Wranglers To Contest Decatur Junior Squad In Basketball Game Tonight

Weather permitting, the Cisco Junior College basketballers will close out a five game home stand here tonight at the City gymnasium with Decatur JC—all in hopes of doing it in grand style.

Up to date, Coach Stormy Davis' fivesome has lost out in all encounters during the home stretch. The Wranglers opened with Hillsboro here, conference crown defender, and fell under; saw Watterford surge back in closing seconds for a win, and a week later, gave it up to Clifton. This week, the Temple engagement ran afoul the weather.

Proceedings in Thursday night's round ball play are scheduled to commence action at 7:30 p. m. Tickets will go on sale at the east side entrance, college officials said.

The history of the Cisco-Decatur feud dates back to December at the Clifton Invitation tournament. There, Davis' crew, green at the beginning, were humbled by a few points to spare in driving Decatur almost to the breaking point.

Sometime later, Cisco's "Shoulda Win" quintet blasted the 1949 conference lid off with Decatur, and revenge was drawn out in the 50-60 score favoring the Wranglers.

Cisco's chances of clinging onto the junior college conference crown nose-dived this week after Homer (Spec) Tompkins' eligibility ran out at mid-term. The corkscrew ball juggler has paced the Wranglers in the top scoring department and has been instrumental in power-pushing Cisco into the head wind.

Tompkins will enter Texas Christian University for second semester studies. With Tompkins definitely out of the picture, Coach Davis will

either shuffle Bob Travis or Charles Adair, both of whom have turned in sharp play, into the vacant slot. The regular lineup for Cisco will likely include Leonard Grigsby and James Swanner at forward, Leon Parrish at center, and Lynn Johnson at guard.

Lynn Johnson, at guard, has placed high in scoring feats and should turn in good results under the backboard. If Charles Adair gets the nod from the bench, fans can be assured of fast play on Cisco's part. And Bobby Travis, former Lobo courtster, is an artist on the hardwood floor.

Other games this week will move the Wranglers to Hillsboro for a second trial at the high-toppers on January 31. Ranger JC will boom into Cisco after out-manuevering the local crew there last Thursday by some 14 points. Only five games remain this season.

Nine Confederate Pensioners On Roll

Nine confederate veterans get pensions, who are still on the roll. State auditor Caviness reported the past week.

In a report to Gov. Beauford Jester and State Comptroller George H. Sheppard, Caviness said eight single men or widowers are receiving \$100 a month and one married veteran is receiving \$150.

During December, the state paid pensions totaling \$48,831.45 to 951 persons, including 942 widowers, 41 of whom reside at the Texas confederate home.

Caviness listed the youngest pensioner was 72 years old and the oldest 104.

Abilene To Receive Five Per Cent Insurance Cut

ABILENE, Jan. 26. This city's improved fire loss record during 1948 will probably result in an extra five per cent credit being granted on its fire insurance premiums, Fire Chief D. C. Musick has predicted. Such an increase would give Abilene a total credit of 15 per cent since a 10 per cent credit is already in effect. Chief Musick made this prediction after studying estimated fire losses and insurance premiums for the year; exact losses and premiums for 1948 and the credit, if any, will not be known until February when the Insurance Checking Office of Austin makes its report. Estimated fire losses in Abilene for the past year total \$85,000, a decrease from 1947 of over 26 per cent, and since 1944 the annual per capita fire loss here has declined from \$2.46 to \$1.53.

PLACED ON ALERT

Troops of the 961st Field Artillery (National Guard) were placed on a 24-hour alert Wednesday, but a Guard Spokesman declined to comment. Approximately two fully equipped companies, composed of 25 Guardsmen each, have been told to be in readiness to leave within a moment's notice, it was learned.

Men Who Served As World War II Officers Can Attain Commission

Male citizens of the United States who have served honorably on active duty for at least one year as a commissioned officer in any of the Armed Forces of the US between December 7, 1941 and December 2, 1945, and who possess other necessary qualifications will receive a direct appointment as second Lieutenant, Regular Army, upon application, stated Captain Wayne Hall, Commanding Officer of the Abilene US Army and US Air Force Recruiting Main Station.

