University Of California Official And Wife "Marooned" In Cisco By Ice Storm; He Is Well Known Scientist

Among those "marooned" in Cisco by the present snow and ice are Dr. and Mrs. Vern O. Knudsen of the University of California at Los Angeles, where Dr. Knudsen is dean of the graduate division. They were driving to Los Angeles from New York after a European trip when the storm caught them here.

Dr. Knudsen does not teach, devoting himself to his administrative duties, to research and consultation in his special field of acoustics. During the war he was one of the top scientists working on supersonic problems relating to detection devices used in anti-submarine warfare. Among his colleagues are nuclear physicists who pioneered in atomic fission, including Dr. Ernest O. Lawrence, head of the big nuclear laboratory at the University of California, and inventor of the cyclotron.

Dr. Knudsen's world-wide prominence in acoustical physics is indicated by a comment of Fortune Magazine which reported that when Los Angeles architects cabled London for the best man in acoustics they were told to look on their own campus.

As his name suggests, he is of Swedish descent, although a native American as his attractive, vivacious wife is quick to point out. She suggested, laughingly, that he could as well be a citizen of the world for the travelling they do. They spend most of their vacations globe-trotting.

"My husband," she exclaimed, "is afflicted with wanderlust." She admitted, however, that she was herself not entirely immune. "He is also a little absent-minded," she added with a smile.

She remarked upon the courtesy of Southern people with evident pleasure, and said, also, that they had found a distinct improvement in the French at

titude during their stay there.

"I think that much of the reason for our social and economic difficulties is traceable to our passion for gain rather than service," she said. "If we could organize our community life closer to the churches and the basic truths they represent, I think we would have a much stronger and happier society."

Both Dr. and Mrs. Knudsen are friendly, down-to-earth people with a marked ability to adapt themselves to emergencies. They are spending their enforced vacation in Cisco at a private residence where they have the run of the house, working on material that Dr. Knudsen carries in a bulging brief case, and, for relaxation, shelling half a bushel of pecans that Mrs. Knudsen bought in Louisiana and plans to put into pecan "tarts" when she gets home.

"I'm supposed to be back at work February 1," the scientist grinned, and added philosophically, "But I carry a good deal of work in that brief case, and this is a good excuse to shell these pecans. I love pecan pies."

Incidentally, the Knudsens missed the recent record-making California blizzard, and the Texas variety has been the only one to interrupt their trip. They were assured that the current spell is not the best side of Texas. It was their first trip through Cisco. In the course of his professional travels about the nation, Dr. Knudsen most frequently travels by plane.

Tuesday evening Mrs. Knudsen called their daughter in Los Angeles, to tell her of their where, abouts and safety.

"The call went through in no time at all," she exclaimed appreciatively.

Drought Broken In Most Areas Over Texas

With little relief in sight until late Thursday or early Friday, Ciscoans who ventured out early Wednesday to go to work were greeted by the results of the heaviest sleet storm in this area in recent years.

Sleet that started falling at 2:30 p. m. Tuesday continued until early Wednesday morning depositing some four inches of ice on streets and sidewalks. The sleet was accompanied by a freezing mist that grazed the surface making some streets impassable and caused many business men and employees to walk to work. The most venuesome attempted it in their cars and many found themselves stuck when the crust gave way and the wheels were unable to find proper traction.

Some abandoned their cars and went the rest of the way on foot. Others waited until some Good Samaritan came by and gave them a needed push.

The sleet added to the discomfort of livestock in the area and all stockmen were forced to feed their animals. Some were in out of the way pastures and feeders were unable to reach them. There was little danger of starvation or freezing but if the condition prevails a few days longer the situation may become bad.

All city schools and Cisco Junior College dismissed classes Monday and they will not be resumed until next Monday morning, it was announced today.

All highway travel was dangerous and motorists were warned to stop somewhere until the weather breaks. Bus service was disrupted and only a few made it through. Any attempt to keep a schedule was forgotten as the few that did get through made it as they could.

Temperatures rose a little during the day but it was not expected to go above freezing mark until Thursday or possibly Friday. The low for the day was 24 degrees, which was recorded early in the morning. It had risen to 28 at 2 p. m. and was expected to stay around that figure.

The daughters are Mrs. Gladys Masters of Fontano, California, Mrs. George Blanc of Alhambra, California, Mrs. Vance Miller of Big Spring and Miss Ina Lavern Green of Washington, D. C.

Also surviving are a number of grandchildren and great grandchildren.

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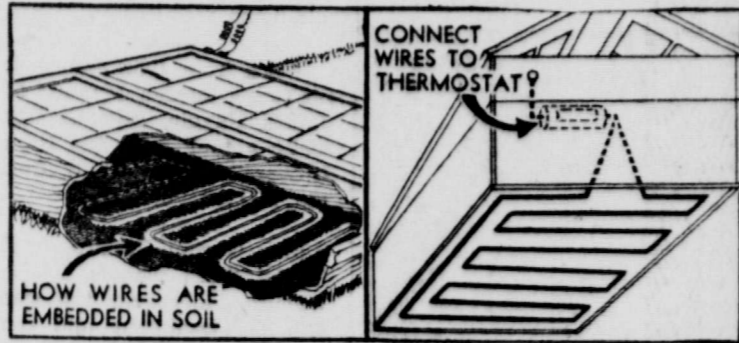
MOVIES DISCUSSED AT ARTS CLUB MEET

How to Install Electric Heating Cable With Thermostat in Hotbed.

Want a Greenhouse? Here's Next Best at Low Cost

Many of the advantages of a small greenhouse, at a fraction of its cost, may be enjoyed by the amateur gardener who equips his cold frame with an electric heating cable. Cables and thermostats are now obtainable at less than the cost to a townsman of suitable manure, were he able to find it.

Current used for heating depends upon the insulation of the frame, and how early in the spring heat is turned on, but it seldom adds an important amount to the light bill. Advantages are many. There is a much more even heat, which is beneficial to all plants and vital to those that chill easily. It gives a longer growing period, since the heat does not become exhausted, as does heat from manure, which sometimes fails before the outside temperature is safe.

A frame is constructed in the usual pattern as used for both hot-beds and cold frames, but there is no need to prepare a deep pit such as is necessary when manure is used to supply heat.

The frame is sunk in the ground about six inches. Soil is removed

within it to an equal depth, and the cable is arranged on the bottom in loops, so that heat will be evenly distributed. The supply wire and cable are both connected to a thermostat, which can be set at the desired minimum temperature, so that as soon as the thermometer falls to that point heat is turned on.

When temperature rises a few degrees above the minimum, heat is shut off, and the variation between maximum and minimum temperatures is much less than with the old-fashioned hot-bed.

The heating cable is usually covered with four to six inches of soil. It is a good idea to place a sheet of fine meshed poultry wire an inch above the cable, with soil between. Another method is to grow plants in flats, which are placed on a grating just above the heating cable, which is not buried in soil, and thus is always open to inspection. To improve insulation and reduce current consumption, the frame should be banked with cinders, which are covered with soil, to within a few inches of the top.
