## Drought Broken Over Texas By Rain And Snow

With few exceptions, practically all areas of the State received generous supplies of moisture during the past two weeks, effectively breaking the long and extended fall and winter drought. The moisture situation is now uniformly more encouraging than at any time since late May of 1947. Precipitation has been light in some extreme southern counties where additional rains would be helpful, and subsoil moisture reserves have been partially replenished in some western and north-central counties. Except in the extreme southern areas, however, surface soils were in excellent condition.

Chilling wind, sleet, snow and cold rain held plant growth to a standstill and caused heavy shrinkage of livestock in northern and northwestern counties. Freeze damage to small grains and losses of livestock, however, have been negligible. Field activities were at a standstill except in southern counties where harvesting of winter vegetables and citrus fruits made fair progress.

Heavy feeding of roughage, cottonseed cake and other concentrates continued over most of the State with pasture feeds still limited. Warm weather was needed to encourage age growth of grasses and small grains for winter pastures. The generally slow rains have not fully replenished stock water except in limited areas.

The State Medical Association of Texas will meet for the 8th annual session in San Antonio May 5. The last annual session in San Antonio was in 1939. The Woman's Auxiliary of the association will meet in San Antonio at the same time. Approximately 2000 doctors are expected for the meeting which will feature 12 prominent guest speakers from over the country. Dr. Tate Miller of Dallas, president of the Association will open the general session and preside over the meeting until the last day when Dr. G. V. Bradley of Temple, president-elect, will succeed him following the election of new officers.

## New Cold Front Of 20 Forecast Moves In; Low

Ciscoans, who basked in warm sunshine Thursday awakened Friday morning to find that the mercury had skidded from near 50 degrees recorded Thursday afternoon to an icy 26 degrees registered early this morning. The temperature had risen only 3 degrees during the day and the forecast called for colder and cloudy.

With the mercury hovering at the 29 mark at 1 p. m. the weatherman could promise nothing but colder weather. A rapidly moving front was blowing in from the Plains area and was scheduled to drop the temperature to 20 degrees or lower Saturday morning. Since the mass of cold air was moving so rapidly it was not expected to bring moisture with it.

Much of the sleet and ice piled up by the storm which made its appearance Monday was melted by the warm sunshine Thursday but streets were again frozen over Friday and the below freezing temperature of the day prohibited further thawing. No relief was in sight until early next week.

Five inches rain recorded in January

Rain, snow, sleet and a slow drizzle during the misty 28 days of January added approximately five inches of badly needed moisture to parched fields and pastures and encouraged ranchmen and farmers who had looked longingly at the sky for traces of rain for the past year.

The January precipitation was the largest recorded here for any one month in over five years and most of it went into the ground to assure a good bottom season.

Small tanks were full and others received sufficient water to last stock for a few months.

GAME CANCELLED

The Cisco - Decatur Junior College basketball game scheduled Thursday night was cancelled by college officials here due to unfavorable weather conditions that prevented the Decatur team from making the trip. The game will be played later in the season.

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## New Abstracting Plant To Open In Eastland Soon

Something entirely new in abstracting of titles will be introduced in Eastland County February 1, when Raymond Young and Marion Vestal open a photographic type equipped plant in the Petroleum Building at Eastland.

By actual photographing of legal instruments on paper no thicker than ordinary business letterheads, bulkiness of the finished product is thereby eliminated and any possibility of typographical error or fraudulent insertions rendered impossible.

Possibly one of the best desirable features of the new method of abstracting is that it permits much faster service than the old method.

"We can give one and two day service on any abstract of Eastland county property, regardless of length," Young declared.

By utilizing a new invention in developing—a highly sensitized paper—reproductions of legal instruments become clearer and permit more rapid examination by attorneys than the actual typed sheet. Vouching for the permanency of this type of abstracts is the fact that the United States government recently instituted this method of transcribing permanent records.

The new plant, to be known as the Eastland-Callahan Abstract Company will be staffed by a crew of seven experienced abstractors. In addition to Young and Miss Vestal the personnel includes: Maxine Williams, Ben Young, Reba Price, Marilyn Reem and Phyllis Griffith.

In addition to the Eastland plant Young and Miss Vestal own and operate a plant at Baird, utilizing the old type abstracting method.

