent other occurrences in the future. They warned persons responsible for such acts of a heavy penalty to be imposed thereon if found guilty of an offense. Street department officials stressed the importance of the street markers as a help to new citizens and to incoming visitors to the city, and as a symbol of an ever-growing and civic-minded city. "The markers, brought by the Citizens of Cisco and promoted through the ceaseless and untiring efforts of local civic organizations, lay at the mercy of the people, and by the laws of Cisco this department will not stand by and watch the markers being ripped down as has been done," officials said.

City police have been placed on a 24-hour vigil for such occurrences and will enforce the department's warning, it was learned.

Some two dozen business and civic leaders inaugurated a drive to raise an additional \$7,500 with which to complete work on the community center - gymnasium building after a breakfast meeting early Tuesday at the college cafeteria.

The funds were to supplement some \$13,500 raised several months ago, being necessitated by the need for materials and improvements not originally planned. These include \$2,200 for white asbestos siding, \$1,000 for electrical materials to meet state laws, bleacher seats, interior sealing material and some other items.

The \$7,500 being sought will include some \$1,500 which the initial drive lacked in meeting its goal. The committees planned to contact persons and firms who had not been given an opportunity to make contributions in the first drive.

Construction work on the building, which was moved here from an army camp at Del Rio, is nearing completion. Asbestos siding will probably be completed by Wednesday night, and the maple flooring was to be laid this week. The structure is expected to be finished in about two weeks.

Charles J. Kleiner is honorary chairman of the drive with work being directed by J. Calloway and S. H. Nance. The Cisco Chamber of Commerce has been active in the project.

Texas Teachers to Study Legislature Program at Convention This Week

AUSTIN, Nov. 23.—Legislation the 40,000-member Texas State Teachers Association will sponsor for improvement of the state educational system will be determined at its seventeenth annual convention in Dallas Nov. 25, 26, 27.

A record number of more than 15,000 teachers are expected to attend the three general sessions and the more than seventy sectional meetings and other special sessions arranged.

Educators agree that the main requirements to improve the public school of Texas are more qualified teachers and better school buildings and equipment.

Miss Emma Mae Brotze of Marshall, president of the Association, pointed out here today.

To attract more persons into the teaching profession, the association is expected to ask the legislature to increase the minimum annual salary for teachers with bachelor degrees to \$2,400. The minimum is now \$2,000. Texas this year is short several thousand qualified teachers.

Teachers also receive increments for their years of experience and additional degrees. An increase for these is also expected to be asked.

The convention will consider

means of more equitable distribution of state funds to the districts, possible by extending the provisions of the equalization law. Under it, schools in less prosperous sections, up to those having fewer than 1,500 pupils are now given funds in addition to the per capita apportionment.

The teachers are also expected to vote favorably upon a proposal to enact a uniform contract law. The general sentiment at present is in favor of such a measure under which school districts must hire teachers for a specific number of years, the number increasing with the second and third contracts under which the teacher serves.

A mandatory, cumulative sick leave law is also scheduled for consideration.

The convention will hear reports on the recommendations of the Gilmer-Aiken committee. It was created by the last legislature, ordered to study the needs of the Texas schools and make recommendations to the next legislature, which meets in January.

Legislative matters and various reports will be placed before the general convention, the association's 350-member house of delegates and the executive committee.

The convention, in its three general sessions, will hear a number of nationally-known educational authorities. They include Dr. Frank P. Graham, president of University of North Carolina and a pioneer in atomic research; Dr. Willard E. Goslin, Pasadena, Calif., president of the American Association of School Administrators; Bruce Finley, assistant superintendent of the Los Angeles, Calif., school system, and Lew Parmenter of
