# Fifteen County Students in SMU; **Five From Cisco**

DALLAS, Dec. 27. - Fifteer Cisco and Eastland County stu lacerations about the face and dents are attending Southern neck. His condition was termed Methodist University this year, according to an enrollment report issued by the SMU registrar. Eastland County is one of the 194 Texas counties represented on SMU campus. Total number of

students is 5,730. Out-of-state students are from the District of Columbia and all states except Idaho, Maine and Nevada. Thirtynine are from 15 foreign countries.

Religious faiths on the SMU campus number33, represented by 6,163 students. Methodists predominate with 2,613. Baptists follow with 1.255.

Presbyterians total 652; Catholics 417; Episcopalians, 331; Christians, 277; and Mem bers of the Church of Christ, 155 Listing no religious membership or preference were 526 students. SMU has adopted a new expansion program involving \$15 million, of which \$10 million will endw scholarships and professorships. Already under construction are the \$2 million Fondren Hall of Science and the \$3 million Perkins School of Theo-


