Mr. David Smokler of the North Texas Breeding Farms in Dallas addressed the group on the possibilities of increasing the amount of butter fat per cow through the program. He explained artificial insemination with case histories of some Holstein, Gurnsey and Jersey bulls at the breeding farm.

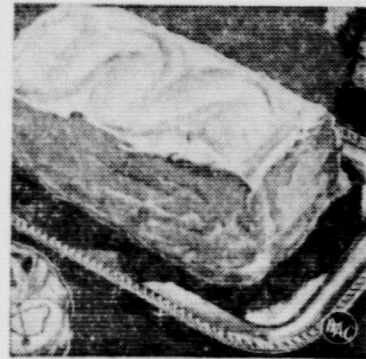
