Exams Planned To Fill Federal Jobs

The United States Civil Service Commission today announced the following examinations for positions in the Federal service: Teacher (Elementary, Secondary, Vocational), and Teacher-Advisor.

The starting salaries for teacher positions are \$2,496 and \$3,351 a year; and for teacher-advisor positions, \$2,724 and \$2,974 a year. These positions are in the Bureau of Indian Affairs of the Department of Interior and are located in various States and in the Territory of Alaska, where there are Indian schools. No written test is required of competitors in this examination. To qualify, they must have had the appropriate college education or education and teaching experience. At least one year of experience or 15 semester hours of study must have been completed with- in ten years immediately preceding date of application. Persons appointed as teachers in Indian schools will be expected not only to be teachers in the usual sense, but to be active participants in the community in which they work and exercise education leadership. The maximum age limit for the positions, waived for persons entitled to veteran preference, is 50 years.

Applications for the Teacher and Teacher-Advisor examination will be accepted until further notice by the Civil Service regional offices having jurisdiction over the areas in which vacancies exist. Applicants should consult the examination announcement for the addresses to these offices. Further information and application forms may be secured from the Commission's Local Secretary, Sam B. King at Cisco Post Office.

Intra-Squad Scrimmage Will Wind Up Wrangler Spring Football Training

The toil and grind of four weeks spring training will come to a bonafide conclusion — it is hoped — next Friday, when Coach Stormy Davis summons his 1949-50 edition of Cisco Junior College Wranglers for an intra-squad scrimmage to be reviewed at Chesley Field.

However, Davis hasn't officially released the date of the intra-squad bang-up, but it was understood the spring review would come off before this week's ending, probably Friday as stated.

"The 'mock battle' should give Ciscoans a glimpse of what to expect from the Wrangler footballers next season," said Davis before drill time Friday. "We've got some mighty fine athletes this year and our 30-day spring training has snapped out the hustle and vigor in some of our poorest prospects."

Although knocked hard by the loss of experienced, elusive ball handlers at last season's climax, Davis is being confronted with some of the most promising backs since the days of Mitford Johnson and Garland Lassiter. In to replace such backs as Bill McGuire, Homer Tompkins, Jack Leverage and Doug Garner will be Davis' most capable understudies — Ken Guthrie of Anson, a swift charger at 165 pounds; Harold Sides, 180 pound second year man from Whiteface; Alan Cavitt of Hobbs kicking ace, and Olen Lewis, 165 pound backfield candidate from Whiteface.

"We still need reserve backfield men and somebody to spell the line on defense," Davis said pessimistically. Then he added, "I think by the time the season rolls around we'll have just that."

Among returning players to lighten Davis' load include Donald Price, a line ripping tackle at 230 pounds and one of the conference best; James Swanner, lanky and more developed 160 pound end; Gene Millsap of Phillips, 180 pound center who has given off impressive starts; Charles Spicer, 165 pound guard; Garlyn Lee, angular 180 pound end bidder and others.

Numerous standout prospects have enrolled in Davis 40-man squad, to date, and a large number of recruits from Anson, Rising Star, Baird, Levelland and Paducah were indicated for entrance.

From those already participating in training, the addition of ex-Lobo stars to the squad have definitely given Davis reason to believe he will be fielding one of the finest junior college elevens in the con-

ference Robert Rendall, a human dynamo at 170 pounds has given Davis much hope for the future. Back at guard, Rendall will be on next fall's starting line-up. Also slated to see action are Harold Hill, a 200 pound tackle with a dynamite punch; Ray Rylee, a 175 pound fleet-footed end candidate; Rex Farley, 165 pound lad who will relieve Millsap at center during the coming year.

Other newcomers are Floye Flood of Anson, Gene Yeager of Baird, Joe Clark and Howard of Rising Star. All were highly regarded by high school coaches with years of ball service to their credit. In the kicking and passing department, Davis will probably rely on Cavitt, Leonard Grigsby, 160 pound 6 foot 1 inch end and Sides.

The effects of three weeks' training has left a considerable portion of the squad sore, but to Davis' delight, no serious injuries have been sustained.

Former Cisco Man Dies In Dallas

Cisco relatives have been notified of the sudden death of S. C. Trigg, 71, who died in Dallas Methodist Hospital early Friday afternoon following a two month illness.

