Erwin took Ellen Wampler to be his bride, all their eight children and many of their 21 grand children and 24 great grand children and more than 75 family friends gathered at the couple's home in the Sabanno community on February 27 for an anniversary dinner and party.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Erwin were born in Parker County. Mr. Erwin was born on August 2, 1861, and Mrs. Erwin was born on February 3, 1865. Two years after their marriage, in 1884 the couple moved to their present home where they have lived for 63 years.

Religious Census To Be Taken By Church Workers Here Sunday

Groups from 18 churches here will launch a city-wide religious census Sunday afternoon in a house to house visitation to determine the number of citizens attending church, non-members, and latest calculations on new residents of Cisco.

The group of about 200 volunteer workers will assemble at the First Baptist Church, campaign headquarters immediately following morning services, it was stated.

Truman Taylor, youth director at the Baptist Church, will head the annual church project, sponsored by the Cisco Ministerial Alliance.

Taylor said the workers would be broken up into 15 teams, composed of a captain and ten workers. Each team will be assigned to a zone, arranged beforehand, to cover and collect data and information the alliance seeks.

"By this plan," Taylor said, the workers can cover the entire town in one day's time and with little effort on the part of the volunteer enumerators.

"After each team has completed its role, it will return to the Baptist Church and hand in the returns."

"This survey," Taylor said, "will aid the churches of Cisco in enlisting new members to their respective congregations. On the card, the workers will fill in such items as what religion the interviewed person prefers, names of family members, how long a resident of Cisco and others."

The campaign committee urged Ciscoans to cooperate with the workers in their task Sunday afternoon. The Alliance, of which Rev. Otis Strickland is president, asked citizens to keep in pets and animals which might cause harm to workers approaching the house.

The project will be conducted through Sunday only and all residents were requested to be on hand for the census interviews to assure a complete and "up-to-date" listing.

The church and school census are unrelated, the alliance said and are not to be confused with each other. Final statistics of the census will be released by the department after a tabulation this week.

Wranglers Shaping Up After Full Week Of Spring Football Training

Back aches and sore muscles dominated the Cisco Junior College spring football camp Saturday after a full week of limbering up exercises, drills and inter-squad scrimmages.

Coach Stormey Davi, the new head man around the football grounds a CJC had a group of 37 Wrangler aspirants running through mock plays from the T-formation Friday afternoon and Saturday morning. Davi recently altered plans to include the T.

Passing and running plays were the big features for the most of the first week of a 21-day grind in which Davi hopes to mold a prospective squad of athletes for next year's college football.

"It's going to take time, patience and hard, down to earth practice before the squad can begin to act like football players," he said. "We've got some pretty good boys out this year."

To date, Davi's spring squad consists mainly of last year's freshmen lettermen except for the addition of five newcomers to the ranks from Cisco High School.

Robert Randall, last year's snickered back for the Lobos, was back in the line at guard, his first love before being switched. He still has the pep and drive.

Others from CHS include George Watts, Ray Gene Rylee, Rex Farley and Clarence Nobles.

Davi is expecting reinforcements from mid-term high school graduates and former players to fill in the holes before fall practice comes around.

Harold Hill, former Lobo grid star, was showing promising form after a year's absence from the field. Hill, who tips the scales at 260 pounds, soaking wet, is a candidate for the right tackle slot.

Many of last year's eligible lettermen were missing from training for the most of the first week, but Davi has been assured of their return before the second week's end.

Donald Price, heaviest man on Everett's squad last year, will don grid togs soon, Davi said. "Don is going to make a real player in the line next year and bears some watching during the spring session," he pointed out.

Davi's real problem at the present is recruiting back field players to boost his up-and-coming machine. Time ruled out such players as James Ed Gann, Bill McQuire, Douglas Garner and almost the entire 1948 back field.

Three New Names Entered In City Election April 5

Three new hats were thrown into the political ring Saturday as one man announced his candidacy for the office of mayor and two announced for the office of commissioner in the city election to be held here on April 5. Others were expected to enter the race prior to the final filing date—March 15.

In announcing for the office of mayor, C. H. (Cliff) Jones said that he had done so at the insistence of friends and that he would issue a statement later. Announcing their candidacies for the office of commissioner were Don Rupe, service station operator, and C. M. (Clint) Brittain.

Brittain said that he would release a statement within the next few days.

