Four Injured Seriously In Highway Accident Near Here Early Tuesday

Four persons were injured early today in a head-on collision between two automobiles on U. S. Highway 80 approximately three miles east of Cisco near the Joy Drive-in Theater. The injured, all of them non-residents of Cisco, were rushed to a local hospital in a Thomas ambulance. Most serious injured were Mr. and Mrs. Sanford S. Herman, who live at 2026 East 107th, Cleveland, Ohio. Hospital attendants reported that the full extent of their injuries could not be determined for some time, but each was suffering from head and internal injuries. Mrs. Herman also suffered multiple cuts and bruises. J. Edwin Conaway of Memphis and E. C. Schnake of Fort Worth were less seriously injured but each suffered broken legs and possibly other injuries. The accident occurred when

a car occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Herman met in a head-on collision with a car occupied by the two men. Both cars, a 1948 Plymouth and a 1948 Ford convertible were demolished.

The car occupied by Conaway and Schnake was enroute from Abilene to Fort Worth when the accident occurred. Mr. and Mrs. Herman had not regained consciousness and attendants or investigators were unable to get their version of the mishap.

Mr. Conaway and Mr. Schnake travel for the New York Belting and Packing Company.

Tonight at 7 o'clock the doors of the new community center building will swing open and the building will be dedicated to the youth of the community for their use as a sports center; and to the city as a whole for its use as a place to foster civic improvement.

A short dedication ceremony has been planned by civic leaders, and school officials have scheduled three basketball games in which three of the town cage teams will see action against visiting teams from neighboring cities.

The Lobo Queens, newly organized girls basketball team, will lead off in a game with a girls team from Olden. Following the opening game, the Lobos and the Wranglers will contest teams from Eastland and from Howard Payne. All three games should be closely contested and will afford cage fans an enjoyable evening.

The new building is the result of careful planning by civic minded citizens in close cooperation with school officials. A committee headed by Charles J. Kleiner worked long hours in making the erection of the gym possible. J. L. Black and Sons, who were the contractors on the job, have worked day and night to finish the building ahead of schedule.

With the opening of the doors tonight local citizens will view for the first time a building valued between \$60,000 and \$70,000 completed at a cost of less than \$22,000—made possible by the liberal contributions of many of the citizens. The original drive fell short of the goal set and a drive is now in progress for additional funds to help pay added costs. Officials urged all Ciscoans to visit the building to night and to see for themselves what has been accomplished.

School Lunch Room Visitors Week Is Proclaimed

In order that parents and others who are interested in the School Lunch Program may become better acquainted with the operation and importance of this program, the State Superintendent has proclaimed the week of December 13th as school lunch visitors' week throughout Texas.

Parents must notify their child's teacher on the day they are going to be a visitor and pay 25 cents for the meal. Since 1946 the Cisco Lunch Room has paid off all indebtedness and participation has increased from 330 to 415 daily average. In spite of the high cost of food, charges have been reduced and the following improvements made:

1. New arrangement of lunch room and kitchen for convenience and time saving.
2. All interiors cleaned and painted, with curtains and pot plants added for attractiveness.
3. Storage room provided with shelving and ventilation.
4. Hot water heater, washing vats and better stoves installed.
5. New stainless steel spoons and forks and plates and glasses provided.
6. Electric kitchen clocks and dish service counter installed.
7. New dining tables built throughout and large steam pan added to keep food hot until served.

The lunch room supervisor said: "We are looking forward to the time when the High School Lunch Room can be made into a comfortable dining room for the students with booths and all modern accommodations. Of course this cannot be done until the present band hall is vacated and the band moved into their new building." "The School Lunch Room Management is very grateful for the cooperation of the parents, students and teachers in making our School Lunch Room one of the best in the county, and wish for everyone a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year."

Wrangler Cagers to Figure Strongly In Deciding WJCC Conference Winner

With one tournament trophy already shelved, Coach Stormy Davis forecast the past week that Cisco Junior College is going to have to be counted in not overlooked, as a strong contender for the Western Junior College Conference cage title.

Proclaiming this year's team as the most deceptive, best balanced, and filled to the brim with numerous prospects, Coach Davis, former basketball coach at Paducah, has seen his Wrangler cagers prance down the courts on four separate encounters, flashing impressive and promising ball maneuvering.