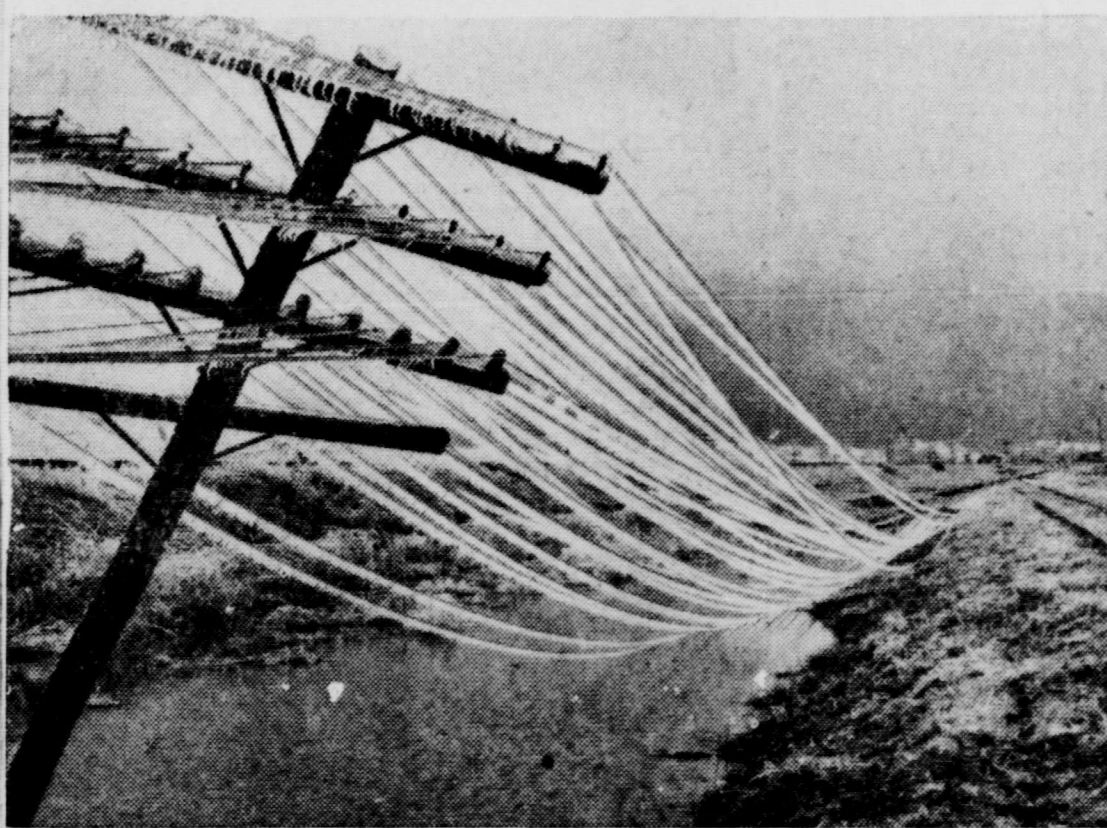
"Having observed for many years the errors that inevitably occur in repeated typing of instruments by stenographers, regardless of their aptitude," says Miss Vestal, "I am deeply enthusiastic about the photographic type of equipment. It eliminates any chance of human error."

## Eastland Attorney Addresses Cisco Rotary Club; Committee Reports On Lobo-Wrangler Football Banquet

Virgil Seaberry, prominent Eastland attorney and widely known in state capitol circles told members of the Cisco Rotary Club Thursday in a thirty minute address on the Texas Constitution that "the state constitution should be publicized and brought before the people of Texas."

In his talk at the Cisco Junior College cafeteria, Seaberry related instances in the history of the Texas Constitution. "Adopted in 1876, it contains 35,000 records—five times as long as the Constitution of the United States, and the fourth largest in the 48 states."

"It is an absolute fact," he declared, "only a small percentage of the voting public in this state knew what they were doing when they went to the polls last November."

"The Governor plans to send 24 parties over the state, inquiring as to what the people of the state believe about its present laws. In this public poll, I believe the people of the state who have never before taken an interest in the State Government will become more acquainted with the proceedings."

The speaker, introduced by Rotarian G. R. Nance after an informal luncheon, asserted, "If the constitution of Texas needs some changes then it is time for action. If it does not need alterations, then let it be as it is today."

The 7-man committee, of which Mr. Seaberry is chairman, does not seek to re-write the constitution as so many citizens of the state have been led to believe. At the present, the speaker stated, 20 like committees are covering the state with the same resolution "to bring the constitution out into the open."

