FREIGHT MOVEMENT JUMPS

AUSTIN, Nov. 22.—Revenue freight loaded in the Southwest district totaled 322,707 carloads in October—a 10-per-cent gain over September, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported. Loadings of all items, except coke which declined 17 per cent, were above September. Grain and grain product movements gained 22 per cent; ore, 30 per cent; livestock, 11 per cent; coal, 9 per cent; and forest products, 6 per cent.

October carloadings were 1 per cent above those of a year earlier.

City Officials Ask State Aid On Lake and Streets

The City Commissioners at their regular meeting Tuesday night voted to request aid from the State Game Fish and Oyster Commission in ridding Lake Cisco of undesirable fish. They also decided to press their request to the State Highway Department for aid in the widening of Avenue D through the business section of town.

Reports to the Commission showed that the lake was being overrun by such undesirable fish as carp and buffalo and that game fish were being crowded. The secretary was instructed to contact the state department for suggestions and aid in making the local fishing spot a more desirable place.

The widening of Avenue D has been studied in the past and it was decided that with the increase in traffic the project should be settled as soon as possible. Members of the commission and Hal Lavery, city secretary, made plans to contact the Brownwood District office to discuss the matter.

The remainder of the meeting was taken up in routine discussion and the payment of current bills.

Lobo "B" Squad and Grammar School Midgets Drop Games by 20-0 Score

Two local football teams lost their families last night by identical scores. Lobo Pups dropped a game to Albany at Chesley Field by a score of 20-0, while Coach Pop Garret's Grammar School Midgets were in Ranger losing to a Ranger Junior High eleven by the same amount.

Due to injuries among first string players Coach Hansard was unable to use some of the players he has used in past "B" team games, and his squad was weaker than in the game with Breckenridge last week. The half ended in a 0-0 tie, but Albany ran across three TDs in the second half to emerge victorious.

Lobo coaches used every man on the squad except those saved for the game with Breckenridge Thursday. A heavier Ranger Junior 11 took advantage of the breaks to emerge victorious over a scrappy Midget team. The Cisco boys played one of their best games of the year but were unable to cope with the heavyweights.

The entire Midget line fought for every yard and held in many tight spots to keep the score from being higher. The backfield was unable to get going against an alert Ranger defense. Cowan-planning Midget fullback, accounted for most of Cisco's yardage and was a power on backing up the line.

Tuesday night's games wound up the season for both squads.

Civil Service Lists Exams For Junior Administrative Posts

The United States Civil Service Commission announced today that applications will be accepted until December 21, 1948 for Junior Professional Assistant, Junior Management Assistant, and Junior Agricultural Assistant examinations. Positions in Washington, D. C., and throughout the United States, at \$2,974 a year, will be filled from these examinations. The examinations are of particular interest to college graduates and senior students, since they offer an opportunity to begin a career in the Federal service in a variety of professions. Announcements have been issued by the Civil Service Commission in booklet form, giving full information regarding the examinations and the positions to be filled.

To qualify for the JPA, JMA and JAA examinations, competitors must pass a written test and, in addition, must have had appropriate education or experience of a combination of education and experience. Applications will be accepted from students who expect to complete their college courses by June 30, 1949. Age limits, waived for persons entitled to veteran preference, are from 18 to 35 years.

Concluding the holiday program will be a football game Thursday afternoon between the Cisco High School Loboes and Breckenridge High School at the local stadium.

Wranglers Meet TMC Here Tonight As Holiday Entertainment Opener

Wranglers to Field All Senior Team Against TMC Tonight

The Wranglers from Cisco Junior College will play host to a fine Texas Military College team tonight at Chesley Field, and the local team made up of entirely Senior squadmen, will be trying to wind up the season with a 500 average. In nine games played so far this season the Wranglers have won four and lost five. A win tonight would mean the local team would break even for the 1948 grid season.

The Texas Military school has one of the best teams in the Northern Division of the Conference, according to Coach Everett of the Wranglers. The forward wall will average 190 pounds per man and is a fast charging group of boys. Everett said the line was the hardest hitting bunch he had seen all year.

The Cadets boast a backfield that will average 170 pounds, and are a fast breaking bunch of backs, according to reports—they have a knack of finding openings in the line and engaging thru. Their interference is above the average, Everett said.

The starting line-up for the Wranglers will be composed of senior squad members who will be playing their last game for the Blue and White. The starting line will average 179 pounds per man while the backfield will carry a weight average of 155 pounds. They will go onto the field minus the services of Leon Parish, end, who suffered an ankle injury; and will miss the fine kicking of Cavitt who places the ball deep in enemy territory on kick-offs. Cavitt is still nursing a hip injury received in the Hillsboro game.

