Re-burial Services For Moran Soldier Held Tuesday

Funeral services for Corp. Henry Britton Dorsey, who died in a Japanese prison camp during World War II, were conducted Tuesday at 2:30 p. m. at the Church of Christ in Moran by the minister, Cole Jackson. Burial was in the Dennis cemetery near Moran.

Military services were conducted by the American Legion at Moran. Pallbearers were: Foy Barnett, Walter McCollum, Raymond White, and Warlick Jones. The cremated body arrived in Baird by train Monday and was taken to the home of the soldier's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hillie Dorsey of Moran.

Corp. Dorsey served in the U. S. Calvary, having entered the service in October, 1938. He was sent to the Philippine Islands in Sept., 1940, and was stationed at Manila. He was with Gen. Wainwright at the time of the surrender and took part in the Bataan death march. He died of pneumonia in Fukuoko Prison Camp No. 17 on Aug. 15, 1945, one day before his 27th birthday. He was born in Pueblo, Callahan County, on August 16, 1918.

Survivors are his father and step-mother, Mr. and Mrs. Hillie Dorsey of Moran, three sisters, Mrs. Roxie Basket of Moran, Mrs. Zera Mae Custer of Cisco, Mrs. Corrine Jackson of Houston; a half-sister, Mrs. LaVerne Clifford of Breckenridge, and a half-brother, Alton Larimer of San Angelo. They were all present.

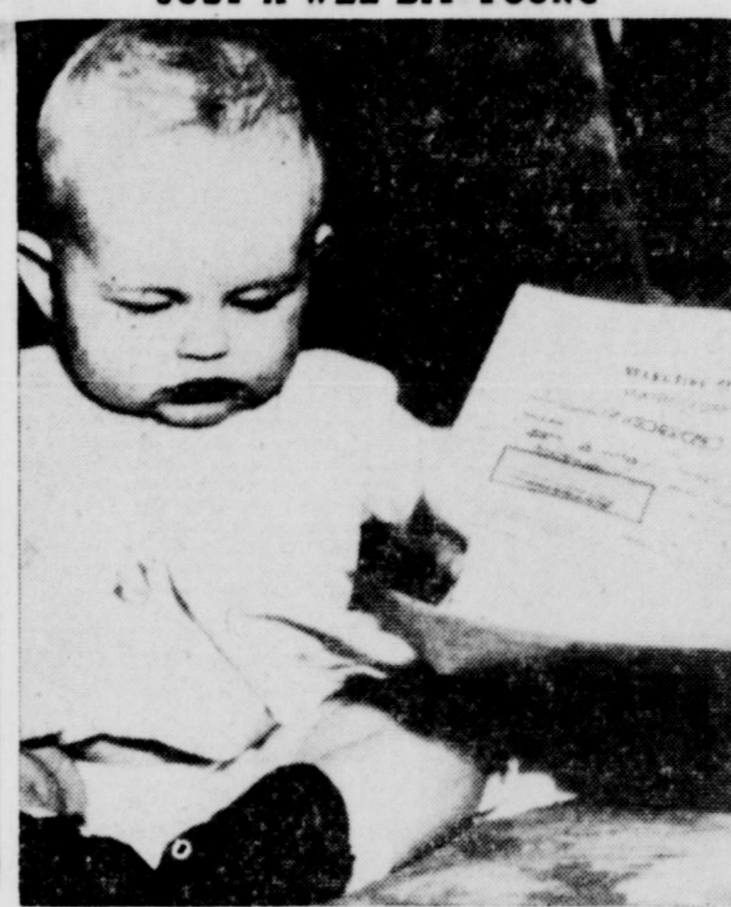

Local Welder Is Hurt In Explosion

A gas explosion at the Shelton No. 1, and oil test drilling 13 miles east of Rising Star, resulted in the injury of a 45-year old Cisco welder Tuesday afternoon.

Injured was Cecil Adams, owner and operator of the Adams Welding Shop, 707 Avenue F, who was attempting to repair a piping unit in a cellar under the rig when the explosion occurred.

Rig men who were on duty at the time of the accident said Adams had tested the underground shaft for possibilities of escaping gas fumes before entering the hole. After finding no evidence of fumes, Adams entered and set to work on the units.

The lighted torch, apparently ignited traces of gas left in the pipes, causing the explosion. Adams was thrown against the shaft's siding and knocked unconscious.

Adams, a long time resident here, suffered bruises and burns about the face and top portion of the body. He was rushed to Graham Hospital where attendants described his condition as satisfactory.

BAGWILL BELIEVED INVOLVED IN BURGLARIES HERE

Sheriff J. B. Williams reported that Curtis Bagwell, held in connection with the hold-up slaying of Crockett Ross, Stephenville filling station operator on January 28, had visited at least one town in Eastland County and that he believed he was responsible for two or more unsolved burglaries in Cisco. F1 Hybrid Flowers Now Winning Garden Awards

Here's a new term for the amateur gardener to learn, if he would be up-to-date in his hobby. It's "F1 hybrid," and if the plant breeder's prophecies come true, it will soon be as common in gardening conversation as D.D.T. and 2,4-D are now.