Not that the Wranglers are standouts over other conference rivals, but Davis is ready to contend that the Cisco cagers can stand up to the others no matter how powerful the pressure.

On paper Davis' quintet would appear to be a third rate team since he has only three returning lettermen, Jack Leveredge, Spec Tompkins and Charles Adair, but newcomers to the squad with plenty of height and skill on the courts will boost Cisco's power.

At center Davis can rely on his tallest man, Jerry Walker, of Rising Star, who towers at 6 foot 6 inches, to hold his own both on defense and offense.

Another bidder for honors is Leonard Grigsby, forward, whose arched layups turned Hillsboro and Temple back with stunning defeats, 52-50 and 54-38, respectively. In doing so, it enabled the Wranglers to sack up the Clifton Tournament there last week.

Aside from Temple and Hillsboro, Davis' five has given up the blackboard to Decatur, 38-29, and to Big Spring, "But," rules Davis, "the percentage scoring for us has spiraled skyward since our first contest, an indication that the Ciscoans are developing into an explosive combination.

Davis is looking forward to one game at the present. And that is the return match with Decatur. The Ciscoans suffered great humiliation in the first contest, since it was the Wranglers who fired the court, then at the last minute then lagged long enough to allow the opposers to whiz past in an upsetting fashion.

With an average height of 5 feet and 11 inches, Davis will send Spec Tompkins, voted all-Will Johnston, at guards, Leonard Grigsby and Marvin Lewis at forwards as starting line-up against Howard Payne's B-squad Tuesday night.

At replacements Jack Jack

Leveredge Chas. Adair, Bobby Travis, Jerry Walker and Harold Sides may get into the fray before time rolls out, said Davis.

The game will be one of three sport events staged in celebration of the opening of the city's new Community Center building.

The Wrangler squad boasting 21 cagers, will officially open the season with Decatur there January 3 and will play the first home game here January 6. More than 12 matches have been listed for this year's conference war.

Famed Fire Hose Load Originated By Cisco Department; Honors Bestowed

Ciscoans, like most Texans, like to boast of their forebearers' achievements in a pressing and reluctant world, the progress of the community, and, in general, let the rest of the outside know "just what's coming off is the hometown."

Here in Cisco, population 8,466, pictured in the minds of local citizens as a typical "Main Street U. S. A.," members of the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department share a big portion of the home town's fame and recognition in the back logs of the town's corner stones.

The story of our own fire department's contribution to the prevention of inexcusable destruction to homes, factories and national resources is an all-important factor to fire combatants nation-wide.

Back in the year 1918, Fire-Chief Bob Bettis and a slim company of firemen set out to conquer a conviction they upheld—that fire hose, somehow, in a set pattern could be rigged up in the hose department so as to enable the hose, some 200 feet including connections to be reeled off with accuracy and speed in the event of an emergency—free from kinks and knots.

Up to that period of time, firemen from the broad expanse of America were being confronted with the perplexing problem of a twisted and tangled hose when needed for use in a critical time. In quelling fires, time and precision are valuable with no lag lag, firemen will say.

On an average alarm, for instance, as many as three trouble-shooters were needed to manage the rear end of the truck whose sole duty it was to keep the hose, as it was being pulled from the layout, from binding.

On paper there is no way of telling how much added damage befell what ever was being ravaged by fire, since time, fighting implements and firemen, combined, were handicapped by "minor details" in the conflict.

For two years or longer, Chief Bettis' station boys puzzled, sweating out long and tedious hours of devising the new pattern. Many were discarded and time after time failure seemed at hand.

One summer night in the back street of the fire house, months later, the puzzle was solved. Before pronouncing their success and accomplishment, the "fire house gang" tore it apart, ran back through it fold after fold and searched

every bend and connection for possible flaws. There were none. It had been found with perfection, no changes were necessary.

At that time, Chief Bettis' boys perhaps didn't realize the importance of its uncovering and neither did anyone else. To them it was something a little bit better, but as the years rolled on, the Cisco Skid Load, so named for its true and exact manner, has proved to be a strong and never bending rival to lesser loads.

