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#### STATE SALARIES LAG

It is becoming increasingly difficult to maintain efficiency in the state's government. "That is because the best qualified applicants are no longer interested in state jobs," says W. P. Watts, Exe-

"State salaries have lagged far behind both the rise in the cost of living and the rise in income of all other groups of wage earners," Watts pointfed out. While the average employee of the state has received an increase in salary of 17-2 per cent since 1939, other wages," Watts declared, "have climbed as follows:

"Finance, insurance, and real estate, 49 per cent; transportation, communication, and public utilities, 95 per cent; services, 102 per cent; mining, 103 per cent; wholesale, 120 per cent; manufacturing, 121 per cent; construction, 186 per cent."
