Pioneer Resident Dies At Home Of Daughter Menday

Funeral services were scheduled for 2 p. m. Wednesday for Mrs. Ophelia Wilson, 77, who died at 5:30 p. m. Monday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. J. H. Taylor on Avenue D after an illness of six weeks. Rev. Leeman Anderson will conduct the services at the Mission Church on Avenue A.

Mrs. Wilson, the widow of J. L. Wilson who died in 1942, was born in Coryell County on March 5, 1872, but had lived in and near Cisco for most of her life. She was one of 17 children, eleven of whom are still living.

Mrs. Boatman was born in Grayson County on October 13, 1871. She had been a resident of Eastland County for 43 years. Mr. Boatman died in September, 1942. She was a member of the Methodist Church.

She is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Glenn Calloway of Cisco; one sister, Mrs. Sarah Lee of Gracemont, Oklahoma; and three brothers Will Stowe and Jeff Stowe of Bennington, Oklahoma, and G. W. Stowe of Carbon. Four grandchildren and four great grandchildren also survive.

Two Electrocuted Near Pioneer Early Monday

Death by electrocution ended the lives of two refinery company employees one mile north of Pioneer early Monday morning when a joint of pipe they had excavated came in contact with overhead power lines.

Dead are Lee Doyle Collins, 22, of Rising Star and Bibbie Lee Harris, 18, both of Pioneer. Both had been living in the Pioneer area for five years, it was stated.

According to an eye-witness the tragedy occurred about 7:45 a. m. A physician at Rising Star Hospital said they were dead on arrival there about an hour later.

Foreman Lonnie Gray said Collins and Harris both had taken hold of the pipe and were preparing to drop it back into the ditch after cleaning it when the pipe came in contact with the power lines, a 7,200-volt rural line.

Artificial respiration was applied at the scene by the foreman in an effort to revive the youths. An ambulance from Cross Plains was then summoned, it was said.

The Higginbotham Funeral Home at Cross Plains was in charge of funeral arrangements for Harris. Collins' body was at Higginbotham Funeral Home in Rising Star.

Burial will be Tuesday afternoon at three o'clock for both boys at their separate homes, it was announced.

Scranton Girls Team Attends State Meet

The girls' basketball team of Scranton has returned from Hillsboro where they witnessed the state basketball championship play-offs. The trip was given them because of their fine record for the 1949 season in which they lost only 10 of their 37 games for a season average of 73.0.

Seagoville was the winner of the State championship but were forced to play two overtime periods in the final game. Their win enables them to play against the Iowa champions before an estimated crowd of 14,000 fans.

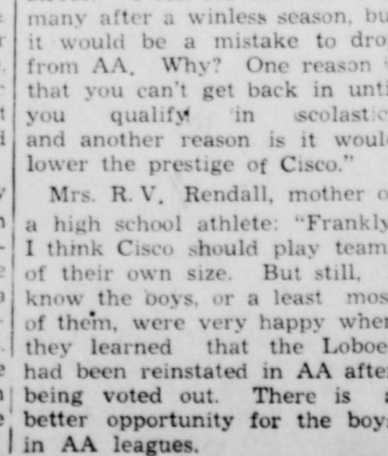

Points considered in the selection of the leading nominees and in selecting the State Mother as evidenced by the character and achievements of her children, her interest in social and world problems and her civic activities.

Mrs. Dolliee Davis Smith, poet-laureate of Texas, is chairman of the Texas committee and selected 40 other members from over the state to assist in making the nomination. Elsworth Mayer of Cisco was included in the group.

The National Mother will be selected from among the 48 State Mothers and will be given a trip to New York to participate in the observance of Mother's Day.

