Certain Reserves Eligible For Active **Duty With Army**

It was autounced today by Captain Wayne Hall, Station Commander of the US Army and US Air Force Recruiting Main Station in Abilene, that all personnel other than Air Force, enlisted in the Organized Reserve Corps or in the National Guard, who meet the specified criteria are eligible to volunteer and will be accepted for a period of 21 months' continuous active duty.
