

## Chiefs vs Canadian In Bi-District At Bivins

If it's November, it must be playoffs.

Friona's Chieftains and their fans are heading up to Dick Bivins Stadium in Northeastern Amarillo this evening, for an 8 p.m. meeting with the Canadian Wildcats of District 6-2A.

The Wildcats bring an 8-2 record into the bi-district playoff round. Like Friona, Canadian is no stranger to the football playoffs.

Last season, Canadian missed the post-season for only the second time in ten

years. Friona is making its seventh straight appearance, and eighth time in nine seasons.

"As usual, they're bigger than we are, but they're not as big as some of our opponents have been. They run the option on offense, with some mis-direction stuff," says Chieftain coach Bob Ferguson.

Ferguson said the Wildcats like to run the bootleg play. "They don't throw the ball a lot—just when they have to."

Ferguson said the Chieftains played their best game at Abernathy last Friday, and the 55-0 score backs up that claim. "We did well in every aspect of our game. I was proud of the way the kids played," he said.

Canadian features a 6-3, 200-pound tailback in sophomore Austin English, who is their leading ground-


gainer and scorer. And when the Wildcats put the ball in the air, English is a possible target.

It's the first-ever meeting between the two schools in football, but the Squaws met the Lady Wildcats in a bi-district round game at Amarillo in 1986, and came away with a 36-35 win on a last-few-seconds basket by Kelly Wied.

The Wildcats battled their way into the playoffs against a tough district that included champion Panhandle, Spearman, Sanford-Fritch and W.T. High.

Riley Morris, a junior, quarterbacked for Canadian. He's 6-2 and weighs 180.

Tyrel McCravens, 6-1, 270-pound tackle, is the one the Chieftains will try to avoid. Have the Chieftains played anyone this season that didn't have a 270-pounder? We need to feed our guys better than we do!


It is the new revised version of the old Parmer County Christmas Bazaar which was held on the weekend before Thanksgiving for many years.

## Three Generations Of Chieftains Recognized

It's not too unusual to see both grandparents and parents in the stands rooting for their offspring in various sports.

But it's a little unusual to find three generations where the player, his dad and granddad all played football, as well as all the other sports, as Chieftains.

Current Chieftain senior Adam Bandy, as did his brother Joseph before him, has that "legacy."

"Grandpa" Eugene Bandy was a member of the Chieftain teams in 1946-47 and '48. He was captain of his team in 1948.

Eugene's teams of 1946 and '47 both struggled to 1-8

records. A listing of Friona district alignment gives a good reason. District opponents were Hereford, Dumas, Canyon, Dimmitt, Tulia and Dalhart.

Those towns were basically as much larger than Friona in the mid-1940s as they are today.

Friona's only win in the 1946 season was a non-district game against Lockney, a member of Friona's current district.

The Chieftains of 1947 likewise enjoyed only one win, against Melrose, N.M.

The following year, Eugene's senior year, the district alignment became more favorable, with Hale Center, Petersburg, Amherst, Springlake, Whitharral, Dimmitt, Olton and Anton as members. The Chieftains improved to a 3-6-1 record that season.

"In my senior year, D.W. 'Doc' Brantley was the coach. Ralph Stewart was my coach as a sophomore, and we had about three different coaches my junior year (1947-48)," Bandy explained.

One of the teams Friona played in the 1947 and '48 seasons was Melrose, New Mexico. Friona beat the Buffaloes, 27-7 in 1947, but lost at their place, 6-0 in 1948.

The Friona players probably still remember Melrose's "football field" to this day.

Eugene brought the Friona Star a copy of the 1949 FHS Chieftain yearbook, with a photograph taken at the Melrose game. In lieu of grass, the Melrose field contained sagebrush. A fair

amount of it, too. (see photo on an inside page of this issue).

"You had to be a little careful not to step into a 'cow patty,'" Eugene told us. Unlike his sons and grandsons, Eugene was a lineman in high school, playing end on both offense and defense.

Clay Bandy, the father in this narrative, played quarterback for the Chieftains in 1973 and 1974.