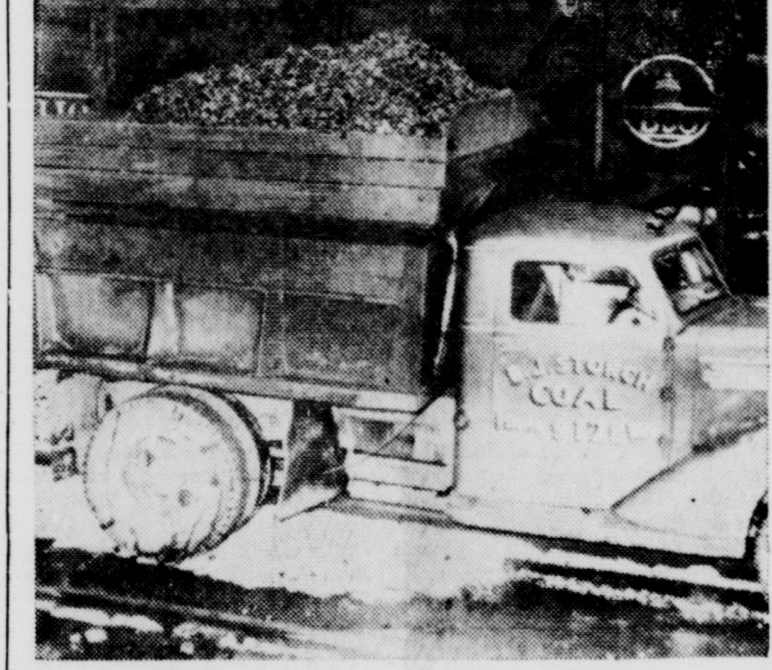

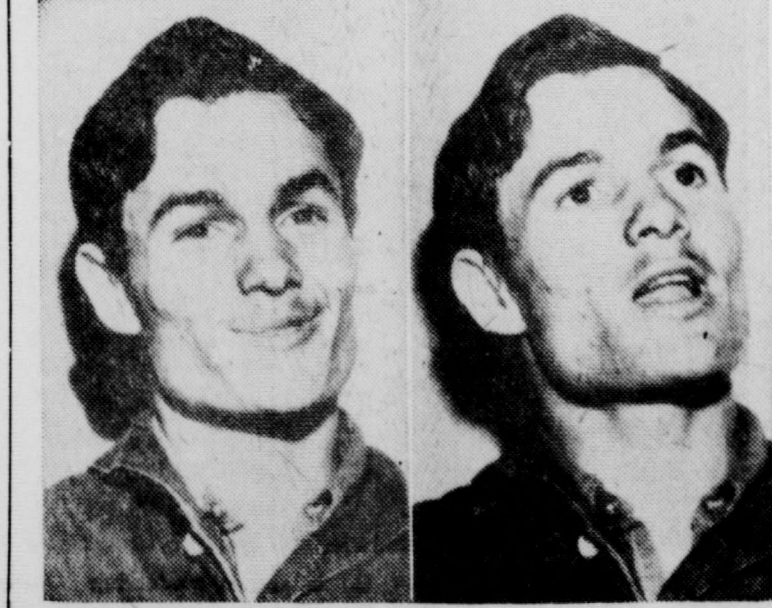
Coal Strike Begins

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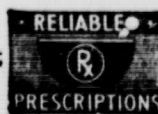
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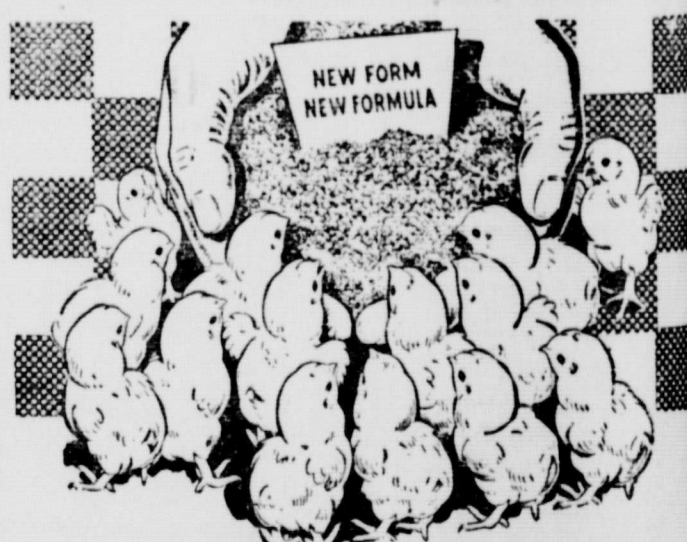
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