In making his announcement, Mr. Rupe made the following statement:

"To the Voters of Cisco: In announcing my candidacy for the office of city commissioner, I wish to make it clear that I am running absolutely as an independent and am not publicly supporting any of the other candidates in the election; but pledge, if elected, to give my full cooperation to the mayor and other commissioners."

"I am running strictly on my own merits at the insistence of my many friends. I have no political axe to grind and my sole purpose in running is to offer my services to my community."

McCracken Asks City Council Post

A fifth candidate for a place on the Cisco City Commission announced for office late Saturday. He is James P. McCracken, an official of the First National Bank.

In connection with his announcement, McCracken issued the following statement:

"To the Citizens of Cisco: At the request of my friends I have decided to offer my candidacy for city commissioner in the municipal election of Tuesday, April 5.

"I have lived in and around Cisco for 33 years, and I feel that the people of Cisco know me well enough to make any long statement unnecessary.

"I only wish to say that I have no purpose in offering other than to serve my community to the best of my ability, in a spirit of fairness to all and for the elected. I will endeavor to do a good job.

"I graduated from Cisco High School in 1924. I am 41 years of age, a veteran of World War II. My business is banking and stock raising. I am married and have one child and own my home at 507 West 7th Street.

"I feel that I am well enough acquainted with Cisco and our community problems to serve as a commissioner, and I am certainly deeply interested in and eager for the welfare and sound growth of our community.

"I will appreciate the support of the good people of this community and, if elected, I shall serve to the best of my ability."

Two File For Places On School Board

Stanley Webb and L. A. Hooker, well known Cisco business men, announced Saturday that they were candidates for places on the Board of Trustees of the Cisco Independent School District at the election to be held on April 6 at the City Hall. They reported that their petitions had been filed with the secretary of the Board.

The final filing date for candidates has been set at 10 days prior to the election.

Webb is a farm implement dealer, and Hooker is a jeweler.

WONT RUN AGAIN

S. H. Nance and George Downey, whose terms as members of the Cisco City Commission expire next month, announced Saturday that they would not be candidates for re-election. Both expressed their appreciation for the encouragement that many persons offered in asking them to run again for the commission.

Mrs. Randolph Lee Clark Is Nominated For Texas And National Mother Award

The name of Mrs. Randolph Lee Clark, prominent Cisco club and church woman, has been submitted to the American Mothers' Committee for consideration as Texas Mother and American Mother, and her many friends and The Cisco Daily Press are working hard to help bring the deserved honor to her and to the community.

The committee selects a Texas mother in connection with the observance of Mother's Day each year.

The name of Mrs. Clark was submitted by friends who have known her for many years and know the story of sacrifice she has made in raising to maturity nine children. The things that are to be considered in making the selection are motherhood, citizenship and the ability to make friends.

The fact that she has reared nine children, seven girls and two boys, is enough in itself to entitle her to the honor; but when the accomplishments of the children are considered and the fact that those accomplishments were largely due to the devotion and sacrifice of the mother, entitles her to the honorary title of State and National Mother.

One son, Randolph Lee Clark, graduated from the University, is now head of the M. D. Johnson Cancer Research Hospital in Houston. The other son, Joseph Addison, recently resigned his position as public relations secretary of the State Medical Board to enter the insurance business in Austin.

All of the daughters followed their mother in the love for music. All seven of them are accomplished musicians and the first five used the knowledge that they obtained from their mother in assisting them pay college expenses. Two of the daughters are married to doctors and the other daughters occupy places of high respect in the communities in which they live.

The education of her nine children was made possible only because Mrs. Clark refused to

quit. Through her love for music and for teaching, she was able to add to the income of her teacher-preacher husband, a sufficient amount to clothe them and finish their education. During her career she has been head of the music department of various colleges and schools over the state.

She is a graduate of Baylor School for Women and Baylor University and obtained her voice degree from Texas Christian University after she was married and the mother of three daughters who attended her graduation recital.

of a teacher and preacher who like many members of his profession, was forced to move from town to town to follow the lot of his choice. Papers sent in by her pupils in Wichita Falls were instrumental in gaining for the music department of the University of Texas its first affiliation.

Mrs. Clark became a member of the Church of Christ at the age of 12 and has been a member since that time. While the children were at home, all nine of them accompanied their parents to Church and Sunday School every Sunday. Mrs. Clark, at the age of 73, continues ardently to support her church work and is active in all church affairs.