Funeral arrangements were incomplete Saturday awaiting the arrival of next of kin.

A former resident of Eastland County for 45 years, Trigg was born May 7, 1878, in Lampasas, Texas. At the age of 21, he was married to Miss Bell Hart, also of Lampasas.

In 1900, Mr. and Mrs. Trigg moved to Eastland County to enter the stock farming trade and lived here until 1944. At the time of death, the couple was living with a daughter, Mrs. Bruce Younger of Dallas.

The deceased is survived by his wife, three daughters, Mrs. F. L. Williams and Mrs. Bruce Younger of Dallas and Mrs. T. J. Klinger of Midland and a son, J. A. Trigg, of Cisco. He is also survived by seven grandchildren and one nephew.

Six Thousand Expected At BTU Meet In Abilene

Six thousand Baptists from all over Texas are expected to meet in Abilene March 31-April 2 for the fifty-ninth annual state Training Union convention. Headquarters of the meeting will be the Rose field house on Hardin-Simmons university campus.

All general sessions of the convention are to be held in the field house auditorium. Departmental sections from nursery age children through adults will meet in the First Baptist, University Baptist, First Christian, First Presbyterian, and St. Pauls Methodist churches.

Dr. Guy Newman, pastor of the First Baptist church, Denison, is state Training Union president. He will preside at all general sessions.

The convention will be the scene of three state-wide church contests — the better music and better speech competition and the intermediate drill for proficiency in locating and understanding Bible scriptures. Winners of the speech and Bible tournaments will represent Texas in the Southwide contests in Ridgecrest, N. C., in July.

Approximately 200 people are to appear on the convention program, according to Dr. T. C. Garner, Dallas state Training Union secretary. Among the speakers are Dr. Robert G. Lee, Memphis, Tennessee; Dr. Joe Burton, editor Home Life magazine, Nashville, Tenn.; Dr. J. Howard Williams, state Baptist executive secretary, Dallas; and Dr. W. R. White, Baylor university president, Waco.

Special groups who will participate in the meeting include children from the state school for deaf in Austin; students from foreign countries now enrolled in Wayland Baptist college, Plainview; and the world-famous Hardin-Simmons Cowboy and Cowgirl bands.

An antique exhibit of old Training Union quarterlies, record books, study course diplomas, photographs, posters and newspaper clippings will present the history of the Baptist Training Union in Texas since its beginning in 1888.

## The Basic Science Bill

World War II was fought, at a frightful cost in lives and money, in defense of the American way of life—to preserve our system of free competitive enterprise and our personal liberties. Now, with the smoke of the battle barely cleared away, we are confronted with the spectacle of our own Legislature being high pressured into depriving the people of Texas of one of their most precious freedoms.

We refer to the right of citizens of Texas, when sick or injured, to have the physician of their choice. That right would be abridged, perhaps lost permanently, if the basic science bill, already passed by the House of Representatives and now before the Senate at Austin, is finally enacted into law.

The basic science bill as represented by proponents as a measure to raise the standards of practice of the healing arts in Texas. It would do nothing of the kind. It would have no effect on standards for the simple reason that the examinations in the basic sciences which it would require already are required by law and have been ever since 1907.

What enactment of this bill would do in time would be to create a monopoly for one group of practitioners by stifling the competition of the other groups.

There are several different kinds of physicians now practicing in Texas, each with its own concepts and theories of practice. There are the allopaths, for example the so-called medical doctors, the osteopaths, the homeopaths, and the eclectics and several others—all with different ideas as to the proper treatment of the ills that befall mankind.

As it is now, and as it should be, Texans are privileged, when sick, to call in the physician of their choice. If the basic science bill is enacted and it operates as it has in some other states, the time will come when Texans, regardless of their wishes in the matter, will have no choice but to patronize an allopath, or medical doctor. We do not believe that such a monopoly would be in the public interest.

It is significant that it is this group of doctors, through their professional closed shop, the Texas State Medical Association, which is behind the basic science bill. They, and they alone, are sponsoring it. We have yet to hear of a single organization of citizens anywhere in Texas, other than medical groups and their affiliates, petitioning the Legislature to pass this measure.

The basic science bill is now before the Senate. Before it comes up for final action, senators would do well to find out how the people back home feel about it. If that is done, we are confident the bill will be defeated, as it should be.

