Henrys Attend Dealer's Meeting

Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Henry of Cisco have just returned from a conference of several hundred men at Fort Worth where they attended the Purina feed dealers' meeting. Feed dealers from Texas and Oklahoma were present to learn of the newest developments and trends in the feed business and new ideas in scientific farm management.

Program speakers sounded optimistic notes for farmers in reviewing the prospects for 1949. They pointed out that feed prices should be lower during the year while the demand and prices for meat, milk, and eggs are expected to remain good.

This feed dealer conference was the first to be held since 1941.

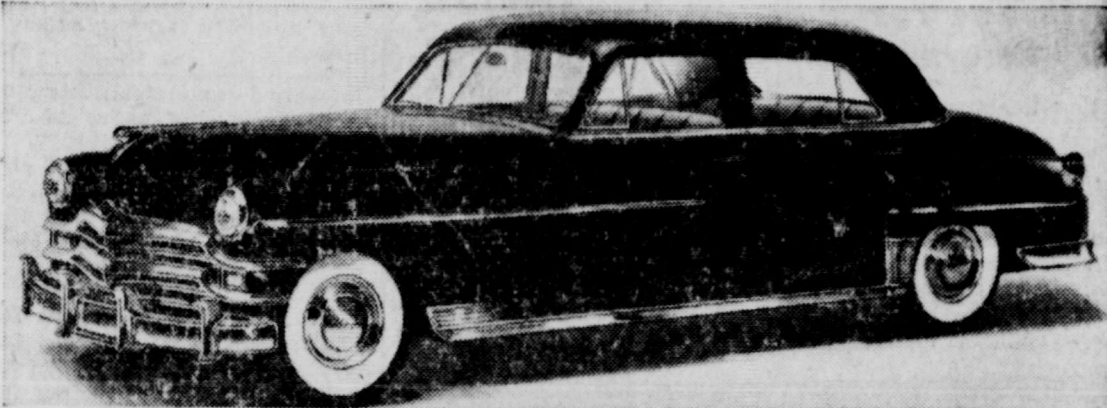
It was believed that the local drive was the first to reach the objective and Lauderdale and the entire Council thanked the citizens for contributing so liberally.

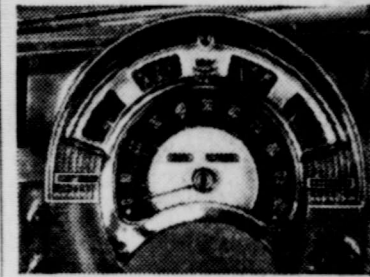
throughout and reflects common sense and good taste. Fifteen distinctive body styles are offered.

A new waterproof ignition system has been installed promoting smoother idling, improved low-speed performance and

quick, easy starting. It also almost completely eliminates interference with radio and television reception.

A new type of nylon upholstery is offered in some models and a nylon-face type in others, supplementing the fine broad-cloth, pile fabrics and other materials that will continue to be available.

The Brownings returned home — satisfied.

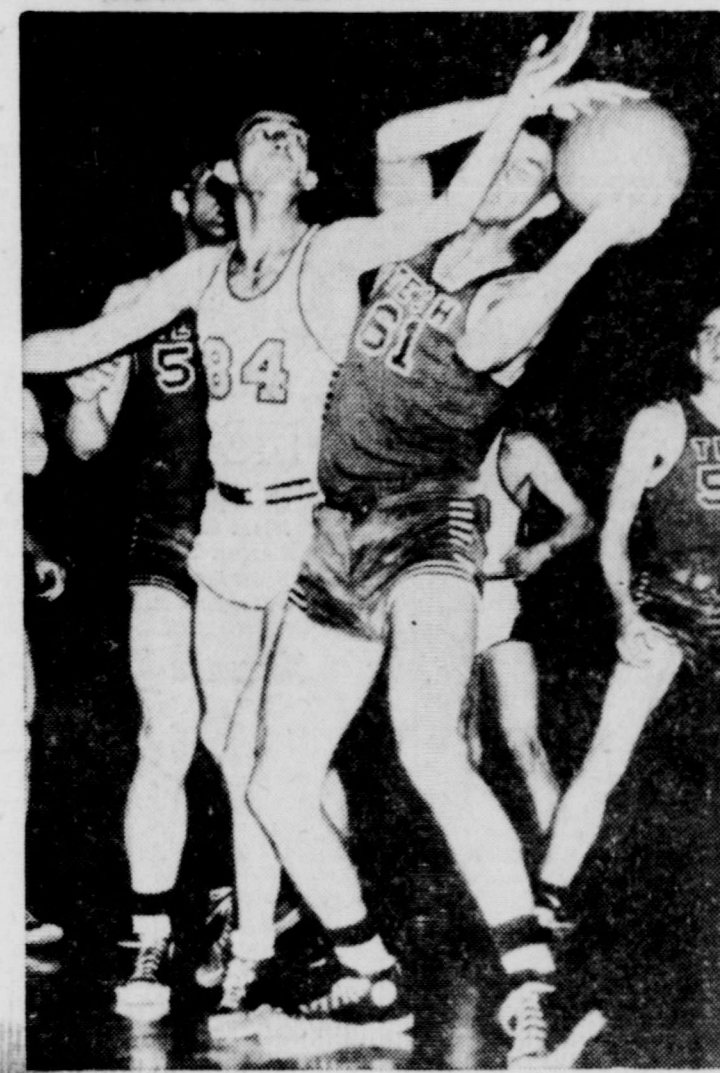
The bait? It a trade secret.

