Duo-Pianists Will Be Presented At Community Concert

Alfred and Herbert Teitschik, Duo-Pianists will be presented by the Community Concert Association at the Eastland High School Auditorium at eight p. m., Tuesday, March 15. Admittance will be limited to holders of memberships in the organization. The Teitschiks were born at Floresville, Texas, of Austrian parents and received their early musical training from their father, an old-world musician. Later they attended Juilliard School, graduated, returned to Houston where each was married and settled down to teach music in the public schools and in his own studio. To satisfy their love of music, they began giving two-piano recitals on the side and soon discovered the difficulty of finding two evenly matched pianos in out-of-the-way places. To overcome this hazard, they developed what their friends call "Operation trailer." To their car they have attached a trailer rigged for storing and transporting two pianos. These they repair and tune, using an electrical tuning instrument with flashes of light. Called to active duty at the beginning of the War they were assigned to military orchestras, but their special talents were recognized and they gave numerous two-piano recitals for the armed forces, thus gaining experience for the career they now pursue. Their program will offer a variety of numbers and was designed to delight all listeners.

According to Lee, owner and manager of the Cisco Steam Laundry, young Billy opened the back door and toppled onto the pavement. He was rushed to a Brownwood hospital. X-ray examinations showed no broken bones.

After being treated for bruises and scratches, hospital attendants released the boy in the custody of Mrs. L. W. Whitfield, grandmother of the victim. He will stay in his grandmother's home until he is sufficiently recovered, it was stated.

Grand Jury To Meet Thursday To Study Fatal Stabbing Here Monday

The 91st District Court Grand Jury will convene Thursday to consider murder charges filed against H. O. Green of Cisco in connection with the fatal stabbing early Monday of J. G. (Jiggs) Sublett, also of Cisco, according to Everett Grisham, district attorney.

Bail of \$2,500 was set for Green by W. E. Brown, justice of the peace, but he remained in jail Wednesday, according to Grisham, awaiting the Grand Jury report. Mr. Grisham stated that Green had asked for an indictment on the charges and an early trial. He said that the indictment would probably be returned tomorrow and the trial set for March 22.

After considering the murder charges and possibly a few swindling cases the jury will be dismissed until March 23

when it will be called for further hearings. At that time other cases of interest to Cisco will be studied, it was reported. The District Attorney and Judge George L. Davenport joined the sheriff's office against promiscuous cashing of checks. They reported that cases involving swindling and bad checks were increasing rapidly and urged all business men to exert care in the future. Grisham said that if the merchants failed to demand proper identification or proof that checks were good it would result in adding assistants to his staff to prosecute and investigate offenders. The cost to the merchant and to the county would be prohibitive, he said. Judge Davenport has asked the Grand Jury to make recommendations on the matter.

Mystery Of Missing Pilots Believed Solved As Plane Owner Is Located

The Mystery of the two missing flyers and a wrecked single engine Stinson airplane found early Sunday morning in a plowed field one mile west of Cisco was partially solved by airport authorities here today.

Since late Tuesday afternoon Civil Aeronautics authorities and City Constable R. C. Farmer have been seeking the whereabouts of the Stinson's two missing fliers and the solution to the mystery that surrounded the crashed airplane.

T. W. Keith, Cisco airport manager, said Wednesday that he had received two telegrams identifying the Stinson from a San Bernardino, Calif., man. The man, Les Farrar, claimed ownership of the plane.

Farrar indicated in the telegram knowledge of the plane's whereabouts and inquired as to the cost of repairs sustained in the emergency landing.

Officials here estimated that damages would exceed \$400. Early Wednesday morning a second telegram concerning the Stinson was received by Keith from Wade B. Hatch of Akron,

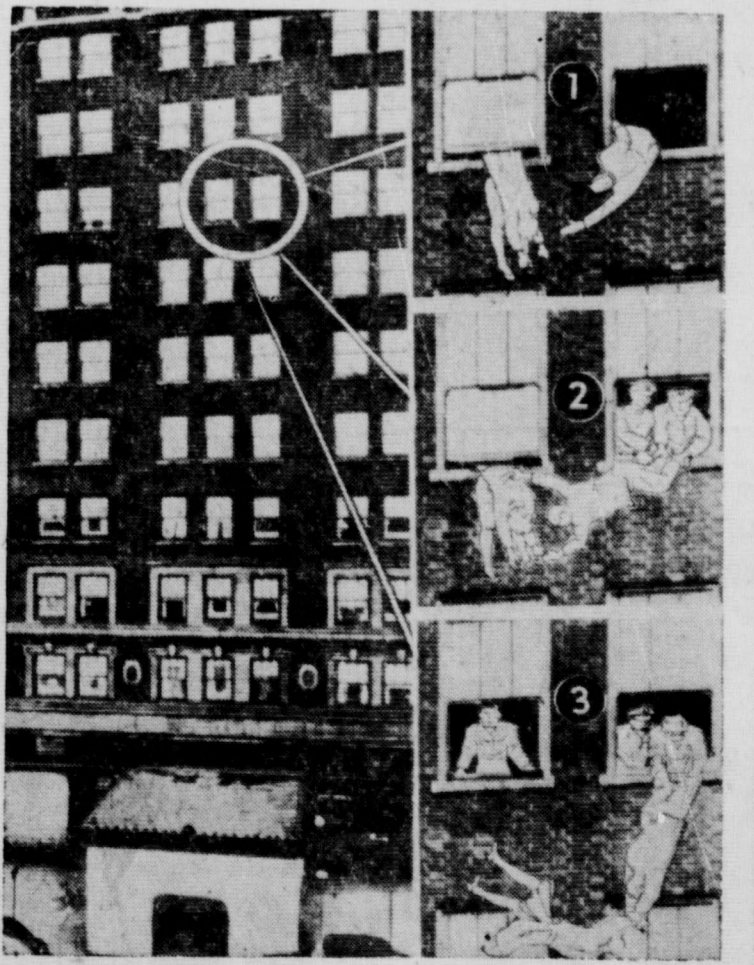
At present, the biggest question is the backfield. "We lost some experienced ball handlers this year and it is going to be hard to replace them," Davis stated.

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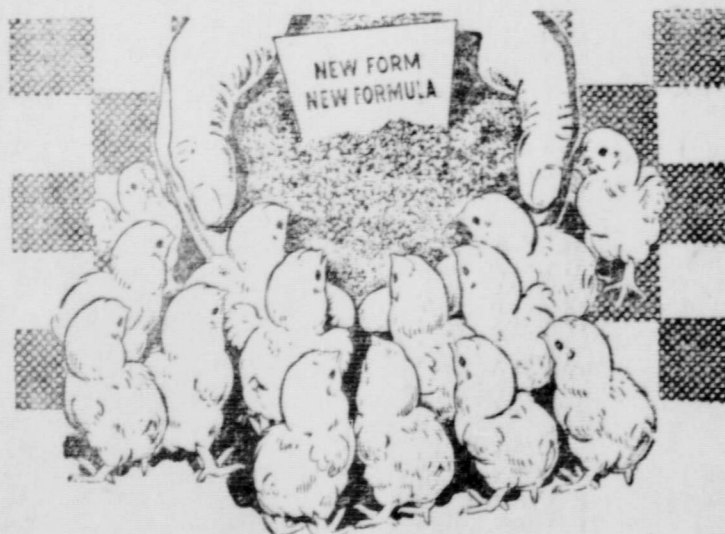
