Reports Point to Less Meat

Harry G. Williams, head of Agricultural Department Stock News Marketing Service in Kansas City, said Thursday that all records point to a drop in beef production in 1949. Williams continued, however, that the greater supply of hogs will be enough to maintain meat for next year as has the same per capita available this year.

Synthetic Rubber Being Improved

American research ingenuity helped the war-time synthetic rubber to where it is now more durable than natural rubber for passenger tires, rubber experts believe. New materials, known as "synthetic" because it is manufactured at a temperature of 41 degrees Fahrenheit and treated with 122 degrees of heat during its production, is still undergoing tests. A few auto tires with the new material are reaching the market, but the supply will be small until next year.

Greatest Gift Is Saving a Life

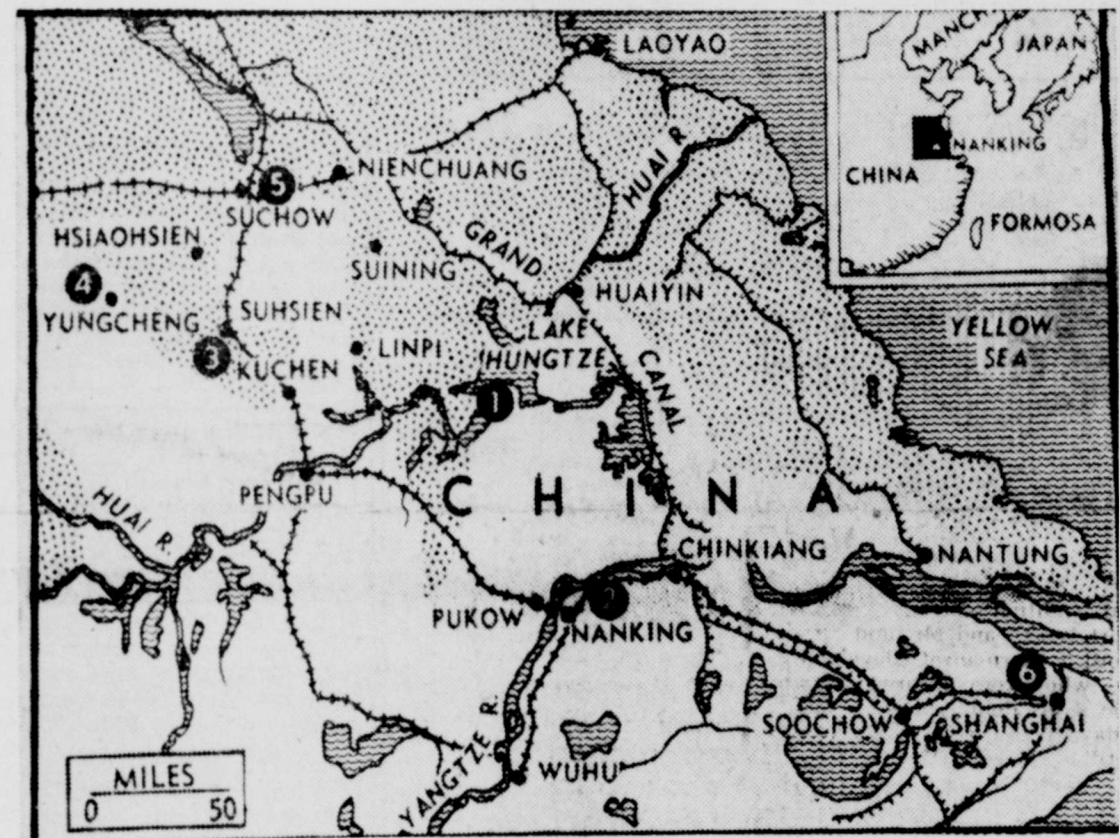