Recruiting Service Still Accepting Applications For Army Enlistments

Due to a sharp cutback in recruiting for the regular Army and Regular Air Force many qualified persons in this area received the impression that no more enlistments were being accomplished, according to S-Sgt. James Hendrick of the Eastland Recruiting Station.

"This certainly is not true," he said. "The Recruiting Service is still accepting applications and is especially interested in men and women who are exceptionally qualified for specialists training and attendance at various officer candidate schools and Aviation Cadet training."

"The choice of service is more liberal than in the past few months," he said.

"Although quota ceilings for Regular Army and Regular Air Force are limited, there is no

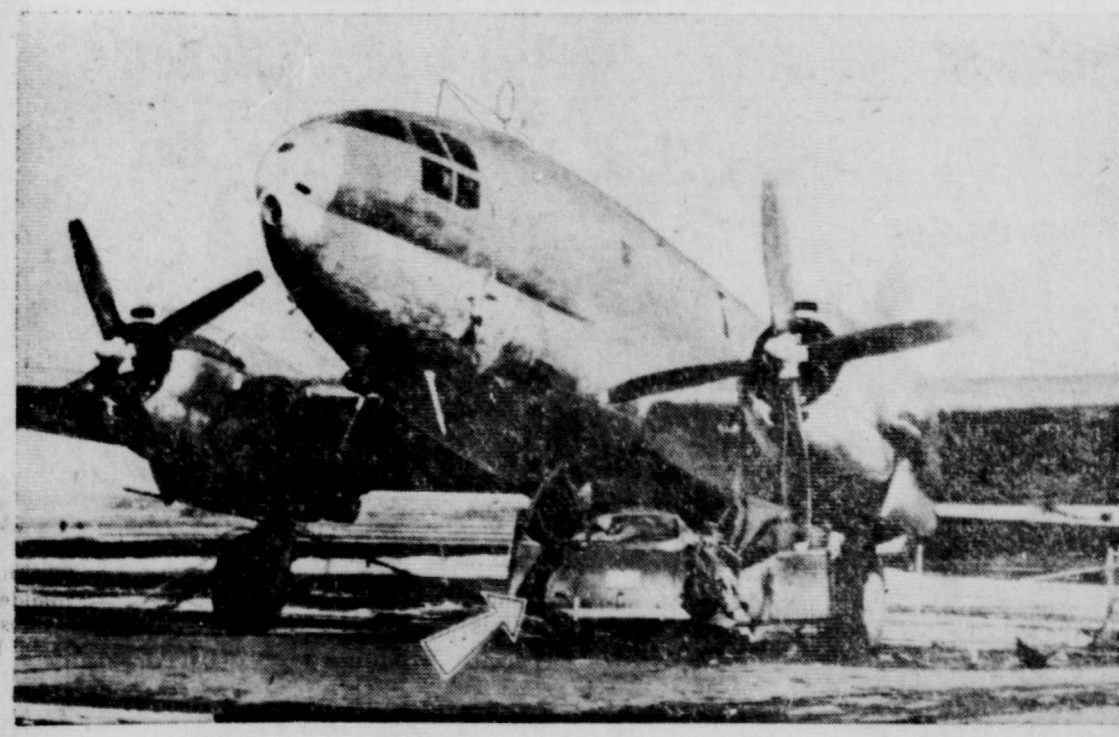
quota on the enlistment of 18 year old men or one-year enlistments in the Air Force of the United States and men enlisting in the Army and Air Force within 90 days from date of tag discharges." S-Sgt. Hendrick stated.

