A. Z. Myrick Is Re-Elected Dairy Assn. President

A. Z. Myrick of Cisco was re-elected president of the Eastland County Dairy Association at a meeting held in the Eastland County courthouse Monday night, it was announced Tuesday. Also re-elected for another year were Harry Crow of Carbon, vice president, and L. R. Higgenbottom of Gorman, secretary-treasurer.

A nominating committee was appointed to name candidates for the board of directors, who will be elected at the next meeting.

Members heard a report on the organization's artificial insemination program, and the extension of the program was discussed. The technicians reported that 60 cows had been serviced under the program during the first three weeks of operation.

It was decided to begin a membership drive among dairymen and business men of the county at an early date and plans for the drive were discussed.

Plans for the Eastland County Dairy Show were discussed and it was decided to hold the show in Eastland on April 15. A committee was appointed to work out the details of the show and to prepare a show bulletin and program.

President Myrick reported that the meeting was well attended and that interest was greater than at any previous meeting. He reported that the association was working on wide plans for the development of a great dairy industry for the county.

Texas Firms Get Much Business In U. S. Contracts

DALLAS, March 2. — Manufacturers and dealers of Texas furnished materials valued at \$54,964,933 to the Federal Government under the Walsh-Healy Public Contracts Act during 1948, it was announced here today by William J. Rogers, regional director in the five Southwestern states for the Wage and Hour Public Contracts Divisions, U. S. Department of Labor.

Commodities covered by the contracts last year included: Petroleum products, \$14,212,556; stone, clay and glass products, \$9,339,627; transportation, equipment, \$6,296,805; food and kindred products, \$4,467,149; textiles and apparel, \$3,148,965; fabricated metal products, \$1,765,456; chemicals and chemical products, \$961,965; metals and basic metal products, \$892,722; wood products and furniture, \$868,605; ordnance and accessories, \$666,000; machinery, other than electrical, \$360,431; electrical machinery, \$200,357; paper and allied products, \$179,442; printing products, \$12,304; and miscellaneous products, \$11,592,545.

Five Southwestern states — Arkansas, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico and Louisiana — accounted for a total of \$78,921,013 in such contracts last year, Rogers said at his headquarters, 1114 Commerce Street.

E. E. Blackwell of Ranger was elected president for the new year. George F. Bennett of Eastland was named vice president and Mrs. John Love of Ranger was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

A. Z. Myrick of Cisco, J. F. Mosley of Ranger, W. B. Starr of Seranton, J. C. Donaldson of Gorman, R. A. Tucker of Cheney, B. B. Freeman of Ranger and R. O. Buckley of Desdemona were elected directors.

In discussing the aims and objectives of the farm body, Mr. Blackwell pointed out that the way the farmer can protect his interest in the state and national picture was through organization.

In the doubles competition, Dick Bearman and Tut Tabor rolled 999 as Roscoe Ponsler and Glen White shot a 1094 to place 8th on the big board at the Young Street lanes. Danger Of Wind Damage Decreases

The hazard of wind damage to Texas fields and crops was decreasing daily due to heavy rainfall over much of the state and the rapid growth of grains and grasses, according to a report from the United States Department of Agriculture.

Farmers over a wide area made rapid progress in plowing and bedding land in preparation for spring planting last week, but the work came to an abrupt halt as heavy rains made field work impossible. During the fair weather that prevailed over most of the state for a few days, substantial progress was made in the seeding of oats and barley acreage.

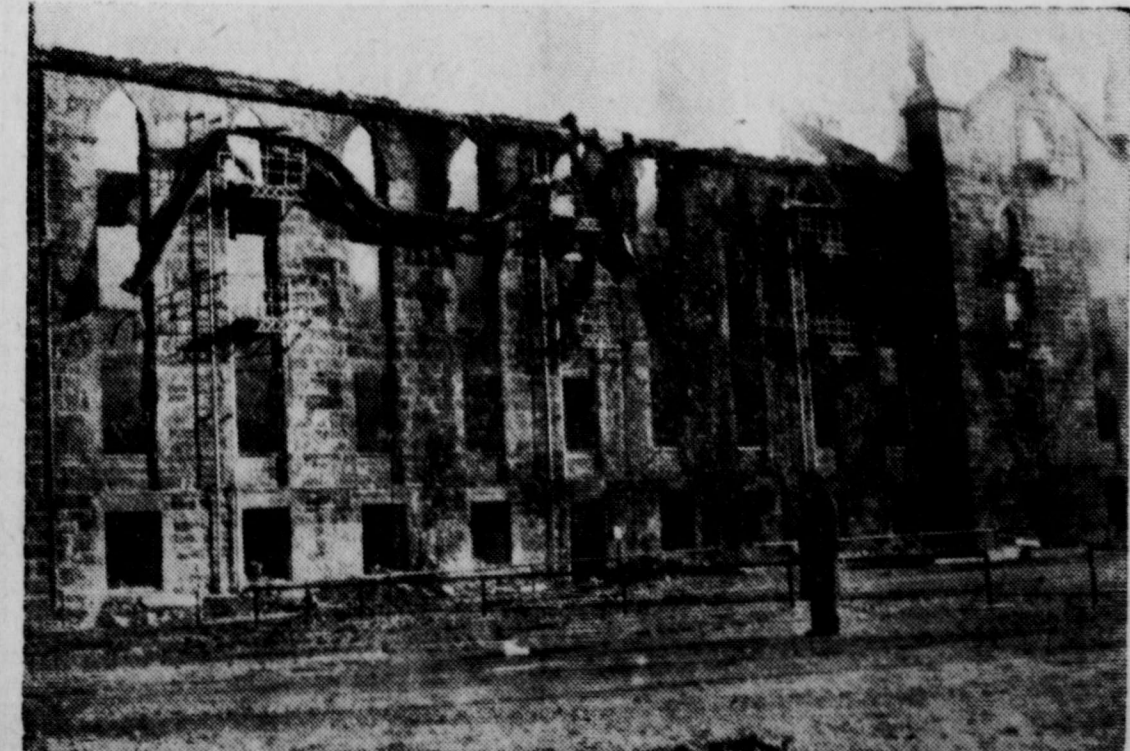
In the plains area wheat grew rapidly and further diminished the chance of serious wind damage. Corn was planted as far north as central Texas.

Range and pasture responded to warmer weather and supplemental feeding was on a fast decline as natural feed became more plentiful. Wheat was being grazed in some areas and farmers and ranchmen were reported to be pleased with the general outlook.