The 1974 grid team finished 8-2. Unfortunately for the Chiefs that year, both losses were in district: 6-0 to Olton and 10-7 to Dimmitt. The team had scored a rare win over Littlefield, 21-14.

Clay Bandy completed 45 of 90 passes as a junior, good for 768 yards and nine touchdowns.

In 1974, Clay again had a good year, nailing 33 of 66 passes. But if the coach had allowed him to throw a pass just once in the Olton and Dimmitt games, Friona might have been district champs. (This is Bill Ellis' remembrance, Clay didn't say it).

In addition to his football career, Clay Bandy was also a member of the Chieftain basketball team of 1974 that battled all the way to the state finals before they lost in the playoffs.

Adam has played on the varsity since his freshman year, when older brother Joseph sustained an injury, and he more than adequately filled his spot.

After having a great junior year, with 895 yards rushing and 87 yards receiving, and 12 touchdowns, the injury bug hit Adam in pre-season this year, and he missed the first five games, and has been slowly regaining his "old form."

Not only has Grandpa Eugene served as a Chieftain captain, but Clay was team captain both his junior and senior seasons.

Adam has served as a game captain this season, and has also served on the Athletic Leadership Council.

Patsy (Reed) married Eugene Bandy not too long after he graduated from FHS (two years after she had), and they have celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary.

Their oldest son Johnny, like the others a three-sport athlete, has coached in the Dallas-Fort Worth area for about 20 years. During his coaching career in that area, his teams have played 16 playoff games at Texas Stadium.

Another Bandy son, Todd, coaches at Brady, where he is head coach and athletic director.

**YOU MAY HAVE HEARD** me refer to Good Old Bill as "My old Geezer." That's okay! He calls me "The Geezeress."

In case you are too young to understand the term Geezer, it is that phase in one's life when it takes longer to rest up than it did to get tired.

It's when you grow wise enough to watch your step, but too old to go anywhere. Instead of a policeman, it's your doctor who cautions you to slow down. You smile and nod a lot because you can't hear a word anyone is saying. You are good at telling stories. . . over and over and over.

The only way you can open your medication that has a child-proof cap is with a hammer. Of course, grandkids come in handy for opening things like that, and also for programming the VCR and showing you how to use the computer.

Geezers seldom brag about anything much except the grandchildren in Little League or music recitals or how smart they are in school.

Old Geezers are easy to spot. When the flag bearers march by during a parade, they hold their caps over their hearts and at sporting events during the playing of the National Anthem, they sing out loud without embarrassment. They know the words and believe in them.

They remember World War I, the Depression, World War II, Pearl Harbor, Guadalcanal, Normandy, the Battle of the Bulge, and Hitler. They remember the Atomic Age, The Korean War, The Cold War, the Jet Age, the Moon Landing and Vietnam.

If you bump into a Geezer on the sidewalk, he'll apologize. Pass one on a street and he'll nod, or tip his cap. Geezers trust strangers and are courtly to women. They hold the door for the next person and when walking down the sidewalk, they make sure the little lady walks on the inside for protection. When a lady comes into the room, the Geezer will stand up and offer her his chair. Geezers get embarrassed if someone curses in front of the women and children and they don't enjoy all the violence and filth in the movies and television. Geezers have moral courage.

Our country needs our Old Geezers with their decent values and common sense. We need them now more than ever. It's the Geezers who know our great country is protected, not by politicians or police, but by the young men and women in the military serving their country in foreign lands, just as they did, without a thought except to do a good job to the best of their ability and then get on home to their loved ones.

We paid homage to quite a few of our Old Geezers last Monday on Veteran's Day. These guys are the backbone of our country, our state and our little cities. We are proud of them. Thank God for Old Geezers.