Since then the Cisco Load has been adopted by 90 percent of the fire companies in Texas and is being inaugurated by many other steadily throughout the land, an indication that the Ciscoans' invention is fast becoming formalized.

Foreseeing its possibilities, the Cisco Load has been patented by the Oklahoma A&M Department of Trade and Industrial and is being taught to hundreds of firemen in the southwest at the Texas A&M firemen's school held annually on the campus. It is listed in the official director's manual for improved methods for fighting fires in a modern and skillful way.

Lt. Col. H. R. Brayton, former army head of all arsenals in the United States, now instructor at the Aggie school, has this to say of the Cisco Load: "The popularity of the Cisco Load is due to its ease of loading and the manner in which it plays out the hose body, plus the fact that it furnished two lines of hose, usually 150 feet each, free from twists and kinks, at the fire."

Large companies in New York City, San Francisco and Chicago utilize the Cisco Load, but (here's the brag) are rather shy in telling those concerned of its origin.

She is survived by her sons, R. O. Fenley and Roy Fenley of Cisco. Also surviving are seven grandchildren.

Pallbearers will be Kent Word, J. O. Warren, Emmett Green, C. E. Hailey, Olie Reynolds and John Whisenant.

Brother of Local Woman Dies

Jones, a native of San Angelo, was in the insurance business and secretary to the Federal Building and Loan Association. He was a deacon and member of the First Baptist Church. He is survived by his wife, sister of the Ciscoans, and three sons and daughters.

Mr. and Mrs. Farquhar left Cisco Monday to attend the funeral services to be conducted there at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon.

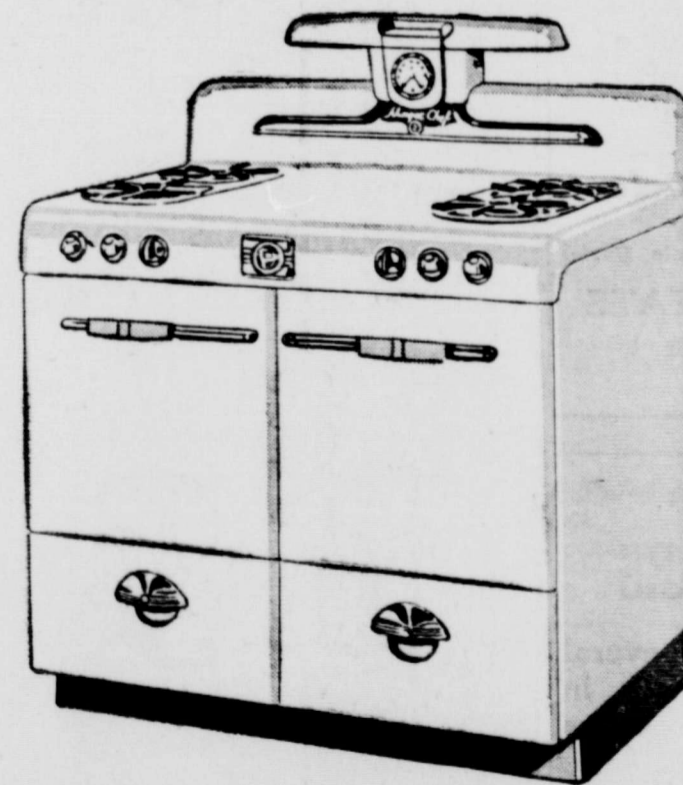

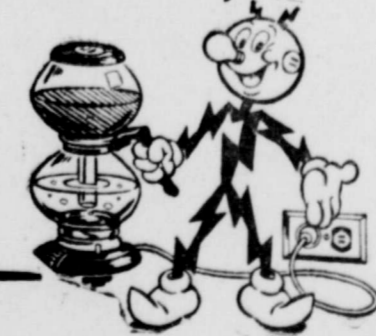
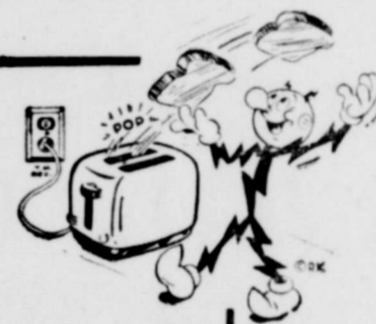
