Jaycees Lose Wacky Game To Fast All-American Red Heads Friday Night

Former Area Woman Dies In San Antonio

Word was received in Cisco Saturday of the death of Mrs. Sarah Ellen White, who passed away in a San Antonio hospital on February 20. Mrs. White and her husband lived for several years on their farm near the Corinth community. A daughter, Mrs. Lillie Walker, lives between Cisco and Carbon. A son, E. M. White lived in Cisco and was an employee of the Cisco and North Eastern Railway Company while it was in operation. Mrs. White had lived in San Antonio for a number of years and the funeral was held there Tuesday. She is survived by six sons and three daughters. The sons are C. H. and O. T. White of San Antonio, E. J. White of Houston, C. W. White of Kingsville, J. W. White of Princeton, Florida and E. M. White of Tynan, Texas. The daughters are Mrs. Lois Lea of Warton, Miss Jewell White of San Antonio and Mrs. Lillie Walker of near Cisco. Also surviving are one sister, grandchildren and 14 great grandchildren.

West Texas C-C Plans New Fight On Water Issue

ABILENE, Feb. 26. — Fortified with resolutions passed by more than half the municipalities in West Texas pledging their support of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce water program, John D. Mitchell, president; D. A. Bancroft, general manager; and K. M. Wagstaff, chairman of the Municipal Water Rights Committee, will go to Austin Monday for another conference with officials of the Texas Water Conservation Association. In this conference officials of the two organizations hope to finally approve the proposed new water code for Texas, with amendments that will be satisfactory to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in its fight to protect the prior water rights of the area. Two weeks ago in Austin a similar discussion was held in which the WTCC proposed 17 amendments to the code as originally written, which in the opinion of that organization, would give West Texas municipalities desired protection. It was agreed attorneys would study and rewrite these amendments, and as a result the TWCA attorney presented 3 amendments, which in their opinion would suit the demands of the West Texas organization. In a letter to Victor W. Bouldin, Houston attorney for TWCA, WTCC legal bureau agreed to one of the amendments, as meeting the WTCC objections. On the second, however, he urged further study, but the third he held unacceptable because it places limitations on the municipalities' rights of recapture.

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Clinical Society Plans Conference

The Dallas Southern Clinical Society will hold its annual spring clinical conference in Dallas March 14-17 with headquarters at the Hotel Adolphus and the Baker Hotel. Dr. H. Walton Cochran of Dallas president of the society, announced that guest speakers will be presented in general assemblies, afternoon clinics, round table luncheon discussions, afternoon and evening symposiums, and a clinical pathologic conference. The purpose of these annual postgraduate meetings, Dr. Cochran said, is to make available to the medical profession of the South the most modern developments in the various fields of medicine in a constant effort to improve medical care.

They combined baseball, football, basketball, and tumbling, and jammed it into four short quarters to afford a crowd of more than 1,000 cheering spectators one of the most enjoyable evenings ever experienced at a sports contest. From "Dead Eye" Stubby Winters, who measured a sportive feet, two, to "Dead Pan" Gene Love, who towered to a height of six feet - four, they played a brand of ball seldom seen on any court. Winters and Love, along with the corn fed Iowa sisters, Betty and Margie Arends, and the six foot "Peaches" Hauber, who is a New Orleans model during the off season, showed Jaycees and the crowd why they are called All-Americans. The fast footwork of "Twinkle Toes" Glenn, "Smiley" Dameron and "Hurricane" Davis combined with the accurate goal shooting of "Snake" Overall and "Sly" Siddall did much to keep the local team within sight of the fancy girls' team from Cassville, Missouri. They were aided by Cheves, Harrelson, White, Kennedy, Smith, Thacker, Rhoads, Bayros, Everett, Hintz, Penn and Durwood Smith who went in at intervals to spell the winded starters. Between half activities saw Hazel Walker challenge and defeat the best free throw artists the Jaycees could muster. She defeated Overall, Durwood Smith and Willard White in succession by sinking 30 free tosses without a miss — and the last ten were thrown from a kneeling position. Miss Walker was National free throw champion for six years and the International champ for two years.

Active duty training under this program will not adversely affect either application for or entry upon a competitive tour extended active duty by prospective graduates. AUSTIN, Feb. 26. — Texas charters were granted 286 businesses with a capitalization of \$7,908,000.00 in January 1949, the University of Texas, Bureau of Business Research reported. Charters issued in December totaled 273; the January 1948 total was 398. Merchandising establishments received 81 charters; real estate, 42; manufacturing, 32; and construction, 22.

AUSTIN, Feb. 26. — January rail shipments of Texas fruits and vegetables totaled 8,852 carloads, a 44 - per - cent monthly increase but 32 per cent below January 1949, the University of Texas, Bureau of Business Research reported.

Revenue Collection Hike Is Reported

AUSTIN, Feb. 26. — Federal internal revenue collections in Texas totaled \$218,279,280 in January, a rise of 24 per cent over January 1948, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported. Increases of 34 per cent in the North Texas district and 16 per cent in South Texas were reported. Collections of 726,935,016 for the six months' period of July 1, 1948 - January 31, 1949, as compared to \$632,904,840 for the last six months in 1947 - 1948 represented a 15 - per - cent gain. (Rosy) Rosenthal announced his candidacy for mayor, while C. A. Shockey and W. H. LaRoque announced that they were candidates for city councilmen in the city election to be held on April 5. The three men said they had agreed to run after being urged to do so by a large group of voters and citizens. Mr. Rosenthal issued the following statement: TO THE VOTERS OF CISCO: In answer to numerous requests that I place my name on the ballot as a candidate for mayor in the election to be held April 5, 1949, I have given the unsolicited honor considerable consideration and thought and in appreciation of same, I am submitting my name for your consideration in the coming election. Should you see fit to place me in office as mayor, I can assure you that my utmost efforts will be for the advancement and welfare of Cisco. My entire time can and will be devoted to duties of this office. I have been a resident of Cisco for nearly 30 years, coming to Cisco in December, 1919, and in the near future I will retire from employment of the Humble Pipe Line Company after these 30 years of most pleasant duties in the engineering department. These years of residing here have convinced me that Cisco is an ideal city to call home and am proud to say that I have made this decision, and will direct all my efforts for the good of Cisco. Your support will be my obligation. G. C. (Rosy) ROSENTHALL. Mr. Shockey and Mr. LaRoque announced that they were ardent supporters of the candidacy of Mr. Rosenthal for mayor and gave as one reason for making the race the fact that they desire to hold "up the hands" of Mr. Rosenthal, should they be elected, to the end that he may give Cisco a just, efficient and economical administration, with special privileges to none, they said. A program of piano music was played by Jack Sharp, who also accompanied Miss Mary Jeanette Poe as she sang a popular

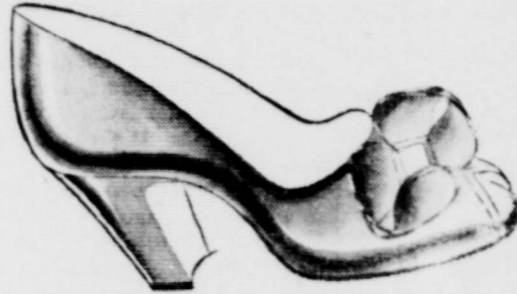