Selected applicants will be commissioned in the Regular Army and will be detailed in the appropriate Arm or service which he is considered most qualified as evidenced by his military and educational background. The applicant must possess a baccalaureate degree from an accredited college or university, meet the physical standards, and must have reached his 21st birthday, but not have passed his 27th birthday. However, the age above the 27th birthday may be increased by the total number of years the applicant served as a commissioned officer between December 7, 1941, and December 2, 1945. No person shall be appointed under this program who has attained his 30th birthday.

Captain Hall stated that appointments during 1949 will be made in two major increments. In March 1949 for those eligible or who become eligible prior thereto, and in August 1949 for those becoming eligible by virtue of graduation from a recognized college or university during the spring 1949.

Anyone desiring complete information regarding this program should contact his local US Army and US Air Force Recruiting Station.

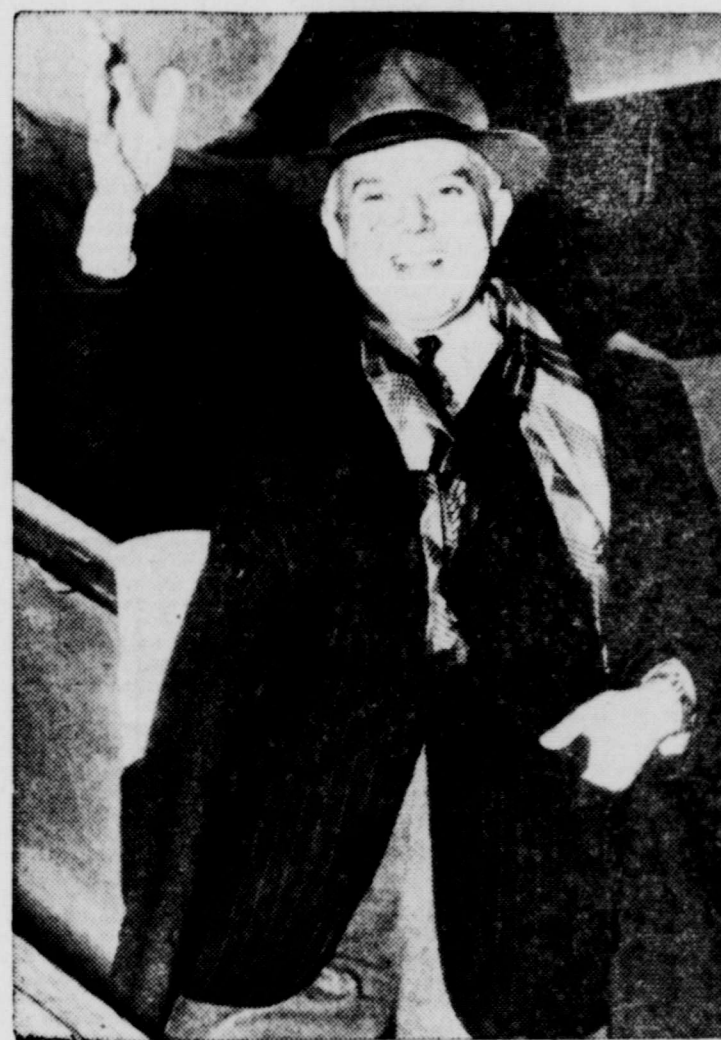

Damage Surveyed As Snow And Ice Begin Loosening Hold On Cisco Area

Ice and sleet which held Cisco and much of Texas in its grip for the past few days began melting early Thursday after bringing much needed moisture and causing thousands of dollars worth of damage to property and to previously damaged power and communications lines.

Included in the new damage was the recently purchased League Tile and Brick Company plant just east of Cisco on the N. D. Gallagher farm. The heavy sheet iron building collapsed under the weight of tons of sleet and ice which were deposited from early Monday until early Wednesday morning when the damage occurred.

The building which measures 84x100 feet collapsed when the walls bulged out and the roof fell in, completely covering the machinery which was installed, and inflicting heavy damage. Bob McCrary, who was in the building when it fell received only slight cuts and bruises.

Company officials said that the damage would not alter their plans to place the plant in operation and that the building would be rebuilt as soon as possible. It means that the opening of the new industry will be delayed past the original date set.

