Young Minister To Preach At Youth Revival Here

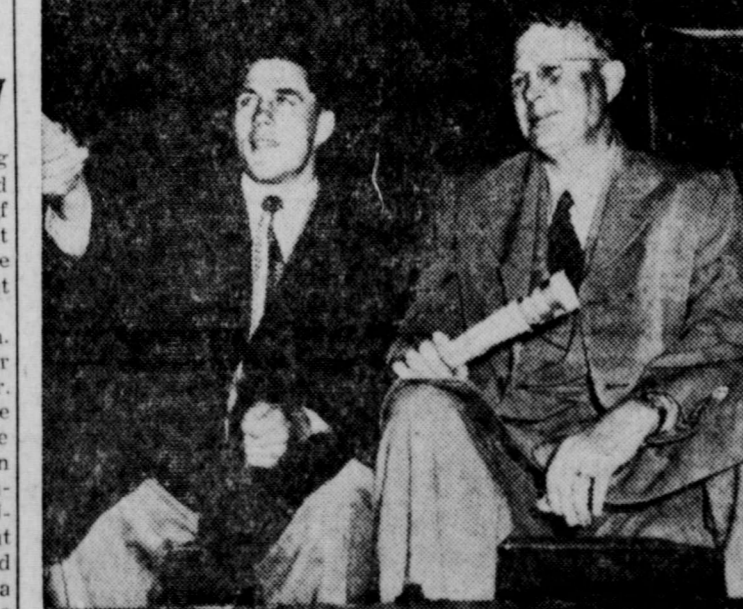

Danger of Atomic Energy Stressed

COLLEGE STATION, Dec. 9.—(Spl.)—Atomic energy is particularly dangerous because materials for it can be converted so easily from peace time to war time use, according to Dr. Sumner T. Pike, member of the United States Atomic Energy Commission. Dr. Pike addressed the faculty of Texas A&M College and graduate students here Monday night. "If the United States doesn't have to use the atomic bomb in anger, every particle of fissionable material in our stock piles can be converted to industrial use," Dr. Pike said. On the other hand, the material can be just as easily converted from peaceable to war use. It is for this reason that countries do not like to allow fissionable material to pass beyond their borders, Dr. Pike pointed out.

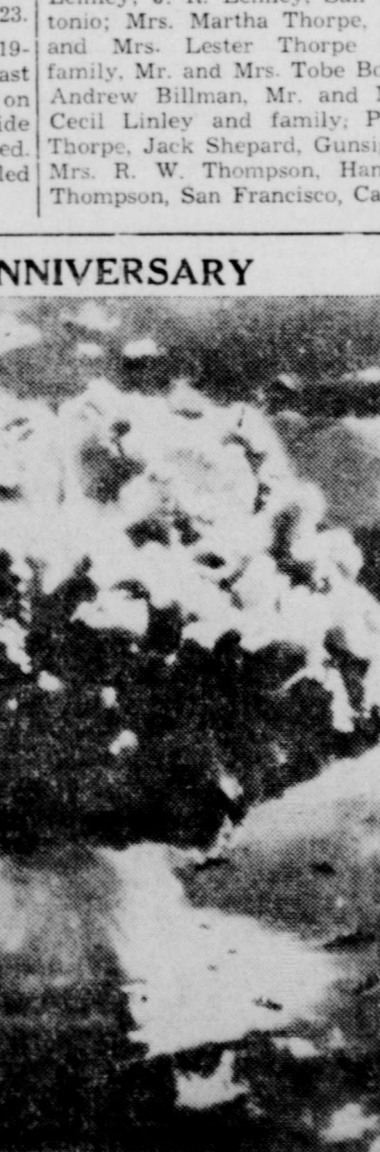

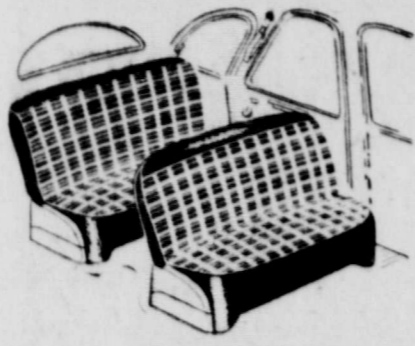
Rev. Allen Called

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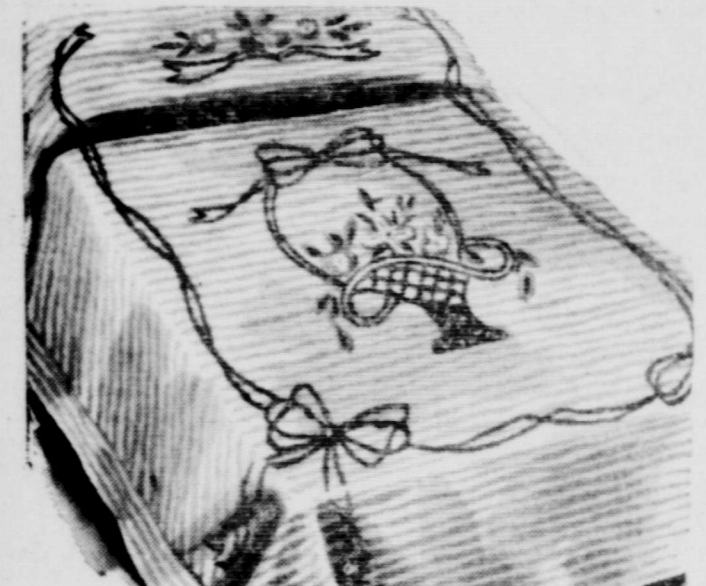
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