# FRIONA FLASHBACKS

...from the files of The Friona Star

## 70 Yrs Ago-Nov. 11, 1932

The national election for this year is now history. As far as Friona was concerned, we had a most beautiful day for the election, and everything went off peaceably. Mrs. (Ma) Ferguson received 184 votes and Mr. Bullington received 169 votes at Friona (in the governor's race). Judge Aldridge, for county judge, received 300 votes; to 57 for Mr. Kinsley, the Republican candidate. Mr. Rushing for clerk received 313 votes to 38 for Mr. Simpson. The statement that Mr. Roosevelt carried 75 states out of the 48 seems to have gone unchallenged here.

## 60 Yrs Ago-Nov. 13, 1942

Mrs. Joe Jesko, chairman of the sponsor's committee of the County Home Demonstration Council, announced this week that enrollment in the girls 4-H Clubs shows an 11 percent increase over last year. The enrollment at present is 150 members in seven clubs. Girls from Friona to be honored this month include Camille Elmore, Dorothy Nell Guinn, Betty Ruth Houlette, Gladys Roberts, Betty Jean

Turner, June Moody and Betty Lou Talkington.

## 50 Yrs Ago-Nov. 13, 1952

The Friona Chieftains romped over the highly-touted Anton Bulldogs in the last regular season game last Friday, copping the District 3-B championship in the 61-33 win on the local sod. The championship game earns the Redmen another game. They will play for bi-district honors. Friday's scoreboard read 20-0 at halftime on tallies by Robbins, Robason and Jordan. Anton's first score came after Friona had racked up 34 points.

## 45 Yrs Ago-Nov. 14, 1957

After a late start, the Friona Chiefs last week rolled over Springlake 35-6 and continued their spirit as district title contenders. The Chiefs return to their home field for the last district game of the season Friday. Stacked up against the Chiefs will be the Morton Indians, also undefeated in district play this year, and the two are digging in for the district title.

## 40 Yrs Ago-Nov. 15, 1962

The Running Water Draw

Watershed project cleared a legal hurdle in Parmer County on Tuesday, when the commissioners' court tentatively agreed to act as co-sponsor of the project. The Parmer County Soil Conservation District, original sponsor, asked the commissioners to co-sponsor the project.

Figures compiled this week by City Manager Arley L. (Jake) Outland, revealed that the city has already set a new record for building permits within a calendar year, with a month and a half remaining in 1962.

## 35 Yrs Ago-Nov. 16, 1967

Lillard Insurance and Real Estate has announced the opening of Welch Acres Addition housing project in northeast Friona. The project is slated to build 40 FHA homes. The addition is planned, engineered, FHA approved, and is restricted as to the type of homes which can be built in the area. The Lillard project is the largest for Friona in several years. Welch Acres is an 80-acre addition in northeast Friona which was brought into the city in 1966. Nelson Welch is the developer.

Ideal harvest weather continued to smile on Friona area farmers this week, as harvest operations continued on all fronts, although harvest of what appears to be a record grain sorghum crop is just about complete.

## 30 Yrs Ago-Nov. 16, 1972

The Friona Chieftains will close out a successful but sad football season on Friday, when they travel to Morton for the final grid game for 1972. By winning, the Chiefs can equal their all-time best season record of 8-2. They also would claim the best season record among district teams, as Littlefield, the district champion, already has finished with a 7-2-1 record.

The Friona High School FFA farm skills team won first place in the Area I Contest last Saturday, and will compete in the state meet Saturday at Huntsville. On the team are Ronnie McLellan, Charles Wilkins, Mitchell Wiseman, Kevin Welch and Gene Strickland. Fathers of two of the boys, McLellan and Strickland, were on former state finalist teams.

## 25 Yrs Ago-Nov. 13, 1977

As of Friday, November 11, 17,451 bales of cotton had been ginned in Parmer County.

The Friona Chieftains were shooting for at least a share of the District 3-AA football championship Friday night when the team traveled to Olton for the final regular season game of 1977. Entering play Friday, three teams, the Chieftains, Muleshoe, and Littlefield, were tied for the district's top spot with 3-1 records.

## 20 Yrs Ago-Nov. 14, 1982

The Friona Chieftain Marching Band received a "Division I" rating at the annual University Interscholastic League marching competition last Monday in Lubbock. All three musicians judging the UIL marching event gave the Friona band a Division I (superior) rating.

