Patterson Suggests Honors For America's War Dead

Letter to Editor

Dear Editor:

As we remember our veterans on this Veterans' Day, let us set the day aside to honor our war dead. Not those of a particular division nor of a particular war, rather all those soldiers who have lost their lives in American wars.

How can we honor those who, by their devotion, and by the gallantry of their passing, have so honored our nation?

The most they would ask of us to do would be to remember them clearly in their great and generous youth, among their companions as a part of an American brotherhood, pledged to desperately hazardous adventure.

And this, indeed, is the least we can do.

Those of us who were in the fighting know well the meaning of "life in the combat zone." Those who did not come back with us would well wish that we not forget that they, too, were of our company.

Indeed, their sacrifices were the glory of our forces. They felt the heat, the rain, the sleet and the snow. The monsoons of Burma, the sandstorms of the Sahara were no strangers to them. The snows of the Ardennes foxholes, filled with icy mud; marches which carried them forward to deployment against a waiting enemy to offer again and yet again their lives, these were their daily portions.

The armies that fought at Belleau Woods, at Saint Lo, on the shoulders of the Bulge, thereby added brilliant pages to the history of American arms, were of this stamp.

In a democracy such as ours, there is no magic process which turns a citizen into a skilled and determined comrade. The moral qualities which a man possesses are not affected by the shift from civilian to military clothing.

The men were what they always had been: American farmers, schoolboys, factory workers, and from the thousands of professions which make up America.

They had nothing to do with the events which led this nation into its wars. The greatest wish of each was for peace and security and an opportunity to shape unrestrainedly his life in fruitful fashion in his own well-loved country.

But in this time of peril, he did not recoil. He sought the place which his moral qualities demanded that he seek.

The pride which he came to feel in the performance of his company could never leave him. That he would be of the select to which his comrades could and would point with pride was then his greatest wish. That death should visit his ranks often, he knew was logical and inevitable.

He hoped that from his efforts, his endurance and travail,

THE GREAT AMERICAN electorate sent a message this past Tuesday, and they sent it loud and clear.

Having suffered through two terms of the Clinton White House, whose motto was "Anything Goes," we had about decided that folks who are the age of Ye Editor (and perhaps older) would never be fully represented, the way we would like to be, on the federal level again.

Having watched with horror the way the Clintons flaunted their ungodly attitudes and lifestyle, we had decided it might be too late to reclaim our country, especially after Clinton was re-elected in 1996.

We at least were heartened in 2000 when George W. Bush was elected, but it was only a partial victory. Just a few months into his administration, President Bush was the victim of a political dirty trick when a Republican senator announced he was changing parties.

Having been elected with a 50-50 headcount of Demos and Republications in the U.S. Senate, Bush was able to operate for a time with V.P. Dick Cheney breaking tie votes to assist the president's programs.

The "turncoat" put the Demos back in power in the Senate, and President Bush's agenda has been held hostage for most of his administration, with many of his nominations and legislation locked in committees, where the Democrat-controlled senate kept them from being acted upon.

In the months leading up to this week's election, the Democrats began to see the possibility of losing the senate, and didn't let details like election laws get in the way of their rush to control the congress.

First came the forced resignation of incumbent Demo senator Robert Torricelli of New Jersey, whose personal problems made his re-election doubtful.

Toricelli's resignation came after the deadline for changing names on the November ballot, but New Jersey Democrats ignored that, and moved to put a former senator, Frank Lautenberg, on the ballot. Over objections of the Republicans, the New Jersey Supreme Court ruled the move could stand.

Next came the fiasco following the accidental death of Minnesota senator Paul Wellstone--again much too late to legally change any ballots--or was it?

Demos used Wellstone's funeral service as a giant rally, and again changed the rules to suit themselves by replacing Wellstone's name with Walter Mondale's, less than 10 days prior to the election. Not only that--they made every effort to allow the early votes already received with the deceased's name checked to be re-voted.

The rank and file Minnesota voters restored our faith in fair play, when they gave (even in a longtime Democratic stronghold) the Republican challenger, Norm Coleman, a stunning win in the senate race.

