Ahh!! Sweet Revenge

Resurgent Lobos Trounce Highly Spirited Breckenridge Bucks, 48-22

Displaying a brand of basketball seldom seen in high school circles the Cisco Lobos Friday night avenged themselves for every defeat handed them by the Breckenridge Buckaroos when they completely out-played, out-manuevered and overwhelmed the Bucks, 48-22.

What took place at the City gymnasium Friday night could have easily matched any Southwest Conference basketball game. More than 200 fans who witnessed the spine-tingling onslaught would have told you that. It was a basketball game for the books. Cisco's high school Lobos caught fire, fanned by a footer Durwood Smith, just one minute after the start and went on to smother the taunted Buckies in the District 7AA conference battle.

During the entire clash, the Buckies never so much as threatened to tie the score. At the first quarter's end the score stood 15-5 in favor of the Black and Gold Knights. Never before have Coach Overall's cagers exerted so much hustle and fighting spirit. The rally ended as it started in the opening chapters of the meet. Not for three seconds did it lessen.

Cisco's Smith, aided mightily by Don Kent, Dean McDaniels and Ray Rylee, took possession of high point honors, racking in a total of 15. For the Buckies, it was Gene Gunlock with a net of 9.

New talent was uncovered for Cisco in lanky blonde haired James Porter, who handled the backboard with much skill and

accuracy. And Robert (Rudy) Rendall, George Watts and Stan Sharpe proved to screaming fans their possibilities on the court. During the second half, with the ball changing sides as fast as the eye could follow, Gunlock, Buck star, contributed two points to the Lobos' score. Losing sense of directions he snatched the ball free from a tie up and ran, unopposed, to the Gold's end and tossed in the field goal. Coach Overall, who watched in charges from the sideline through the game, said later: "I feel just as tired after sitting on the bench myself."

Lunacy Hearing For Local Woman Set This Week

A Cisco woman was in the Eastland County jail Tuesday awaiting a lunacy hearing in county court after she allegedly attacked her 11 year old son, pursued her husband with a deadly weapon and wrecked the interior of her residence on Avenue E.

Constable Bob Farnyr who made the investigation and filed the charges reported that the woman inflicted minor injuries on her young son when she beat him with a washboard; and when her husband interfered, she turned on him. The husband reported the matter to local officers. The interior of the residence was badly damaged by the woman, officer said.

When the officers made the investigation the woman was armed with two knives, an ice pick and a hammer.

The family has lived in Cisco for several months, coming here from Arkansas. The husband is employed in the oil fields near here. They have four children, all of them in school. Her husband reported that the woman underwent a major operation several months ago and that she had been in ill health since that time.

The hearing will be held in the county court Wednesday with Judge P. L. Crossley presiding.

Winter Returns To Area Bringing Heavy Coat Of Freezing Rain And Sleet

Old man winter pointed his icy finger at Cisco and most of Texas early Monday, bringing rapidly falling temperatures.

Heavy rains that later turned to sleet and freezing mist and caused weary utility an com-

munications workman many an anxious moment as ice began forming on newly strung lines that were broken during the ice storm two weeks ago.

The new onslaught, said to be the worst of the winter season, plummeted the temperature from a high of 70 which was recorded Sunday to a new low for the season early Tuesday morning when the mercury sagged to 18.

Rains which preceded the howling norther was hailed as a boon to farmers and stockmen over a wide area. The precipitation for the month so far was reported at approximately four inches, the highest recorded during January for many years. Stock tanks were reported either full or with sufficient water to care for the stock for several months.

City water department officials estimated that Lake Cisco caught six inches of water that added at least a months supply for the use of Ciscoans.

Officials of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. and the West Texas Utilities Co. reported that there had been little damage up to noon Tuesday but that emergency crews were held in readiness if the icing conditions become worse. Water caused some local telephone circuits to go out Monday but they were local and repairs were being rushed to place phones back in service.

Train and bus service continued despite the icy pavement but motorists were warned to stay off the highways except in cases of emergencies and to use the utmost care when trips were necessary.

Little relief from the present storm was promised until Friday when slowly rising temperatures will melt the ice and bring possible rain. A new cold front was forming in Canada and the Northwest but it was too early to predict its effect in this area. Continued sleet and snow flurries can be expected tonight and Wednesday.