She is past president of the Federated Clubs of Cisco, past president of the Cisco Garder Club and at present is Chaplain of the Charles Crawford Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. She is also chairman of the Advancement of American Music group in Cisco.

At the death of her husband several years ago, she refused to live with her children and is content to live alone—finding her happiness in her music pupils and her host of friends. Between educating her children and her teaching she has sandwiched in a hobby of collecting antiques and has one of the finest collections of china and glass that can be found.

Mrs. Clark has truly lived a life that is full of sacrifice for others and one of happiness for herself.

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Old Fight Renewed

The 10-year-old fight over chiropractic, osteopathy and naturopathy is about to break out in the state senate again. This time it will revolve around Sen. Walter Tynan's so-called basic sciences bill. The Bill, sponsored by the Texas Medical Association, was reported favorably by the public health committee.

The bill is so worded that it provides for setting up a board of medical men to examine chiropractors, osteopaths and naturopaths for state licenses. It also provides an examination on anatomy, physiology, chemistry, bacteriology, hygiene and public health.

This basic sciences bill would in effect, give medical doctors life-or-death power over practitioners in the other three arts. It could automatically freeze all methods and processes to the standards of the medical profession. It gives the practitioners of the physical healing arts no voice whatsoever in control of their professions.

The examination itself, if one of those practitioners is to pass it, would require all the study that a medical doctor must have, even though the chiropractor, osteopath and naturopath possibly doesn't need it.

That's like forcing a printer to learn mimeographing, or a stenographer to learn bookkeeping, or an overland truck driver to learn to operate a railroad locomotive.

There is no doubt but what the physical healing arts should be legalized and licensed to provide for full state control. But there is no reason why the medical profession should have control of the other healing arts. If the legislature must legal-

ize these practices, and it should, then why shouldn't it act on any one of a number of bills legalizing those professions rather than on one which seems to force the will of one group on another? — Galveston Tribune.

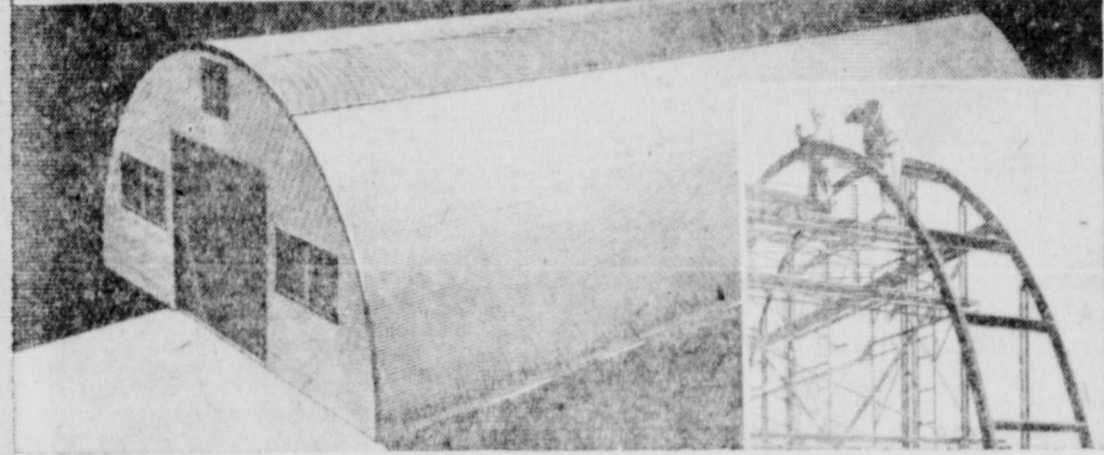

The freedom enjoyed and taken for granted by so many Americans is a priceless jewel to Gaida Miller of Canton, O. Seeing her country of Latvia overrun twice within a few years, first by the Germans and then by the plundering Russians; seeing her family vanish; knowing the heartbreak of forced labor camps, — all these have taught an appreciation of the freedoms in the country where she came as a war bride of ex-G. I. Gilbert Miller.

The United States is Latvia, enlarged many times, according to Gaida, for her country had a democratic government patterned closely after that of the U. S. Telephones, radios, electrical appliances and many of the other conveniences which Americans enjoy, with the exception of automobiles, were common to them. However her country had nothing to compare with giant industries like the Timken Roller Bearing Company where both she and her husband work. "In Eastern Europe there are no benefits for the working people as are taken for granted here," says Mrs. Miller.