A tremendous defensive performance by the River Road Wildcats in the second half overcame a 14-12 Friona halftime lead, and knocked the Chieftains out of the playoffs Friday night in Hereford. River Road defeated the Chieftains 26-17.

## 15 Yrs Ago-Nov. 14, 1987

One of the latest killing freezes in a number of years finally called a halt to the growing season locally on Tuesday morning, November 10, when the mercury dropped to a low of 18 degrees.

The temperature fell below the freezing mark again on Wednesday and Thursday mornings, falling to 23 degrees on Thursday.

Gammon lived in Parmer County since 1929. He graduated from Lazbuddie High School in 1941. He served on the Parmer County Hospital Board.







# Out Here

"The Last Reunion"

It was 984 miles round-trip. A long way to drive for a 45-year class reunion. "Dear Ol' Hillsboro High" is not the same but then nothing is the same as it was 45 years ago. I took my mother along as we returned to the scene of my childhood and where she had spent the first 50-years of her life.

My main reason for going was not to see the classmates who would be there. In fact, several of the 1957 graduates who still live in Hillsboro did not attend any homecoming activities.

Out of a class of 67, about 25 showed up at the Saturday afternoon reception at the old Katy Depot. Like Friona, citizens of Hillsboro moved their depot from beside the railroad tracks over near the courthouse square.

I spent many hours in the Katy Depot as a child. My folks had mail contracts and every day and every night we would haul mail down to be loaded on passing trains. The depot had coal fired stoves and white and colored restrooms in those days.

But the Saturday of my reunion, the classmates gathered to talk mostly about their health, or lack of it. One of my teen friends, Gail, who was always perky and full of fun, was in the first stages of Alzheimers they said. She sat quietly, still smiling, but not acknowledging any memories.

Others spoke of being widowed, or their latest replacement operation. They compared notes on triple bypasses. Another carried a portable oxygen tank.

There was no enthusiasm for being together again it seemed. Most of them didn't look like the pictures in the yearbooks we brought along.

I went to see two people. My basketball teammate Al Podsednik and our coach, David "Diz" Dewitt. Coach Dewitt is 79 now and is blessed with good health and is still of very sharp mind and memory and sense of humor.

Al and I had asked the coach to get a key to the old gym we played in. It is still standing but is not used as a gym anymore. We wanted to go inside and listen to the crowd noise, and hear coach yelling from the sidelines and smell the musty old uniform smell that we knew so well.

Our class graduated in this gym. It has a stage at one end, and had openings at the other end we would often fall through on a fast break. I received my diploma right up there behind the south backboard.

We left the depot gathering early. We parked behind the old red building, which is now painted beige, and went in a side door near the locker room where wood and wire cages served as our lockers.

It was an eerie, but inspiring moment when we stepped inside. A big chunk of our lives had been spent right there. After school, before school, during games and practices, we played basketball.

We found a couple of basketballs in a small office behind the stage. Al challenged me to a game of horse. We had played a million games of horse before. Neither of us exactly knocked the bottom out of the net this time.

It is a depth perception thing, Al said. Not to mention we could only get a few inches off the floor on

jump shots. It brought a smile to me to watch Al shoot the ball. He was always a better shooter than I was, but this time it didn't matter.

For a couple of hours we hung out at the old gym. Talking, telling stories, listening to Coach Dewitt's banter about basketball in those days and how we usually took a back seat to football.

He talked about our yo-yo drills, and the Drake shuffle and recalled details of district games won and lost. It was an amazing experience and one I will always cherish.





## Lazbuddie Robotics Team Advances in Competition

## Texas Forest Service Sells Windbreak Trees

A tree standing alone adds a certain aesthetic quality to rural living. But the systematic planting of trees and shrubs in a windbreak becomes a management tool that effects every aspect of a farm or ranch, says Texas Forest Service Official.

Now is the time for Texas landowners to order windbreak seedlings produced by the Texas Forest Service West Texas Nursery in Lubbock, before preferred stock is sold out, says Brian Scott, Texas Forest Service forester.