Prior to Mr. Seaberry's address, Rotary President J. E. Proctor called before the luncheon various committees working on the Lobo-Wrangler banquet and members heard Chairman Elsworth Maver report that Coach Bob Woodruff of the Baylor Bears had accepted an invitation to speak at the annual program. The date has been set for March 1.

Professor Vern O. Knudsen, prominent scientist from the University of California, was a guest. Several Rotarians from Eastland and Abilene were also present.

## Social Hygiene Day To Be Observed On February 2

AUSTIN, Jan. 28.—Throughout America men and women have become conscious of the necessity for fighting the menace of venereal diseases, and it is a matter of pride to public health workers that the entire nation now joins in the observance of National Social Hygiene Day, which in this year is dated February 2.

Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, states that at the present time three rapid treatment centers are being operated in Texas, located at San Antonio, Waco and Rocky Mount, and that a total of approximately 15,000 patients per year are being treated in these centers. Ninety-six venereal disease clinics as well as the rapid treatment centers are primarily for the treatment of indigent and semi-indigent persons referred by physicians or local health units.

In the past two years a blood testing survey of more than 80,000 Texans has disclosed that between seven and ten per cent of that number had positive tests for syphilis and that a majority of them did not know they had the disease and had never had medical treatment for it. This vast reservoir of untreated syphilis is one reason for its continued spread, and it is a notable achievement in furthering public health that about 99% of these persons have been brought under treatment so that they can no longer spread the disease.

More than 43,000 contacts have been investigated and placed under treatment until no longer infectious. A continuous educational program carried on by the State Department of Health is another effective means for controlling venereal disease, and reducing the number of crippled, blind and paralyzed persons who are annually the victims of syphilis and other venereal diseases.

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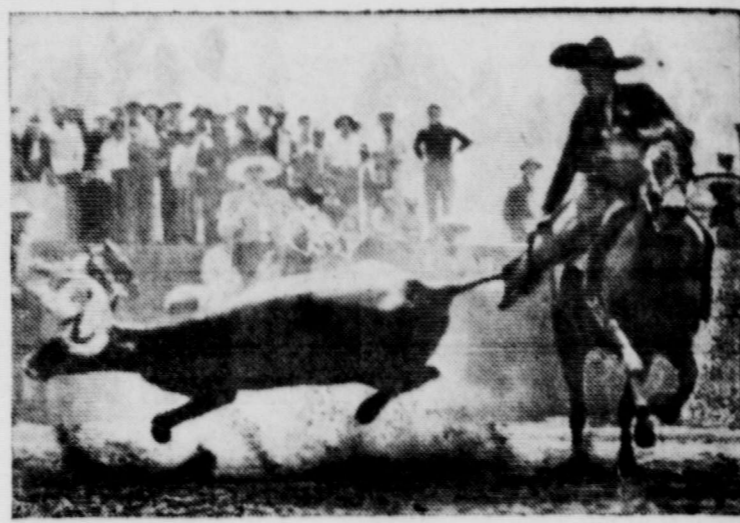