The last time Mondale was in a race, he had carried only Minnesota and the District of Columbia in a landslide loss to Ronald Reagan. Tuesday, he didn't even carry his home state.

Bill Clinton tried his best to get Jeb Bush beaten in his gubernatorial race in Florida. First, his aged lezbo, former cabinet head Janet Reno ran in the Demo primary in Florida, but was soundly defeated.

The final weekend prior to November 5, both Clintons, along with AlGore showed up in Florida to "rally their troops" for Bush's Democratic opponent.

Guess what? Jeb Bush's win on Tuesday was probably the largest win margin any candidate enjoyed. Do you think many Demos will invite the Clintons, AlGore, etc., to come campaign for them after this week?

George W. Bush is a breath of fresh air in Washington, D.C. Americans finally have someone in the oval office they can trust. Bush has enjoyed the highest approval rating of any sitting president during the past year.

He has been given a majority in congress in spite of the most galling efforts of Democratic officials.

What did we used to say in grade school? Wasn't it "Cheaters never win?" Glad to see that the majority of American voters remembered that phrase on Tuesday and decided to show those who would "win at any cost" that they were tired of playing that game.

Note to Peter Jennings, Dan Rather and Tom Brokaw: Has it ever occurred to you that you just might be out of step with the rest of the country??

By mask-faced men with cadenced step.

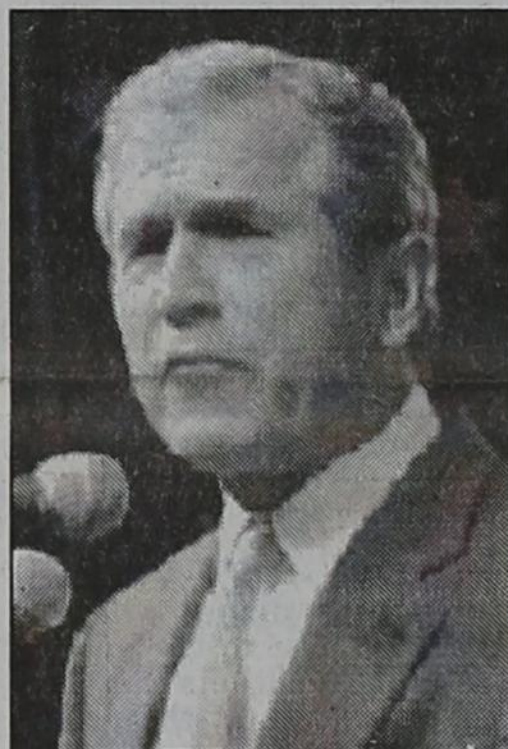
How many tears of grief are shed

In the city and county's largest precinct, 101 in Friona (Calvary Baptist Church) the voters gave Perry a 390-98 win over first-time candidate Tony Sanchez, in the governor's race. That amounted to 79 per cent for Perry to 20 per cent for Sanchez.

Libertarian Jeff Daiell received six votes and Rahul Mahajan (Green party) got two.

In Precinct 202 (Friona Community Center), Perry won the box, 77-18, an 80 per cent margin, to Sanchez's 19 per cent.

Precinct 402 (Friona Fire Station) contained most of Sanchez's supporters, and he carried the box with 61 votes, an even 50 per cent, to Perry's 58, which was 48 per cent of the precinct's votes. In early voting, which was heavily Friona voters, Perry won, 264-79.

County totals saw Perry with 1473 votes, 74 per cent,

to 477 for Sanchez, 24 per cent.

In the U.S. Senate race, John Cornyn won Precinct 101, over challenger Ron Kirk, 371-106, (77 per cent to 23 per cent).

Cornyn was also favored in Precinct 202, 80-11 (88 per cent to 12 per cent). Kirk did somewhat better in Precinct 402, getting 45 votes (39 per cent) to Cornyn's 70, (61 per cent).

