



The menu for the oven meal consisted of ham slice in orange uice, julienne carrots, baked potatoes and cream puffs with with chocolate sauce.

Mrs. Clyde Stephenson and her co-workers. Misses June Clark and Cassie Honaker, explained the food preparation step by step and gave the following recipes

#### Ham Slice In Orange Juice

Place in shallow baking dish one thick slice of ham. Add one half cup of orange juice and bake in moderate gas oven (375 degrees) for 1 hour and 15 min utes.

#### **Cream Puffs**

Place in sauce pan and bring to boil over full gas flame one half cup margarine and one cup water. Add all at once one cur sifted flour. Stir vigorously until mixture forms a ball in center of pan. Add one at a time four eggs. Beat well after each addition. When finished the mixture will be stiff asd shiny. Drop from spoon onto well greased baking sheet. Bake in moderate gas oven (375 degrees) for one hour and 15 minutes. Makes eight puffs.

#### **Chocolate** Sauce

Combine and simmer over full flame for 10 minutes two squares of chocolate, 1 cup sugar, two tablespoons corn starch, one cup water, one teaspoon vanilla Sauce may be stored in refrigerator and used as needed.
