Lions Club Members Hear Talk By Telephone Company Man Wednesday

George Brown of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company Information Department, Dallas, explained and demonstrated the part played in the telephone system by little things — the tiny pieces of equipment that are of great importance at the regular Lions Club luncheon Wednesday.

For example, Brown showed that an ordinary dial telephone has 433 parts, and stated that a colony of 50,000 midgets in the

transmitter of a telephone — the tiny grains of carbon — change voice and sound waves into electrical impulses that travel over the wires and are translated back

into sound by small magnets and a diaphragm in the telephone receiver at the other end.

The speaker showed copper wires as small as a human hair and a section of a telephone cable only two and one-half inches in diameter which contained 4,242 copper wires. He exhibited also a midget motor weighing four ounces which developed a speed of 8,000 revolutions per minute, yet which stopped, reversed direction and regained its original speed in only one-eighth of a second.

One of the most amazing items shown was the "thermistor," a small instrument so sensitive to temperature changes that it can detect the presence of man a quarter of a mile away by the heat of his body. During the war, the thermistor was used in a secret device called the Bolometer to detect enemy snipers, even in total darkness.

Brown showed a model of the first telephone made by Alexander Graham Bell, and explained how it played a part in the war-time development of the sound-powered telephone.

Among the other devices shown by Brown was the first headset designed for telephone operators, which weighed six and one-half pounds. He compared it with the modern headset which weighs only six ounces.

Brown was introduced by Manager C. A. Dureschle of the company here.

Miss Mabel Herndon Passes Away at Home Of Parents Here

Funeral arrangements were incomplete for Miss Mabel Herndon, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. R. Herndon, who died at 10:10 a.m. today at the family home on West 18th Street, after a long illness.

Miss Herndon was born near Marshall, Missouri, on October 25, 1893. Her parents moved to Cisco in 1920 and although, she spent only three months of the year here, she called Cisco her home.

She was a graduate of State Normal College in Warrensburg, Missouri, and had taught school in Bonne Terre, Missouri, for 27 years prior to retiring to live with her parents here, some six months ago. She was a life member of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in Warrensburg.

Miss Herndon is survived by her parents and one brother, Forest A. Herndon of Kilgore. Also surviving are two nieces and three nephews.

Final arrangements for the funeral were awaiting the arrival of her brother from his home in Kilgore, but it was expected that the services would be held sometime Friday. Thomas Funeral Home was placed in charge of arrangements.

Wheat Damaged by Blowing Sand

Soil moisture was adequate in eastern, coastal, and southern counties and in the north High Plains, but drought conditions still prevailed in other areas. Cover crops made good growth in eastern areas and soil conditions were favorable for further planting.

Combining and cutting of sorghums progressed satisfactorily in the northern and southern High Plains despite the windy weather. Harvest was nearing completion in these late maturing areas. Cotton pulling was hampered by high winds and cold weather in the northern High Plains. Harvest was being rushed to completion in southern High Plains counties where field work was interrupted only temporarily by sand storms during the early part of the week.

Extensive use of mechanical strippers was being supplemented by use of many old fashioned sleds and all available hand labor in an effort to bring harvest to an early completion. Some damage resulted from blowing sand in the northwest area and cotton was moving to the gins heavily loaded with sand. Pecan harvest was, nearing completion in all areas.

Killing frost on the night of November 28 seriously damaged the remaining tender vegetables in the Laredo district. Crops in the Eagle Pass and Winter Garden districts had been damaged by earlier freezes. Some spotted damage is also expected in the Lower Valley, particularly the west end. Progress was generally retarded by near-freezing temperatures.

New green feed made good development in eastern, upper coastal and southern counties where moisture was generally adequate and mild temperatures prevailed during the early part of the week. However, the weekend norther slowed pasture growth in those areas, and the high winds rapidly depleted surface moisture in all parts of the State. Wheat pastures in the northern Panhandle counties was supplying fair to good grazing. Rains, however, were urgently needed in most other areas to supply moisture for small grain pastures.

Two contests are on the slate for tonight's battle, pitting the first and second teams of both colleges, he CJC athletic department said. Coach Stormy Davis will head the local cagers this year and will launch Cisco Junior College's bid for the conference title.

The first of the twin set will get underway at 6:30, school officials stated. The game will be played in the Big Spring High School gymnasium.

Starting line-up for the Wrangler cagers was not disclosed, but Charles Adair, Jack Leveridge, Lonard, Grisby, Owen Lewis and Lon Parrish were expected to stage impressive ball handling in tonight's cage warfare.

Johnson is a graduate of Cisco High School and Cisco Junior College where he left behind an impressive ball handling record.

He was accompanied to Cisco by his wife, the former Jimmie Jean Hensley and small daughter. They expect to return to Waco Saturday.

Enlistments in National Guard Show Increase

According to an announcement released by the commanding officers today, recruit enlistments in the local National Guard unit here, the 961st Field Artillery, reached a total of 45 officers and guardsmen. The boost in enlistments was recorded over November's 34 man enrollment to the unit.