In the county totals, Cornyn racked up 1454 votes (74 per cent), to Kirk's 455 (24 per cent). Kirk is the former Dallas mayor, becoming the first black candidate to seek the U.S. Senate seat in Texas.

Congressman Larry Combest, whose opposition was Libertarian Larry Johnson, coasted to a 95 per cent margin in Parmer County, 1678-85.

In the lieutenant governor's race, David Dewhurst led John Sharp in Friona 101, 323 to 158; Precinct 202 by 69-27, and the two split even in Precinct 402, 57 each. He also won the early votes, 211-134. County totals saw Dewhurst with 1236 votes to Sharp's 692.

For state Attorney General, Greg Abbott led the three Friona boxes, 512-157, the early vote, 248-86, and the county, 1415-458.

In the State Comptroller's race pitting Carole Keeton Rylander against Marty Akins, Friona voters liked the "one tough Grandma" to the tune of 564-107, or 84 per cent of the votes. Mrs. Rylander likewise won countywide, 1547-332, getting 82 per cent of the vote.

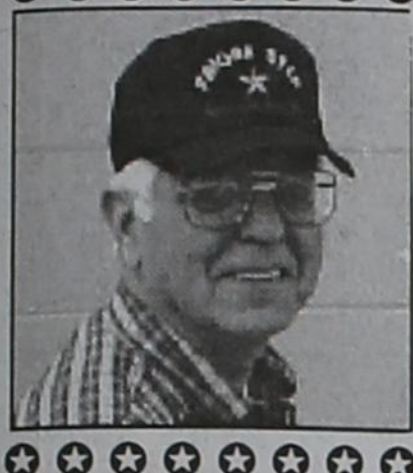

'Horns Escape With 33-21 District Win

The latest chapter of Friona's frustrating season found the Chieftains losing to visiting Lockney, 33-21 last Friday.

The game was played on a cold, wet Chieftain Field, which produced five fumbles.

Picked as a pre-season favorite to win district, now the Chiefs hope to win their final game to finish no worse than third.

Lockney fumbled the opening kickoff, and Friona recovered at the 23.

Nathan Haile gained eight, and Adam Bandy four as the Chieftains gained a first and goal at the Lockney nine.

On fourth down, Friona was at the Longhorn two. QB Brock Field rolled out, zipped a short pass to Haile, who caught it at the goal-line and dove across to give Friona first blood.

A less than perfect snap foiled the kick try, but Friona led 6-0 with only 2:46 gone in the game.

On Lockney's first series, the Lockney QB faded on second and 11, and a pair of Chieftain defenders closed in for a "sack," only to be avoided on a play that gained 19 yards and moved the Longhorns from what could have been inside their 20 to midfield.

The Horns proceeded to drive 71 yards on a 15-play drive which culminated on a nine-yard touchdown pass. Their kick gave Lockney a 7-6 lead with 1:58 left in the first.

After Jason Gutierrez returned the kick out to the Friona 29, Field hit Bandy for a first down at the 40.

On a big third down play, Field then hit Cody Grimsley over the middle for 20 yards, to the Longhorn 35.

Field hit Corbin Neill for five and three, but a fourth down pass fell incomplete and Lockney took over.

The visitors marched 70 yards in 13 plays, converting a third down and a fourth down enroute to their second score. Having thrown only four passes in their previous four games, the Horns got their second touchdown pass,

this one from 11 yards out, to take a 14-6 lead with 3:49 left in the half.

Friona answered the challenge. After Sergio Saenz returned to the 28, Field rambled 23 yards for a first down, and Friona got five more yards on a face mask violation.

The Chiefs caused Lockney to jump offside on a fourth and one, moving to the Longhorn 25.

Field then lofted a pass toward wide receiver Andy Carthel, who made a nice catch, just getting a foot down in the front corner of the end zone for a 25-yard touchdown play.

Field then pitched out to Haile, who ran it in for a two-pointer. Friona had tied the score at 14-all, with 42 seconds left in the half. Too bad they couldn't have taken more time in scoring.