Oven and broiler meals were the topics used on the opening day of the Daily Press Cooking School Wednesday at the Texas Theater by four well known home economists.

The menu for the oven meal consisted of ham slice in orange juice, julienne carrots, baked potatoes and cream puffs with chocolate sauce.

Mrs. Clyde Stephenson and her co-workers, Misses June Clark and Cassie Honaker, explained the food preparation step by step and gave the following recipes:

Ham Slice In Orange Juice

Place in shallow baking dish one thick slice of ham. Add one half cup of orange juice and bake in moderate gas oven (375 degrees) for 1 hour and 15 minutes.

Cream Puffs

Place in sauce pan and bring to boil over full gas flame one half cup margarine and one cup water. Add all at once one cup sifted flour. Stir vigorously until mixture forms a ball in center of pan. Add one at a time four eggs. Beat well after each addition. When finished the mixture will be stiff and shiny. Drop from spoon onto well greased baking sheet. Bake in moderate gas oven (375 degrees) for one hour and 15 minutes. Makes eight puffs.

Chocolate Sauce

Combine and simmer over full flame for 10 minutes two squares of chocolate, 1 cup sugar, two tablespoons corn starch, one cup water, one teaspoon vanilla. Sauce may be stored in refrigerator and used as needed.

The menu for the broiler meal consisted of broiled veal chops, peach halves with current jelly and frozen peas.

Field Work Picks Up As Warm Weather Continues

Field activities gained momentum as soils dried enough to get back into the fields, although much of the east part of the state is still too wet. Wheat in the Cisco area and over all the wheat belt showed gains and some spring oats and barley were up. Some additional acreage was still being drilled.

Corn planting was becoming active particularly in the southern part of the state with some activity in the local area.

Fruit trees were in full bloom in South Texas and plum and apricot trees were blooming in Cisco as the warm weather continued.

Gardening in the local area was getting underway as it became dry enough to plow. Some English peas and early planted garden crops were up and seed dealers reported that their sales had taken a large jump this week.

Range and pasture feed was improving over the state and feeding was confined to areas where the sod was gone because of the drought. Grain fields were being grazed and growth was so rapid that the grazing was not evident. Cows and sheep made slight gains but some were still thin.