The Senior starters will be Callerman and Rutherford at ends; Sam Gorman and Melvin Nobles at Tackles; Penn and Moore at guards and Carmen at the center post. Backfield starters will be selected from the following last year students: Mosely, Tompkins, McGuire, Gann, Garner, Leveridge and Jimmy Lee. Garner has not fully recovered from injuries that have followed him most of the season.

School officials joined the coaches in suggesting to fans who might like to witness good footballs tams, that they be on hand tonight to help graduating team members write finis to their football career with the local college. They were high in their praise for the fighting spirit, the fine sportsmanship and playing ability of the ena-ire 1948 squad.

Both sides are in fair shape for the skirmish. Center Rex Farley of the Loboes suffered a head injury in the Eastland undertaking and will play only part of the game.

Cisco is without the services of Norman Boggs, one of the top defensive players and George Watts and Hub Harwell, new find this year, are due for little or no duty on the field. Hub is suffering from an infected arm and Watts is still nursing an injured knee.

Breckenridge will operate from the T with Jim Newberry, who is being touted for district honors, at the engineer's post. A brilliant passer and ball handler, his passes are the leading actor in powering the Bucks to a destined district win. He'll be ably assisted by a host of other stars.

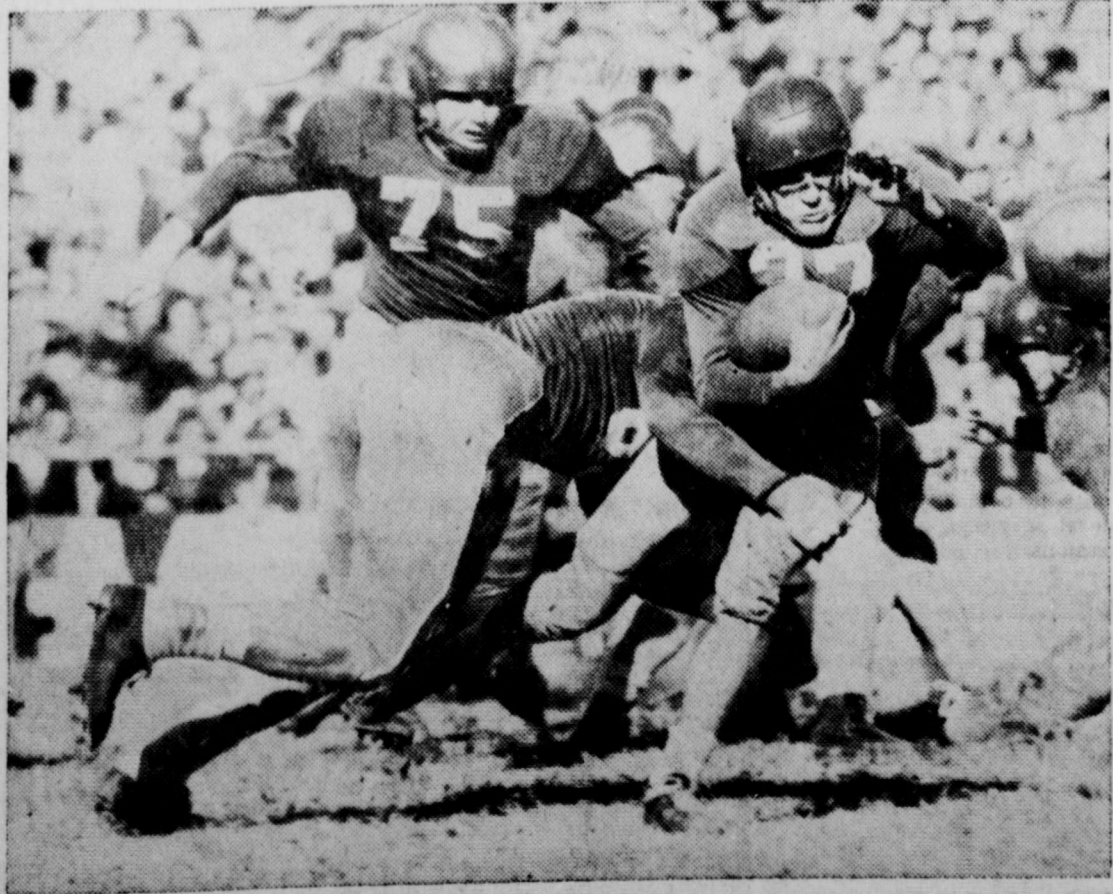
Loobes into battle and will do much of the running chores while Russell Johnson takes to the aerial routes of the 48-minute trail.