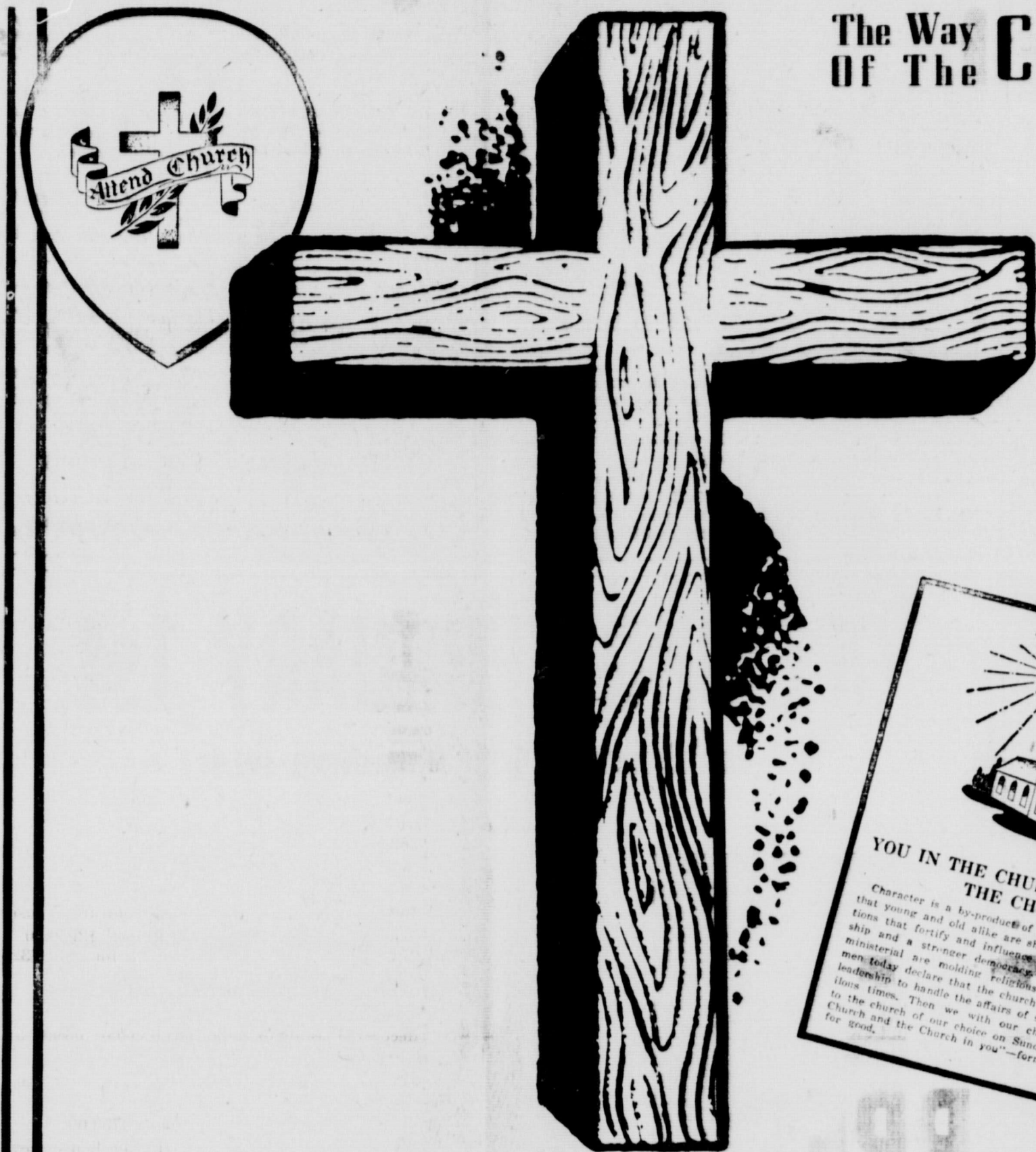

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TOO long have we thought of the 'via dolorosa' when we have looked toward the Cross; instead of being the 'sad way' it must be seen as the 'glad way'. There may be sad moments along every noble path, but the great ways of the world are not thoroughly sad ways. The path of motherhood may have some sad turns but on the whole it is a satisfying path. The path of education climbs some difficult and steep places, but on the whole it is a thrilling way that our young people take.

THE prophet Isaiah talked about the highway of God, where faithful servants of God pass on good errands for the great God. That is The Way of the Cross, a way which one takes in the service of God and the ideal. One turns aside from immediate and attractive enjoyments that he

may do the errands of high purpose and of worthy living. Other people think of it as The Way of the Cross, but the traveler on the highway rejoices at the vistas that open to his view and is invigorated with the air of the ascent.

JOHN Mackay has been talking about The Road, by which he means a way of great and victorious doing and serving. "This is the way; walk ye in it". The early Christians rejoiced that they had found The Way, for it meant a life devoted to their Lord and an experience of the divine Presence; it was really living.

THE Way of the Cross is the way that Jesus walked and it has become luminous with glory ever since. "Take up your cross and follow". Heaven and God are at the end of the Way. Attend your Church regularly.

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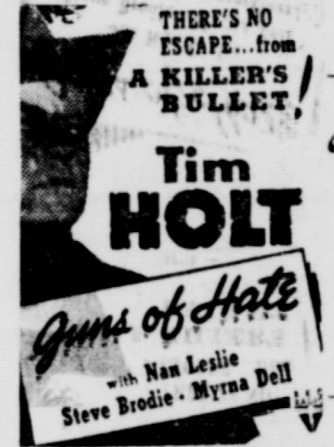