Lockney gained 33 yards on a draw play with 25 seconds left, and then a 40-yard pass play gave Lockney their third passing TD, and a 21-14 halftime lead.

The visitors forced a punt to start the second half, taking over on Friona's 45.

Lockney took advantage of the short field, going 45 yards in ten plays. Their kick was wide, but the Horns had taken a 26-14 lead.

Friona drove to midfield, following the kickoff, on the running of Haile and a 21-yard pass to Bandy.

But a fourth down pass fell incomplete to stymie the drive.

The Horns then helped out by fumbling the ball, and Friona's Ty White recovered.

Field rolled out on the option, then tucked the ball and turned upfield. Forty-seven yards later, the junior signal-caller crossed the goal-line. Brian Wiseman's kick trimmed Lockney's lead to 27-21 with 21 seconds left in the third.

Lockney drove to the Friona 33, where the Chieftain defense dug in and held.

Field connected with Carthel for 26 yards to the Lockney 45, and Haile gave Friona a first down at the

Horns' 37. A holding penalty stalled the drive, and a third down pass was intercepted in the Lockney end zone.

Lockney drove 50 yards in only four plays for an insurance touchdown, hiking their lead to 33-21 with only 2:51 remaining.

The Chieftains picked up three first downs, driving to the Lockney 21 with time running out. Field was intercepted with 23 seconds left in the game.

PLAYOFFS ON THE LINE

FHS: Must-Win At Abernathy Friday

After suffering their stunning defeat to Lockney last Friday, the Chieftains now face a "must-win" situation when they travel to Abernathy Friday, in order to make the playoffs as the large school representative.

Abernathy, who won the district title last year with a senior-laden team at 6-0, faced a rebuilding year this season, with 13 lettermen back and four offensive and five defensive starters back.

The Antelopes also were hit a lick a couple of weeks ago when their leading rusher and scorer, junior running back Jared Brock, was injured and is out for the season. Abernathy finished last season with a 9-2 record, making the playoffs for their third straight season.

Coach Bob Ferguson's Chieftains, however, would like to make the post-season round for Friona's seventh straight season and eighth time in nine years.

"We can't take anything for granted. We'll have to play hard," he said, alluding to the tough time Friona has had winning games at Abernathy. Friona holds the lead overall against Abernathy, 11-8, but virtually all of the wins have been at Friona.

The Chieftains, meanwhile, are also trying to get hurt players healthy. Jason Gutierrez saw only limited action last week (ankle injury). Andy Carthel is playing with a hurt wrist, and tackle Joey Domingues has a broken hand.

However, all these are expected to play, since "there's no guarantee of a next game."

If Friona wins, they will play either Canadian or Sanford-Fritch if they win. Fritch lost their first two district games with players out of their lineup, but are back healthy now.

Ferguson said he felt that the team played well enough to win against Lockney. "We just had a couple of letdowns," he

said. "We could have used a couple of calls that we didn't get. When you're playing a team as tough as Lockney was, you have to take advantage of every break. (and get calls that you should have gotten-editor's note).

On Lockney's first "touchdown," it appeared to most fans, and particularly those on the sidelines, that the pass hit the intended receiver in the chest, was bobbled down to the ground, whereupon the player went down on his knees, in what is usually called a "trapped ball."

But the official trailing the play by a number of yards signalled "touchdown." That play, as well as the one earlier in the drive when the Chiefs could have sacked the Lockney quarterback, came back to haunt Friona.

Sanford-Fritch (5-4 season and 3-2 in District 6-2A) plays at Panhandle, currently leading District 6-2A with a 4-1 district record and 7-2 overall.

Canadian, the other team which Friona might face, has a 7-2 season record and stand 4-1 in district. The Wildcats host Boys Ranch in their regular-season finale. The Ranchers are mired in last place in the district at 0-5 and 3-6.

Lockney, with a 4-0 district record, hosts 2-2 Olton in their last regular season game. Floydada, 3-1, 7-2, hosts Hale Center (1-3, 2-7).

The two Floyd County teams will await the results in District 6-2A to know who they will play in post-season.