It is inconceivable that the people of Texas, already faced with the prospect of higher taxes to support existing state agencies, would approve of the creation of still another board which would duplicate to a large extent the work now being done ably and efficiently by the State Board of Medical Examiners. What the people want is fewer boards, bureaus and commissions, rather than more of them.

And it is inconceivable that the freedom-loving people of Texas favor any scheme calculated to give any group or class of doctors a monopoly on practice of the healing arts in this state.

The Senate should vote down the basic science bill or send it back to a committee with instructions to forget about it. Then all factions in the fight should call it quits, bury their hatchets and join forces against a common enemy—the threat of socialized medicine. — Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

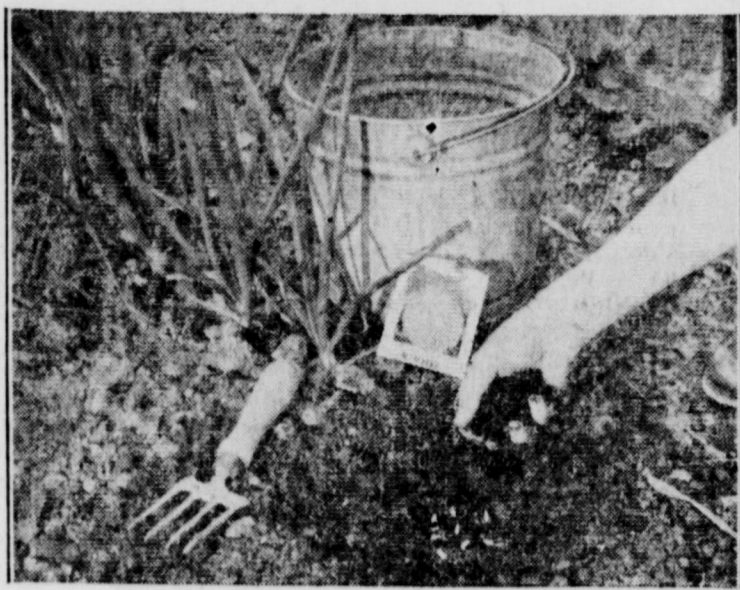

## Sow Large Flower Seeds Where Plant is to Stand



Sow Several Seeds to Insure a Sturdy Plant. If Excess Plants Develop, They Can Be Moved.

When flower seeds large enough to handle are sown direct in the garden, place them exactly where you want the plants to stand, so the sturdiest seedlings may mature without experiencing the shock of transplanting.

Sow three to five seeds to produce each plant desired. This will insure against failure of some seedlings from the disease and accidents which beset young plants. If several survive to the stage of vigorous youth, the excess plants may be considered as a bonus, and be removed to other locations.

The method to be followed in this kind of sowing should be the same that is used for sowing vegetables in hills.

Scoop out a shallow depression, and mix with the soil at its bottom a teaspoonful of balanced plant food; covering this with fresh soil so that the hole is nearly filled. Then sow the flower seeds, and cover lightly with porous top soil, or specially prepared covering soil. Mark the spot with a stake, so you will not disturb it with cultivating tools before the seeds sprout.

With flower seeds, even more than with vegetables, the depth to

which they are covered, and the light, porous character of the soil that covers them, are of vital importance.

The rule as to depth is that seeds be covered four times their diameter. This is obviously too precise for practical use, since some seeds are so tiny it would take a micrometer to determine the sowing depth.

There is no need for such precision, but the practical way to proceed is merely to press the finest seeds into fine soil and sprinkle just enough earth over them to cover; while larger seeds are placed deeper, in the proportion indicated by the rule.

This covering soil is more important than the soil below the seeds. If your garden has much clay, and you have a limited amount of humus, the best place for it is over the seeds. The main point is to prevent a crust from forming, and it will pay in many cases to prepare a special soil for covering. Mix a third of your best top soil, passed through a sieve, with a third coarse sand, and as much peat moss, or humus from the compost pile.

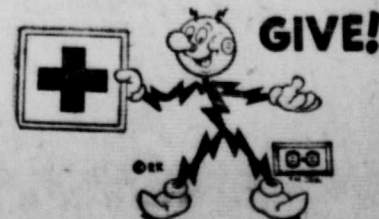