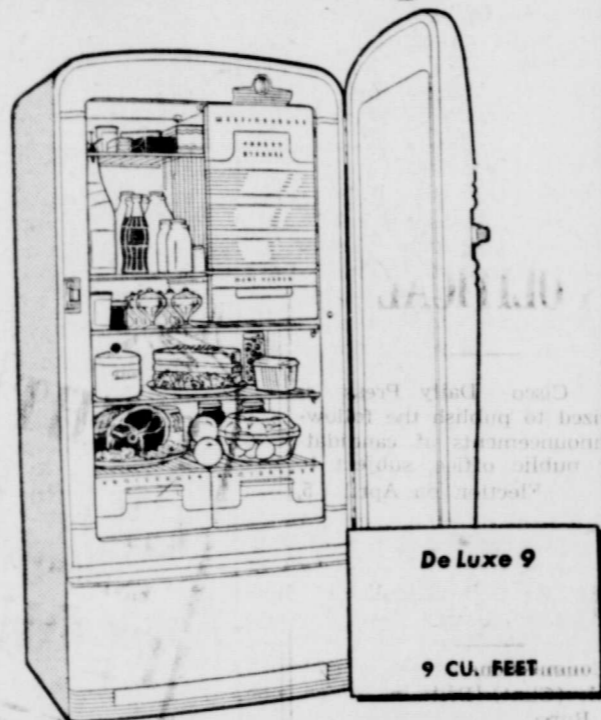

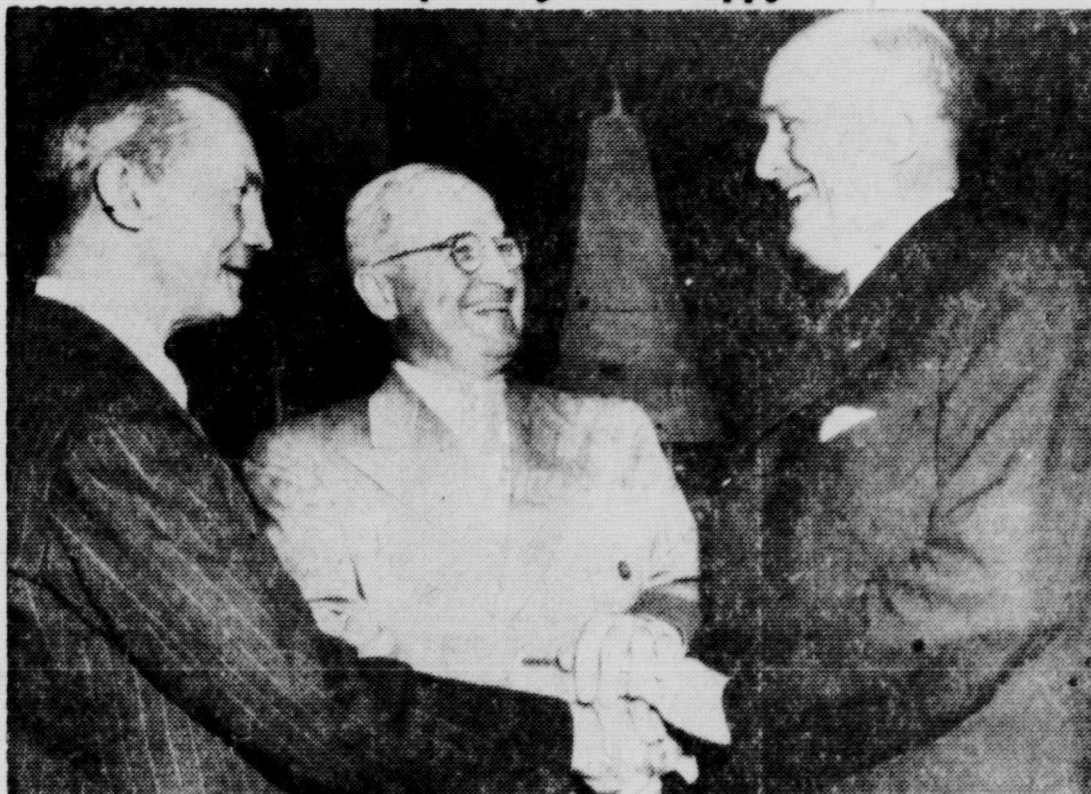

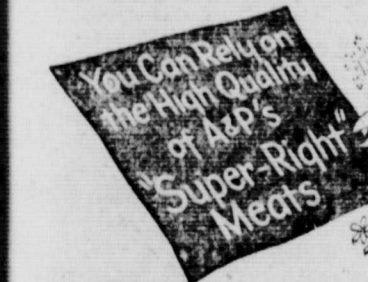

Baptists Set Baptism Record

rolled in weekly Bible study to 4,308,374. Gifts for all causes channeled through the churches reached \$136,605,521, a gain of almost \$25,000,000 over 1947. Of the total given, \$124,855,222 was used for local church work, and \$31,750,299 was used for missions, education, and benevolences.

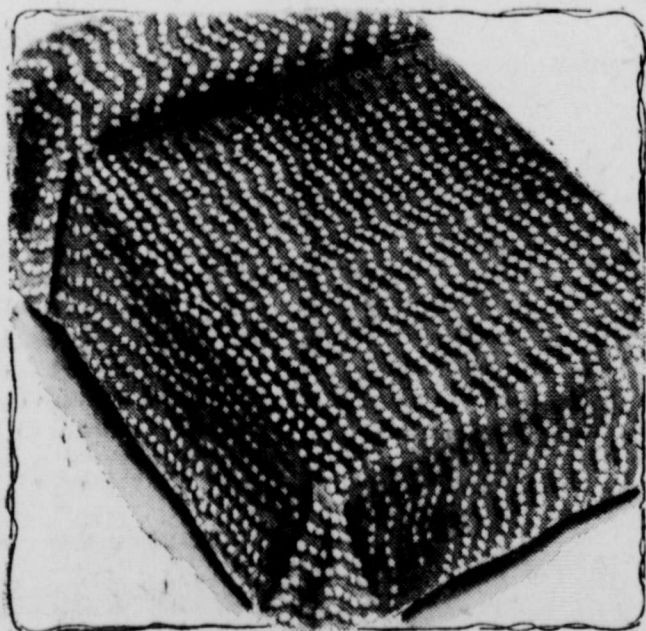