Windbreaks protect the soil, increase land value and create habitat for a variety of wildlife species. But producing a high performance windbreak requires more than just planting a line of trees.

Prior to planting a windbreak, landowners should determine; the area or structure in need of protection; tree species adaptable to the planting region; and the planting dimensions of the break. A planting dimension, such as proper spacing, prevents crowding and reduces tree stress, which also decreases insect and disease susceptibility thus extending the life of the windbreak. Generally, each tree row should be planted 20 feet apart with a 10 to 25-foot spacing between each tree

within a row. When designing a windbreak Scott also recommends planting multiple rows of evergreens and deciduous trees and shrubs. The purpose of the windbreak dictates the number of rows required.

Each row within a multiple row windbreak serves as a backup in case one row is lost to pest damage or other casualties. Generally, insects and diseases are confined to a specie.

Also, within the multiple row structure, a deciduous tree row will provide early protection. Deciduous trees are faster growing than evergreens, which are the backbone of multiple row windbreaks.

Species diversity in a multiple row windbreak also enhances aesthetics with foliage that changes with the seasons (depending on the species).

A single row of trees may suffice for a period, but a multiple-row windbreak established with the recommended dimensions can serve for a lifetime.

### Got Investment Losses? Make Them Work For You

If your investment goals are long term—sending children to college, planning a comfortable retirement, providing a legacy for the next generation—you probably adhere to a long-term investment philosophy.

But, a buy-and-hold strategy doesn't necessarily mean owning a stock forever. At some point, you may decide to sell a stock because it no longer meets your diversification needs, or because the underlying company has lost its competitive position within its industry. And, on occasion, you might sell a stock because its price has fallen so far that it may never recover. Whatever your reason for selling a stock, you'll want to get as much benefit from the losses as possible.

Fortunately, you've got an ally—the U.S. tax code. Your investment losses are tax-deductible, to a point. You can use your capital losses to offset any capital gains you have, plus up to \$3,000 of other income, including earned income. So, for example, if you realized a \$2,000 capital gain this year from selling stocks or other appreciated investments, you could write off up to \$5,000 in losses. And you can carry forward any "excess" losses for future years.

In fact, because so many investors have realized more losses than they can write off in a single year, Congress is considering increasing the amount of losses that can be deducted annually. What happens if you'd like to write off some losses, but you still want to hang on to the stock that caused them? If you sell the stock, and then buy it back within 30 days, you can deduct the losses, because you'd be violating the IRS' "wash-sale" rule. You could sell the stock, wait for 30 days, and then repurchase it—but you'd run the risk of having the stock's price rebound in the meantime.

As an alternative, you could sell the stock and immediately reinvest your proceeds in a similar company. As long as you're not investing in a stock that is "substantially identical" to the one you sold, you can generally avoid the wash-sale rule.

Nonetheless, you'll want to consult with your tax advisor and investment professional before making any of these types of moves. You'll probably never wish for your stocks to decline, but, if it happens, you can use the losses to brighten your tax season a bit—and that's always good news.



# Chieftains Blank 'Lopes 55-0; Roar Into Playoffs

Scoring on their first four possessions and five of six in the first half, the Chieftains blasted Abernathy, 55-0 last Friday at Abernathy.

The win made a statement and propelled the Chieftains into the playoffs for the seventh consecutive season and eighth time in nine years, extending the school record.

The team was balanced about as well as you can get in scoring, with seven different players having touchdowns. The only player to score twice was by a reserve, Sergio Saenz, who got his TDs while the Chieftain bench came in to finish the game and avoid injury to the starters.

The Chieftains scored their biggest shutout win and victory margin since 1985 (see separate story).

Friona needed only four plays to take the lead. After Nathan Haile gave the team a pair of first downs, quarterback Brock Field kept the ball, following his blockers and zig-zagging his way 41 yards for a touchdown.

Brian Wiseman kicked his first of seven straight PAT kicks, and Friona led, 7-0 with just 2:16 expired in the quarter.