Some power failures in Cisco caused lights to be out in parts of the town and newly repaired communications lines to the west were down.

Calls to Putnam and Baird were not going through and delays of four hours were being posted on calls to Abilene. Farmers and stockmen were jubilant over the added moisture the storm brought and were viewing the year with optimism.

Texas Schools Get Over \$10,000,000

Another ten million dollar plus payment went out to Texas schools Saturday from the available school fund.

This payment represents \$7 per capita for 5,245,128 scholastics, State School Superintendent L. A. Woods announced.

It was the second largest per capita payment in history. It was the fifth payment of the current year on the \$55 dollar per capita authorized by the last legislature.

Army Needs 29,000 Graduate Nurses

Austin, Jan. 24. The Officer's Reserve Corps, Army Nurse Section, is seeking to recruit this year 29,000 graduate registered nurses between the ages of 21 and 45, it has been announced by Colonel Oscar B. Abbott, Executive for the Texas Military District.

Approximately 27,000 of the number will be for inactive duty.

The Officers' Reserve Corps is part of a new organization which the Army has created as a peace time source of actually needed and potentially needed nursing personnel. These potential needs are to be determined by mobilization requirements dependent on the nature of possible national emergencies.

Nurses needed for active duty in Army hospitals over and above the quota established for the Regular Army will be secured from those nurses holding Reserve commissions in the Officers' Reserve Corps. Nurses who desire active duty with the Army must volunteer for such duty after they have received a Reserve Commission. Initial appointment in the Officers' Reserve Corps is made for a period of five years.

Married nurses will not be called to active duty except in the cases of national emergency. Nurses with children under 18 years of age will not be called to active duty at anytime.

Callahan Citizens Purchase \$209,402 Government Bonds

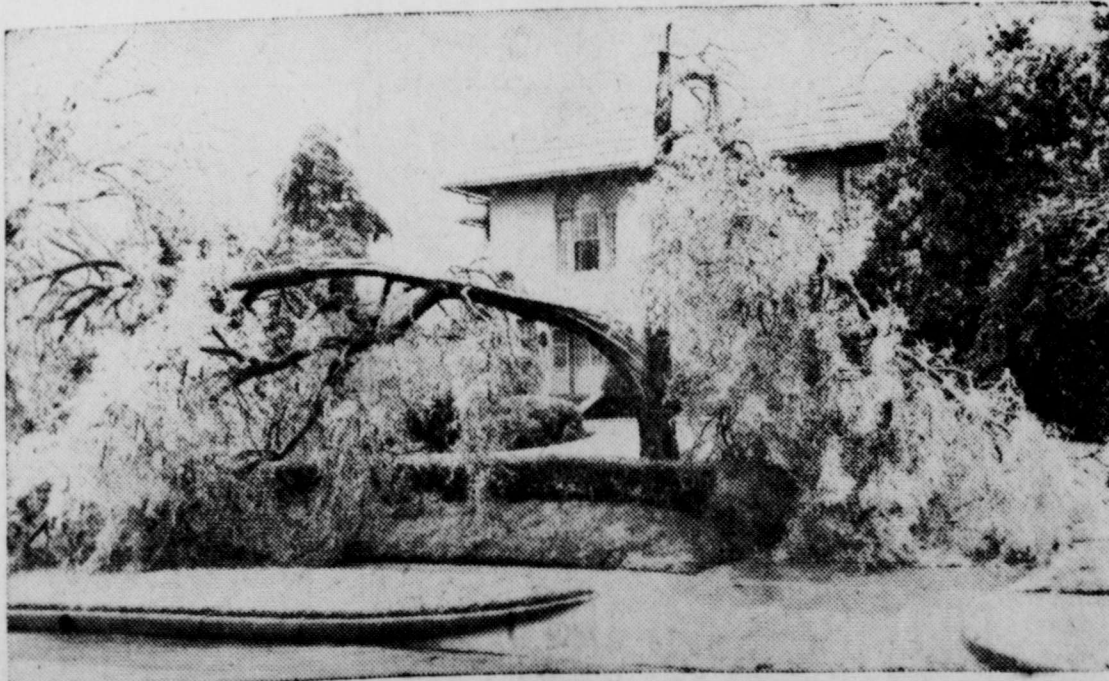
The people of Callahan County bought \$209,402.75 worth of U. S. Savings bonds during 1948, according to a year-end report by Harry Owens of Dallas state director for Savings Bonds, to B. H. Fiecland, County Savings Bonds chairman. During the same period, the people of Texas bought \$196,448,587.50 worth of these securities.

