Vets Administration Sets Minimum Building Standards For GI Homes

The Veterans Administration Saturday set minimum building standards for GI loan homes.

They are designated to protect home-buying World War II veterans from shoddy construction, or from being cheated by unprincipled contractors or salesmen.

The rules specify the minimum quality of materials, construction techniques, workmanship, equipment, installation and structural details necessary for veteran sign guarantees.

The GI standards parallel the minimum construction requirements of the Federal Housing Administration. The veterans agency emphasized they are not intended to standardize house plans or discourage builders from including extra features.

Earlier this year the VA set up an appraisal service to provide builders a pre-construction price estimate of "reasonable value," based upon building plans. Periodic inspections by VA representatives, as the appraised houses were being built, assured the veteran-buyer that the property was meeting specifications.

VA Chief Carl R. Grey, Jr., said the pre-construction appraisals hereafter will be given only when the plans and specifications meet the new minimum building standards.

Gray said a veteran building a home of his own doesn't have to use the new building guide. Such a veteran needs only to meet the GI bill requirements that his house is "suitable for dwelling purposes" and that its cost does not exceed reasonable value as determined by VA.

Gray said his agency also is ready to aid in site selection and in architectural design and arrangement of various houses. These guides are not mandatory, but are strongly recommended.

Mr. Robert D. Deputy, VA Contact Representative, will be in Cisco the 1st and 3rd Monday of each month, at Cisco Junior College, from 1:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. to help any veteran, their dependents or beneficiaries to obtain any benefits to which they might be entitled under laws administered by the VA.

Congressman Warns That U. S. Must Stay Powerful to Combat Communism

Congressman Omar Burleson warned 17th Congressional District postal officials that the United States must maintain her position as the world's most powerful country to prevent the spread of Communism in an address here Saturday night.

He was guest of honor at a banquet given by postmasters of the district at the Cisco Junior College cafeteria.

The congressman, who recently returned from a tour of European countries, gave his impressions of the various nations he visited and described the conditions he found.

Germany is a nation of defeated people, he said. He described the Germans as "wimps to work but have nothing to work with."

Italy's biggest problem is a surplus of labor, he said. England is fighting the battle of production, France, he said, appeared to be in comparatively good condition.

Burleson was introduced by John H. Houser at Stephenville, who formerly represented this district in congress. Postal authorities who spoke briefly included J. Edwin McKee, Fort Worth; W. N. McMillian, Fort Worth; H. K. Coale, Fort Worth, and others.

Postmaster L. H. McCrea of Cisco was the host postmaster and he delivered the welcome address. Dudley Jernigan, Fort Worth, gave the response. Mrs. Maureen W. Eteuurt, Blackwell postmistress, was mistress of ceremonies.

More than 100 persons attended the banquet. Musical entertainment was provided by Ray Judia of Cisco.

This year Edward planted and tended five acres of corn, eight acres of barley, 48 acres of clover, 28 acres of cotton, 5 1/2 acres of row cane, 40 acres of wheat, and 20 acres of mung beans.

What he has learned about poultry raising and marketing has helped John Humphrey, 16, of Brownwood, to win State honors in the 1948 National 4-H Poultry Achievement program. During six years in 4-H, John has raised 1,875 Barred Plymouth Rock chickens and has given six poultry demonstrations.

cleaning and preparing the rabbit for cooking. The gloves should be sterilized after using, and the refuse and paper that has touched the rabbit should be burned. Hands should be washed thoroughly after the meat has been set to cook.

Adequate cooking is a final safeguard that should be observed at all times. To destroy any germs that may be present, the meat should be cooked at boiling temperature for at least 20 minutes, regardless of whether it is to be fried or baked later.

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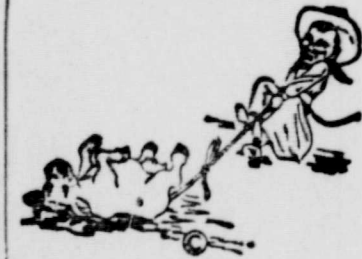

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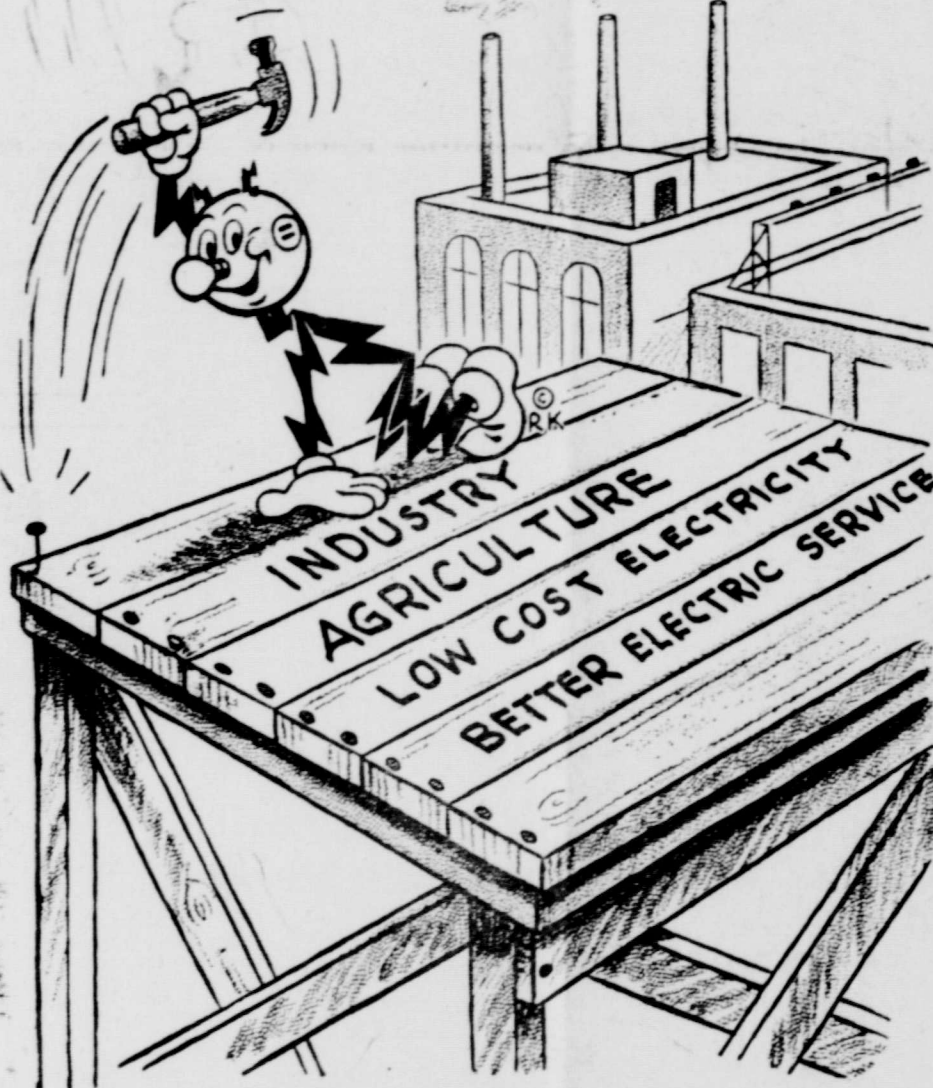
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