Abernathy was three plays and out, and Adam Bandy partially blocked the Antelope punt. Friona took over on the home team's 21.

Friona ran the ball six times. Haile got the call on fourth and two from the Antelope three, and crashed into the end zone for Friona's second score.

Wiseman's kick made it 14-0 with 5:28 remaining in the first quarter.

Cody Grimsley and Eduardo Godoy sacked the Antelope quarterback, and the Abernathy kicking game again gave Friona a short field to work with.

The snap to their punter sailed over his head, and Friona took over on the Abernathy seven.

Two plays later, senior Adam Bandy danced into the end zone. Wiseman's kick made it a 21-0 game with 2:30 left in the first.

Abernathy made its initial

first down after the kickoff, and had the ball at their 29.

But three plays later safety Jason Gutierrez stepped in front of a pass, snagging it at his 33. The speedster raced all the way to the Abernathy 20 before he could be tackled—a nice 48-yard return, which earned him 12th place on the all-time list of interception returns.

Three plays later, Corbin Neill became the fourth different Chieftain to find the end zone, on a two-yard run. Wiseman remained perfect, and Friona's lead became 28-0, and only 49 seconds had elapsed in the second quarter.

Field hit Bandy for ten yards to the Abernathy 41. However, a holding penalty stopped Friona's scoring spree, forcing their first punt. Field had a "seeing eye" kick that was killed at the Antelope three, playing a role in the team's next score.

Following a short punt,

Friona sailed 33 yards in three plays. Field ran 18 yards for a first down, and then passed to Heath Gammon in the end zone for a ten-yard touchdown play.

Wiseman booted his fifth straight, and Friona's halftime lead was 35-0.

So much had Friona dominated the first half that Abernathy had minus five yards total offense at the intermission.

Abernathy received the second half kick, but fumbled on their second play. Grimsley picked up the loose ball and ran it 17 yards into the end zone for a defensive touchdown. Wiseman obliged, and the score became 42-0, with exactly a minute gone in the third.

Abernathy picked up a rare first down, but two plays later T.J. Randolph recovered a fumble and Friona was back in business.

With reserves taking over,

they marched quickly downfield, and Sergio Saenz, who gained 28 yards on the drive, ran it in from four yards out. Wiseman hit his seventh straight kick, and the score advanced to 49-0 with 3:49 left in the third.

Three plays after the kickoff, Daniel Aguilar got an interception and Friona took over on the Abernathy 35.


Only five plays later, Saenz got his second TD on a five-yard run. Reserve QB Willy Castillo had a 20-yard run in the drive.

Aided by 45 yards in penalties, the 'Lopes marched to the Friona four, but a goal-line stand preserved the shutout.



# Chieftain Playoff Run: Eight Times In 9 Years

The 2002 Friona Chieftain football team has extended Friona's school record of making it to the playoff round for the seventh consecutive season, and eighth time in nine years.

In the past nine years, Friona's combined record is 103 games played (at least 104 after Friday), an average of 11.6 games per season. Going into the bi-district game against Canadian Friday, the nine-year record is 79 wins against 23 losses and one tie, a winning percentage of 77.2%.

In the past seven years, the Chieftains have appeared in 82 games, 83 as of Friday, an average of 11.9 games per season, having won 65 games and lost 17, a winning percentage of 79.3%.

In the five-year period of 1996 through 2000, Friona compiled a 52-9 record, winning 85.2 per cent of their games. This is an average of 12.2 games per season.

In the past eight years, Friona has appeared in 13 playoff games, winning six and losing seven. During that time span, FHS has won five district titles, in 1994, 1996, 1997, 1999 and 2000.

When James Morton coached the 1994 Chieftains to their district title, it marked the first football championship since 1965--a 29-year "drought." Morton went on to coach the 1996 and 1997 Friona teams to district titles (both years unbeaten in district) before accepting the position as head coach at Lubbock Monterey.

James Morton leads all Friona coaches with his three district titles.

Mike Scott coached the Chieftains to district titles in 1999 (5-0) and 2000 with a 6-0 district record.