It means "first generation hybrid," and has become important because of the growing number of F1 hybrid varieties of both vegetables and flowers which are being offered by seedsmen. Petunia Silver Medal, top award winner in the All America trials for 1943, is an F1 hybrid. So is Petunia Pink Sensation, last year's bronze medal winner. All hybrid corn varieties grown in this country are F1 hybrids, and there are tomatoes, cucumbers, squash and egg plant varieties of this class.

To produce an F1 hybrid you take two parents, each having merits which you wish to combine. The parents must belong to well-fixed strains, pure bred, and in the case of plants, inbred. When two such parents are crossed, the first generation seed will produce a crop which is uniform, combining the qualities of both parents, and endowed with a mystic quality called "hybrid vigor," which makes it grow faster, stronger, larger and yield more vigorously than others.

But beware of sowing the seed borne by an F1 hybrid plant, that is unless you are an experimenter, seeking something new. The second generation will be as badly mixed as the first was uniform in size, shape and color. Breeders look for new varieties in the F2 hybrids, but they will usually be a disappointment to others.

The originator of an F1 hybrid which proves to be popular, has a monopoly of the seed production, since it requires the inbred parent strains which he developed, and which others cannot duplicate. But there is nothing to prevent other breeders from developing their own parents, and breeding their own F1 hybrids, which may win popular favor.

That is what has taken place

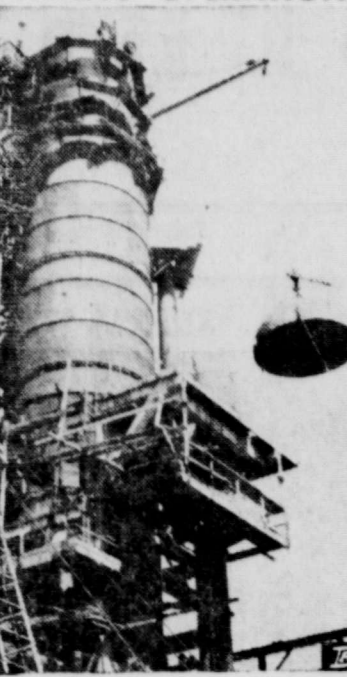


Girl hand-pollinating plant to produce seed of Petunia Silver Medal.

with breeders of hybrid corn, and may be expected to develop with F1 hybrid flowers and vegetables, much to the profit of gardeners in general.

Breeding an F1 flower is costly business. In the illustration, the girl is seated before a petunia plant of an inbred variety chosen to be the seed bearing parent of Petunia Silver Medal. Every flower on this plant has had its petals trimmed, and the pollen-bearing organs removed, so it cannot self-fertilize. In the girl's hand is a flower from the pollen parent, pulled off the row behind her. With a small paint brush she takes pollen from this flower, then transfers it to the stigma of a seed bearing flower on the plant before her. This operation must be repeated thousands of times, to produce a seed crop of a true F1 hybrid. At post-war wages, it makes an expensive crop.

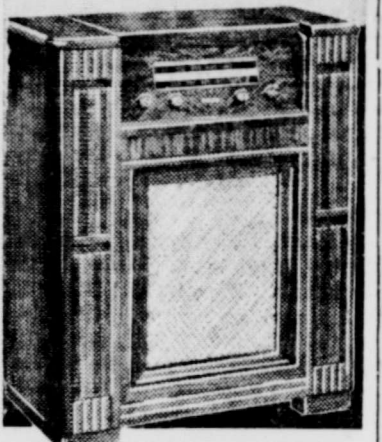

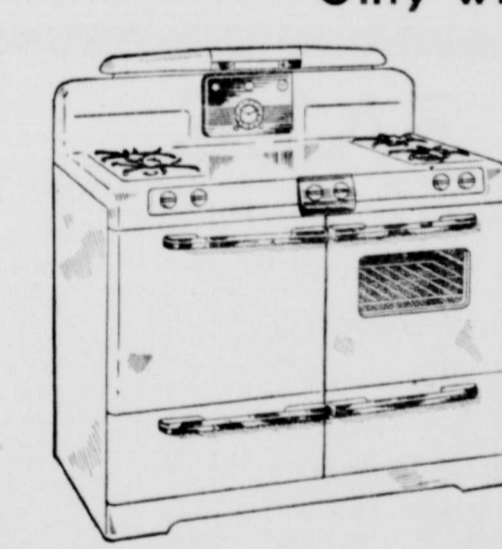

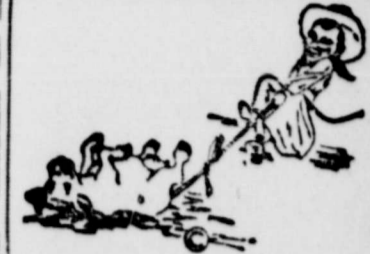