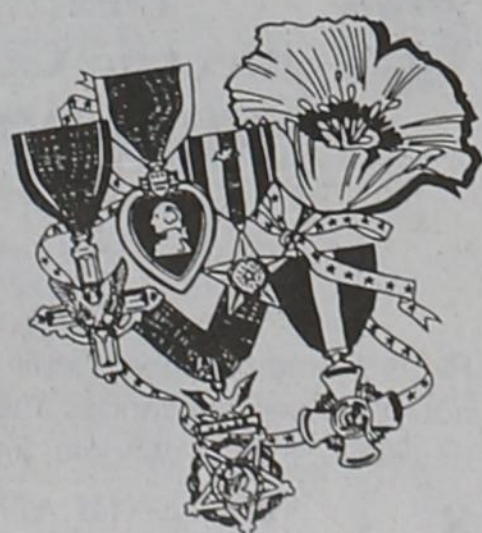

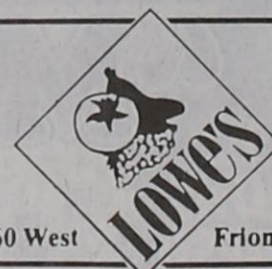

That his success brought world leadership to our nation was only a by-product of his labor could carry the accompanying burdens so

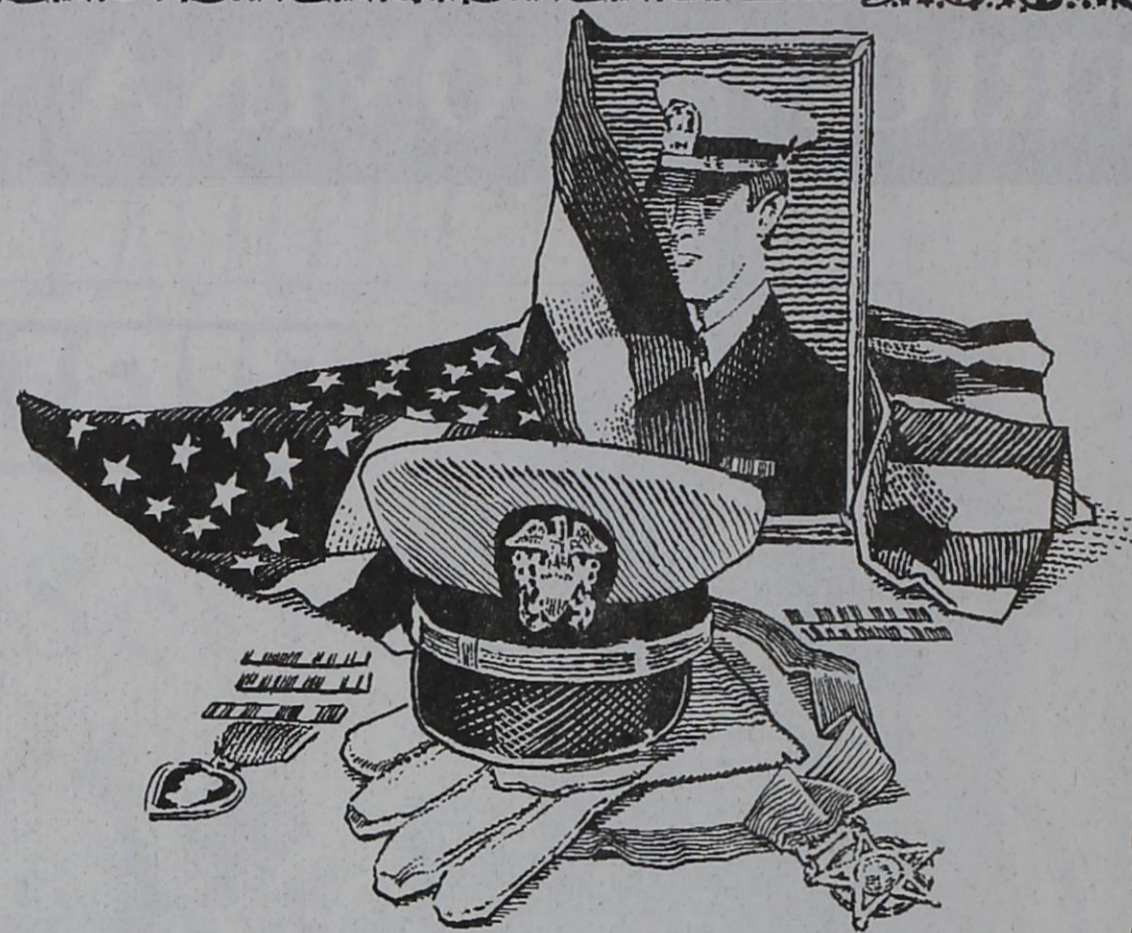
gallantly and as enduringly a he had carried his own long as America's sons were of the same rugged stamp and lasting worth as was he.