The 1996 Chieftain team is the record-holder for winning the most games in a season, 13. The Chiefs ran off 13 consecutive wins that season after opening their season by losing to Littlefield, 21-14. The team lost to Tatum in the state semi-finals at Texas Stadium in Irving.

The '96 team also holds the record for most playoff wins in a season, four. In the five seasons since 1996, FHS has managed only two wins against five losses in post-season. The 1999 and 2000 teams, coached by Mike Scott, had 10-2 records both years,

and advanced to the area round of the playoffs.

The '99 Chieftains beat River Road, 23-21 in a bi-district game at Dimmitt, but lost to Crane in the area round, 43-16. The 2000 team beat West Texas High, 55-14 in bi-district, for the team's biggest playoff win ever. But the team suffered a 29-7 loss in their area round game to Olney, played at Childress.

Prior to 1994, Friona had appeared in only seven total playoff games, dating back to 1926. Friona's first playoff win was in 1986, when the Chieftains under Tommy Moss beat Perryton, 14-10 on a late score at Dick Bivins Stadium in Amarillo, and advanced to the area round, where they lost a heart-breaker to Kermit, 15-13, on a late "wobbly" field goal.

## Squaws Open Season With Wins At Hart

The Friona Squaws' varsity and junior varsity teams opened their 2002-03 seasons at Hart with a pair of easy wins.

The varsity team won their game, 69-30, and the JV girls won, 74-24.

Ashley Smiley began the first quarter by hitting three shots from the field, and added free throws onto two of the baskets. Amy Murphree chipped in a pair of field goals and was two of two at

the line, as the Squaws grabbed an 18-7 lead.

Mandy Gerles, V'Lesha Wilcox and Miss Smiley each scored a pair of baskets in the second quarter; Miss Murphree was three of four at the line; Holley Hand and Lindsay North had free shots as Friona opened up a 37-18 lead.

Back from intermission, Trisha Winebrinner scored a pair of baskets and a free throw after one of her goals, while Misses North and Murphree added baskets, sparking the Squaws to a 47-25 lead.

Miss Murphree canned four baskets and Miss Hand had a pair. Andrea Gerles, Haleigh Herbert, Misses Winebrinner and Wilcox scored single baskets as the Squaws coasted to the win.

At the November 7-9 tournament at Adrian, the girls won second place.


They won their first game 40-29 over the Vega 8th grade, then beat the Vega 7th grade 42-16.

Scoring in the final game were: Fernando Moreno on a 65-yard TD run and Octavio Moreno added the 2-point conversion.



## FSA Needs Emergency Loan Apps

"Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by severe drought and excessive temperatures that occurred from January 01, 2002 and continuing are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Farwell, Texas," Thomas S. Taylor, said today.

Parmer County is one of 122 counties in Texas that were recently named by the Secretary of Agriculture eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought.


"Thomas S. Taylor said farmers may be eligible for loan of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent."

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Thomas S. Taylor said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until June 23, 2003, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Thomas S. Taylor said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farms who are U.S. citizens and farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FSA office in Farwell is open from 8:00 am to 4:30 pm Monday through Friday.

## 55-Point Win Margin Third Largest At FHS

Last Friday's 55-point win by the Chieftains at Abernathy was the third largest win margin we could find by searching Friona's past football records.

The 55-0 win was the largest score by a Chieftain team since a 68-0 win over Bovina in 1985. Previously, the Chieftains inaugurated a new scoreboard with a bang, drubbing Tucumcari, N.M., 68-0, in the 1968 home opener.

The Abernathy score and margin may be the biggest district win by FHS. The 1998 Chieftains had beaten Lubbock Roosevelt, 58-6, a 52-point margin, a couple of years after the 1996 Chieftains outscored Sanford-Fritch, 56-6.

A 1952 game didn't make the list, but for sheer numbers, it bears mention. The Chiefs beat Anton, 61-33 that season, and the 94 points may be a one-game record. We haven't found one higher.

## Bivins Seeks 'Space Scholar Applicants