WHO IS WASHINGTON'S BOSS?

In late September, the Times Herald of Dallas, Texas, published an outstanding edition under the title SELF-HELP WILL CURB WASHINGTON'S POWER. Here is the text of it: "Many if not most, Americans complain of the continuing centralization of power at Washington. And many are the solutions for this problem offered, especially in this political year. Some of these are highly complex. Others are more simple.

"W. G. Vollmer, president of the Texas & Pacific Railroad, offered a simple solution this week in a talk to laymen of the First Methodist Church. It would be hard to find one more effective, if it were carried out.

"Mr. Vollmer's solution was this—don't go to Washington so often seeking money and favors.

"He laid down this prohibition for American communities, saying they must solve their local problems if freedom in this country is to be preserved, but we may be sure he would extend it to private corporations and to individuals also. The record shows these, too, continually run to Washington for money and other aid, just as states, cities, towns and hamlets do.

"So long as we look to Washington for everything from a billion-dollar grant to advice on how to keep our hair from falling out, Washington is going to try to meet our demands. To do so, it must have the power.

"If we want to curb that power, let's stop asking it for so much."

This comment so impressed John N. Garner, former vice-president of the United States, that he wrote the Times Herald it "is one of the soundest editorials I have read in many moons. If every paper in Texas, yes, in the United States, would follow suit and continue to repeat I believe we (would) get results."

The present burden of taxation is largely the result of the attitude of the people that the Federal Treasury is a grab bag for anybody and any community. We have made the government the biggest of all bankers, and an operator of business. The stage is now set to further enlarge its activities and increase taxes for that purpose. And we are carrying the copent of social security to the point where it is undermining the self-reliance of the people—to say nothing of what it is doing to their pocketbooks. Ultimately, unless checked, the present trend will destroy all security.

The Dallas Times Herald, Mr. Vollmer, and Mr. Garner, have told us a fundamental truth. There's no other way to curb Washington's dangerous power.

Fuller Rites

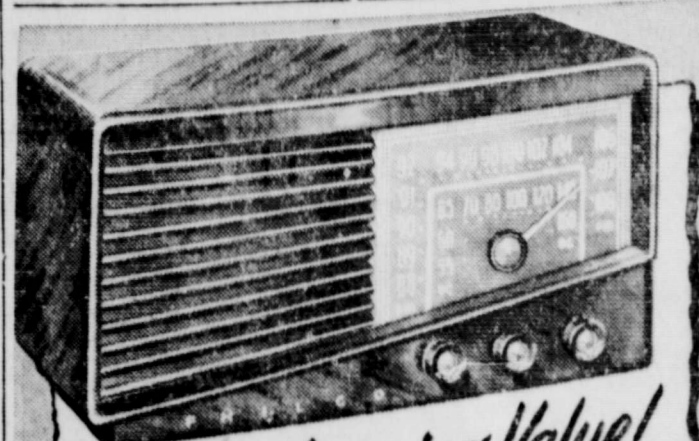

te, Calif.; and R. R. Fuller, Moran. The pallbearers were his grandsons. Interment in Moran cemetery.

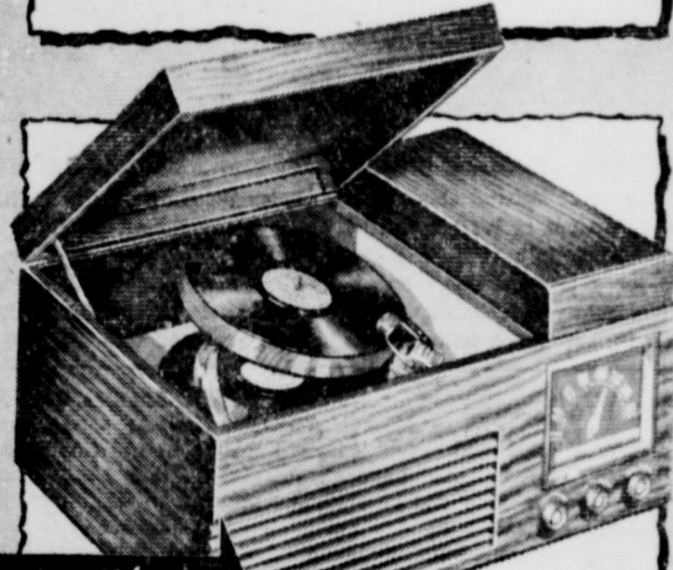