January has presented a varied weather picture over the area. There have been 14 days in which below freezing temperatures have been recorded. Temperatures ranged from a high maximum of 76 degrees to a low minimum of 18 degrees. Much of the month has been cloudy with light to heavy rains.

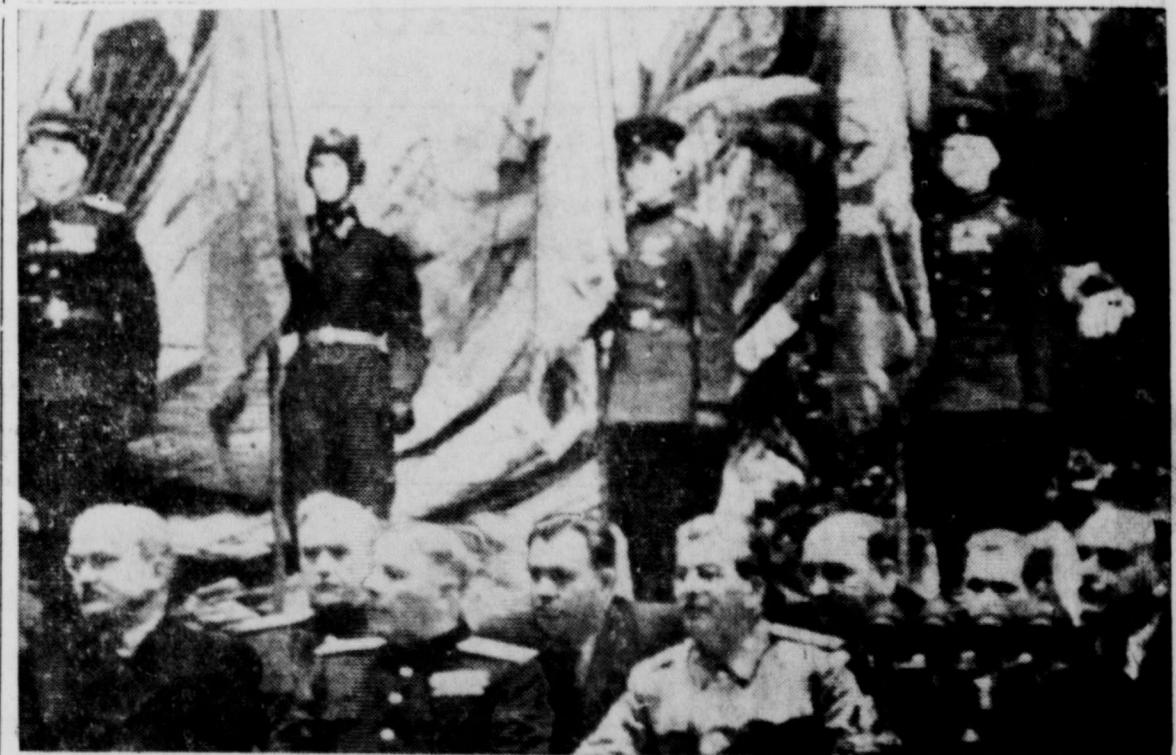
TWO CISCO YOUTHS INDUCTED IN ARMY

Kremlin High Command Honors Lenin

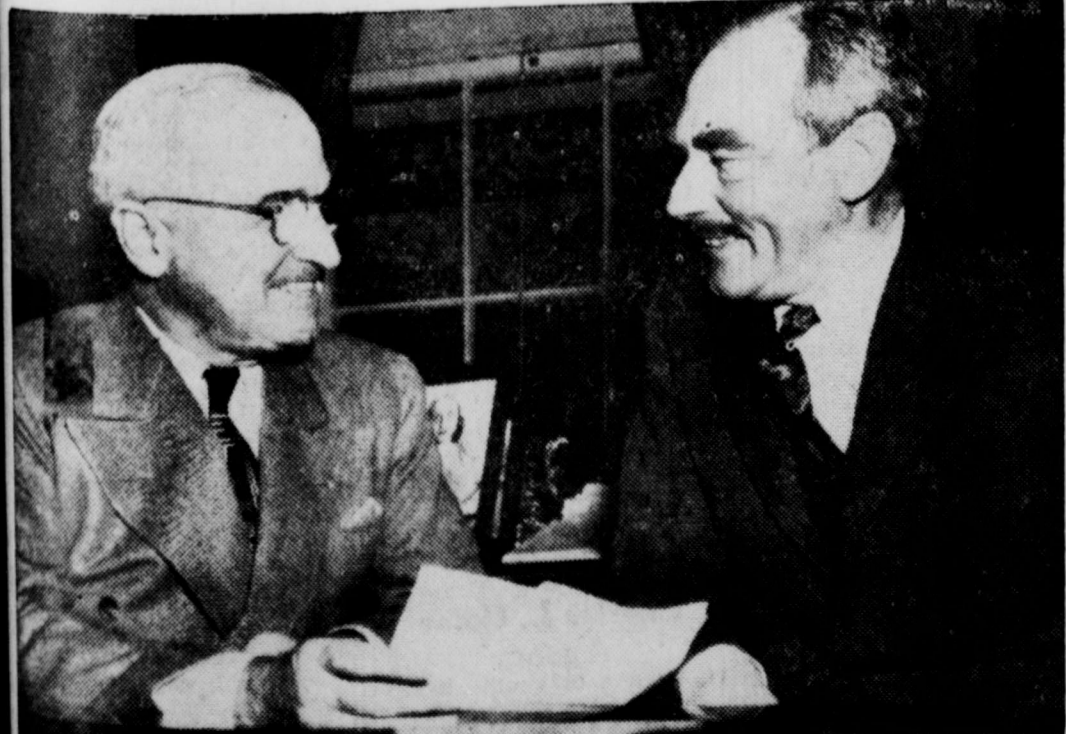

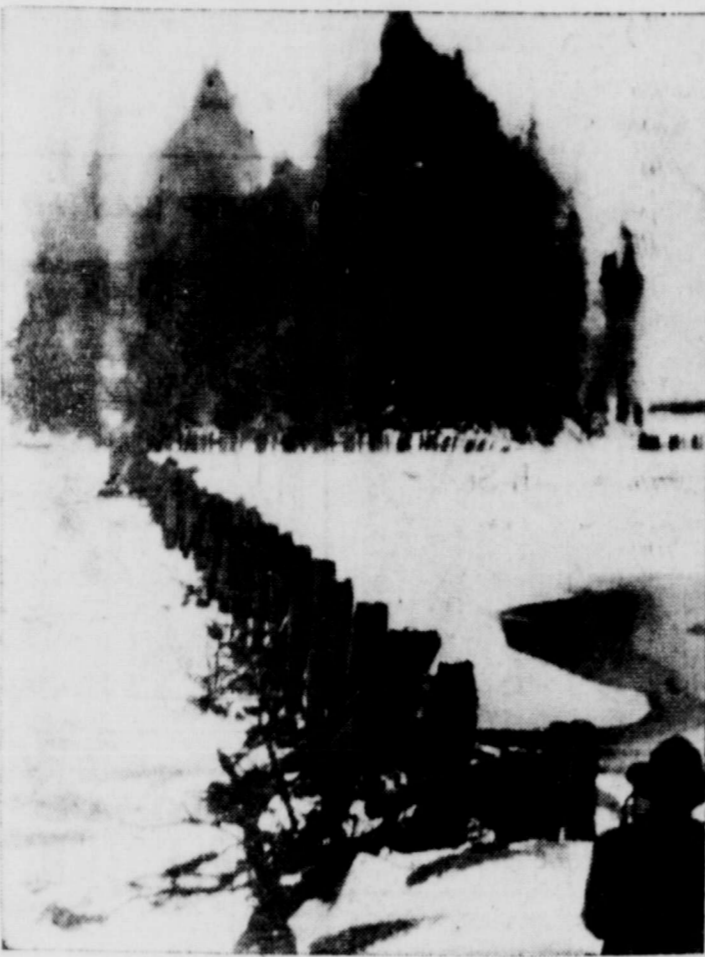

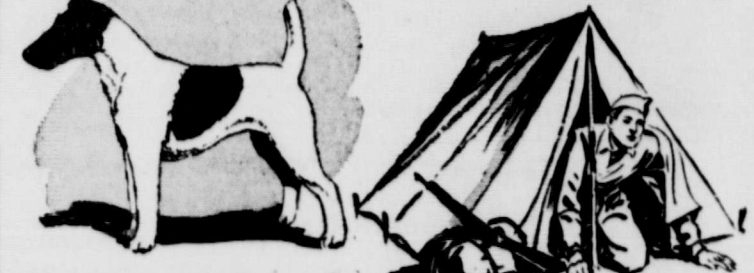