State National Guard enlistment status for Cisco has been reset to five officers and 93 guardsmen eligible to enroll before the high quota is reached. Enlistments are still being accepted by the unit and boys from the ages 18 to 25 were urged to enlist for "duty at home". The Cisco Chamber of Commerce will furnish complete details and information for joining, the announcement said.

Contract is Let for Deep Well; Kleiner Pool Busy

David B. Trammell and James McCurdy, Fort Worth oil operators, today announced location and plans for immediate drilling of their No. 1 City of Cisco, an Ellenburger Lime test on the old airport tract in the city limits.

Contract for the well was let to the Quinn Drilling Co., veteran West Texas drillers, who were to move in as soon as possible. The test will be some 3000 feet southwest of Mississippi lime production in Cisco's new Kleiner pool.

Location is 1,000 feet west of their eastern boundary, in Section 84, Block 4, H&T survey. It is 700 feet southwest of a well drilled to the Ellenburger by Hickok Oil Company in 1935 and later plugged.

The same company also holds a short term lease on the 90-acre Cisco Junior College campus.

In the Kleiner pool, considerable activity was under way. Skelly Oil Company had moved in a spudder and was seeking again to complete their No. 1 Thomas, drilled several months ago. The well had made favorable showings, but was never completed.

According to reports, Hedrick and Howell's No. 1 Lochridge, which encountered trouble with a broken drill stem and was never able to clean the hole to proceed, will skip the derrick and begin a new hole.

Lone Star Producing Company was drilling at 3,878 feet early today in their No. 1 C. H. Fee an eastern outpost in the field. They expected to encounter the Mississippi lime during the day. Lone Star was rigging up to begin drilling their No. A-3 C. J. Kleiner.

Potter and Alsbrook were drilling ahead in their No. 2 Kleiner.

Lone Star was running a drill stem test today from 4,144 to 4,216 feet in the Ellenburger lime in their No. 2 Fon Mitcham, nine miles north of Cisco.

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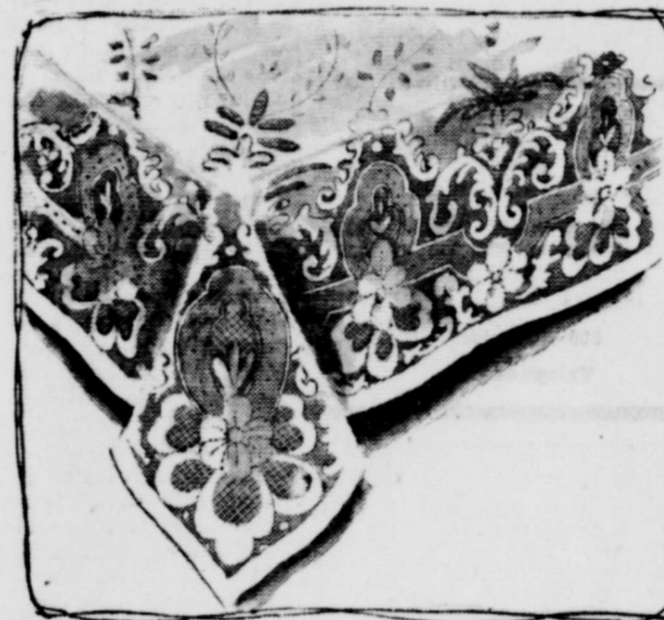
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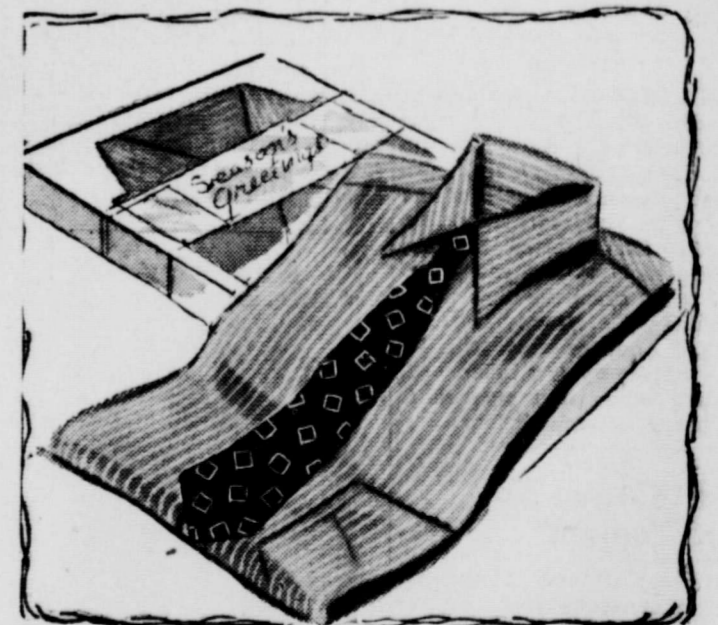
