Vet's Families Not Entitled To V.A. Hospitalization

Mr. Robert D. Deputy, Itinernt Contact Representative of the Veterans Administration, wishes the following information brought to the attention of all veterans in this area.

Wives and children of veterans are not entitled to the hospital and outpatient treatment allowed the veterans themselves This stetment is made in answer to "a number of recent inquir-

Many wives of veterans were treated by Army and Navy doctors while their husbands were in the service. Mr Deputy said Now, some of the wives erroneously believe they are entitled to treatment under veteran's laws.

Only ex-servicemen and wo men, if discharged under conditions other than dishonorable, are entitled to hospital treatment under the following priority system.

(1) Emergency cases.


(2) Those suffering from in juries or diseases incurred in or aggravated by military service

(3) Those who state under oath they are unable to pay hospital charges for treatment of non-service-connected disabilities or illnesses. The veterans, if not the emergency category must wait until a bed become: available.
