Corporal Dorsey served in the U. S. Calvary, having entered the service in October, 1938. He was sent to the Philippine Islands in Sept., 1940, and was stationed at Manila. He was with Gen. Wainwright at the time of the surrender and took part in the Bataan death march. He died of pneumonia in Fukuoko Prison Camp No. 17 on Aug. 15. 1945, one day before his 27th birthday. He was born in Pueblo, Callahan County, on August 16, 1918.