Greg Lewellen Receives Best Research Award

Two West Texas A&M University students participated in the Texas Society for Microscopy meeting held October 24-26 in Austin. Both competed with other Texas university students by presenting papers based on research they have conducted, and WTAMU captured the best research award.

Greg Lewellen, a senior biology major from Friona, was selected for the best student research award for his presentation titled "In vitro propagation of *Sesbania grandiflora*, a Tropical Legume." He will receive \$100 and a certificate from the president of the society for his accomplishments.

Lewellen conducts research under the supervision of Dr. Nabarun Ghosh, assistant professor of biology. His major interest is in tissue

culture of selected leguminous tree species used as a tool in biotechnology.

Brit Patten, a graduate student in biology from Clarendon, presented a paper titled "Assessment of pollen concentration in the atmosphere of the Texas Panhandle through the use of a Burkard volumetric spore trap." Ghosh said the judges appreciated both research presentations.

"I am extremely proud of both students' accomplishments in this field," Ghosh said. "It is wonderful to have two dedicated students interested in issues that affect the health and economy of the Texas Panhandle."

Ghosh said his lab focuses on two major areas of research. One is the concentration of aeroallergens in the Texas Panhandle, and the other concerns biotechnology and leguminous species that are economically important to farming in the Panhandle area.

YOUR EYES

Untreated Uveitis Causes Blindness

The condition called uveitis ranks third in the cause of blindness in the U.S. after diabetes and macular degeneration. Uveitis is the inflammation of the uvea or middle layer of the eye. The disease specifically affects one or more of three eye parts: the iris, or the colored part of the eye; the ciliary body behind the iris that produces the clear fluid; and the choroid that lines the outer white coat of the eyeball.

Symptoms include light sensitivity, blurring of vision, pain, eye redness and floaters or small specks that move across the field of vision. The condition can result from a virus, fungus, parasites or bacteria as well as trauma. Uveitis is seen in both children and adults of all ages.

Eye care professionals usually diagnose uveitis by using instruments that magnify and illuminate the eye. Because of possible serious long-term consequences, patients should visit a vision professional as soon as any symptoms occur. Medicated eye drops or steroid injections can eliminate the symptoms and risks associated with uveitis if caught in time.

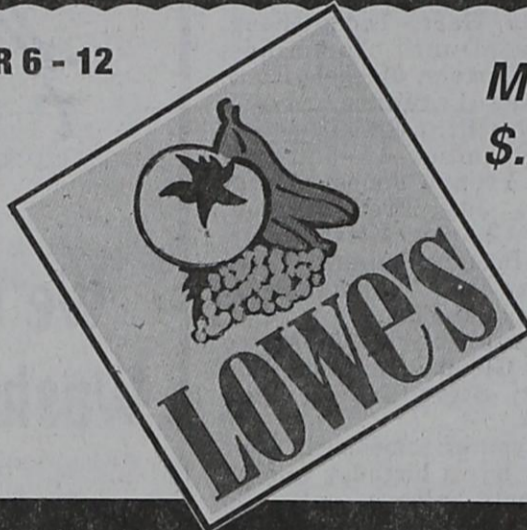