To illustrate the practical aspects of thrift, as represented by the Savings Bonds program, Mr. Owens pointed out that the annual interest from bonds held by Texans, if converted into residential construction, would build 4237 homes costing \$10,000 each or, if considered in terms of higher education or wages and salaries, would give a four-year college education to 14,124 students at the rate of \$750 per year or provide an income of \$225 per month for a full year for 15,693 persons.

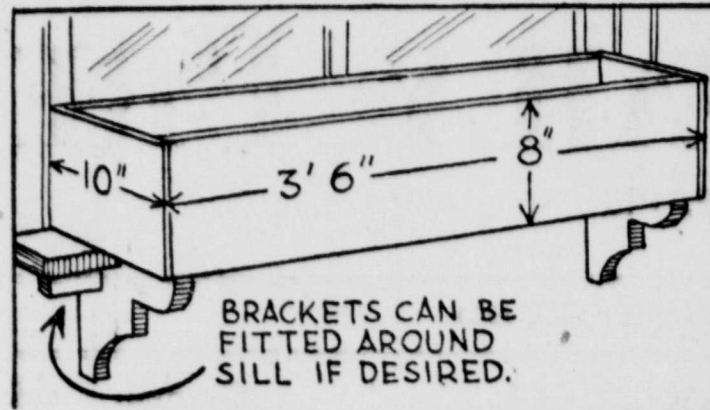

## Window Box Will Satisfy Desire to Grow Flowers

If you live in a city apartment, but buy the garden magazines, and read the garden articles in your newspaper, this is written for you.

Your interest in gardening is deep seated, and you will be happier if it can be satisfied. Have you thought about the possibilities of a window box?

Here is the type of garden which everyone can grow, whether he lives in a suburb or a city. It will serve two purposes, first to decorate the house you live in, and what is even more important, it will satisfy to a surprising degree your desire to grow things.

To get this satisfaction, you must give serious attention to selecting the plants to grow, preparing fertile, porous soil, and if possible growing your own plants. It will be an excellent beginning to make your own window box, which can easily be done from the diagram herewith.

For a standard single window, a box 3 1/2 feet long, 8 inches deep and 10 inches wide is a good size. But measure your windows and make boxes to fit. Where larger, or multiple, windows demand greater length, the other dimensions must be larger in proportion, or single boxes may be provided for each window in a group.

Think of the box as a decoration of the house; make it of a suitable size and a color to match the house color or trim. The flowers should be chosen to furnish a contrasting, yet harmonious color ac-

cent. There is a wealth of suitable varieties from which to choose. Rich soil, of the type which florists call potting soil, must be used for window boxes. Because there is so little of it to feed the flowers, it should be well fertilized. A tablespoonful of chemical plant food for each square foot of soil should be used.

For the annual flowers, at least six hours of sun a day is necessary and this requires a south window. The best subjects are those of dwarf or trailing habit, the latter drooping festoons of bloom from the boxes. Petunias of the balcony type are excellent, as are the tall nasturtiums, the giant morning glories, Dwarf petunias, marigolds, ageratum, calliopsis, annual pinks, lobelia, dwarf morning glories, phlox, and zinnias can be grown.

Boxes which spend most of the day in shade offer a special problem. If the shade is that of a building, perhaps only foliage plants can be grown, such as ferns, fancy leaved caladiums, crotons, rubber plants and other florists' subjects. If there is some sun, begonias will probably do well. Impatiens, the Zanzibar balsam, bearing flowers of salmon or rose on bushy plants 18 inches tall, are excellent in semi-shaded places. Violas thrive in partial shade, and the list of flowers which will do well increases as the amount of sun is enlarged.

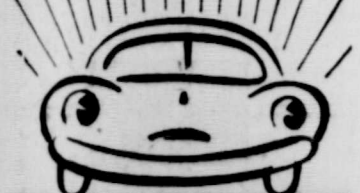
