56th Annual Jones County Singing Convention Will Be Held In Anson

ANSON, March 22 — On Sunday, April 3, people from all over Texas will gather in Anson for the 56th annual Jones County Singing Convention which is to be held in the High School Auditorium, as is the custom on each first Sunday in April. This convention is sponsored by the Anson Chamber of Commerce, which has made every effort to contact all organized groups and individual singers urging them to be present. Max H. Ward manager of the Anson chamber, has asked that if any group or person has not been contacted, to please consider themselves invited and meet with the convention on the set date. The local C of C will act as hosts at a luncheon for all out-of-county singers. On the first Sunday in April, 1893, the many people in Jones County who enjoyed group singing met in the courthouse in Anson and organized the Jones County Singing Convention, which today, besides being the oldest, is said to be the largest and most widely known program of its type in the state and possibly in the nation. Fifty-six years ago the singers came from over 40 miles away in buggies and wagons; today they come from the "four corners" of the state by some one of the various means of modern transportation. From the date of organization, the Convention was held in a different community in Jones County each year until 1942 when Anson was made its permanent home. Since then it has been under the sponsorship of the Anson Chamber of Commerce. On several convention dates, more than 4,000 persons assembled in Anson; last year's crowd topped all records with an estimated 5,000 in attendance. Another such attendance is expected this year. On this year's program, along with other well-known singers, will be the Stamps Ozark Quartet of Wichita Falls. Fred Bennett, a member of this quartet, is a former Ansonite and heads the convention as President. Other officers of the convention are: Max H. Ward, vice-president, and Mrs. Raymond Dav, Secretary-Treasurer. Local arrangements are being handled by these officers and the singing convention committee of the Anson Chamber of Commerce, composed of Roy Mays, Chairman; Albert Thompson, Raymond Day, and Jack Wilson.

Reburial Rites For Cross Plains War Hero Set

Reburial services for William Robert (Billy) Flippen, 20, who lost his life on May 24, 1945, while serving with the U. S. Army Infantry on Okinawa, will be held Thursday at 3 p. m. at the Cross Plains Baptist Church. Rev. Harvel S. James of Andrews will conduct the services and will be assisted by Rev. Chapman of Cross Plains. He was born in Pioneer, in Eastland County, and attended school in Mexia and Pioneer. He served with the 96th Infantry Division and received two Presidential Citations for bravery beyond the call of duty. He was also awarded the Purple Heart. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jess Flippen, prominent Pioneer residents and the brother of Mrs. R. D. Hitt, formerly of Cisco. His grandmother, Mrs. W. T. Cantrell, lives two miles east of Cisco. The remains will arrive in Baird at 12:15 p. m. Wednesday and will be met by a Higginbotham funeral coach from Cross Plains and honor guards from the Cross Plains American Legion. Full military honors will be accorded the ex-serviceman with the Rising Star American Legion assisting the Cross Plains Legion. Burial will be in the Pioneer cemetery. He is survived by his wife and small son, William Robert Flippen, Jr., 5, his parents and three sisters. The sisters are Mrs. Leona Hitt of Rising Star, Mrs. Nelson Larkin of Pioneer and Mrs. Jessie May Redditt of Pioneer. Flippen is the last of the Cross Plains war heroes who will be returned for reburial.

National Guard Unit To Be At County Livestock Show

Three companies of the Battery A, 961st Field Artillery National Guardsmen, Cisco, will assemble on the show grounds of the Eastland County Livestock Show for public review, it was announced today. Fat stock show visitors will see the latest in combat equipment and battle wear including the deadly 155 MM howitzer, light and heavy machine guns, and radio equipment. It will be the Cisco unit's first appearance before the public, Captain Olin Odom, commander stated. More than 50 officers and guardsmen will participate in the review.

Man Kidnapped Near Gatesville Released Here

Police over a wide area today were looking for two youths who Monday night kidnapped and robbed a motorist near Gatesville and forced him to drive them to Cisco where he was released. The kidnapped man, Jimmy Cox of Breckenridge, reported to local officers that he had picked up the two youths near Gatesville at 11 p. m. Monday and that they held him up at the point of a gun and forced him to accompany them to Cisco. He convinced the kidnappers that his wife was ill in a local hospital and they drove him to Graham Hospital where he was released. The two men then drove off in the automobile. Cox reported that he was robbed of \$23 and his identification papers and drivers license. The car, a 1949 Ford tudor sedan, had not been found. The license number was given as CB7803. Police Chief Perdue checked with the training school at Gatesville to see if the kidnappers were escapees from the institution, but was informed that none of the boys were missing. Cox described the boys as being of medium height and shabbily dressed. Cox is a salesman for a Waco wholesale house and was enroute to Breckenridge when the boys were picked up.

Local Man's Sister Celebrates 91st Birthday Recently

Mrs. Martha Malindy Byars of Memphis, Tennessee, who recently celebrated her 91st birthday with a big turkey dinner and by amazing friends with her ability to get things done, is the sister of H. R. Bridges of 401 West 2nd Street, Cisco. She is the oldest of 14 children and declares "keep busy or you'll get old." "Grandma," as she is affectionately known in her home town, is as chipper as most people half her age and can still read all but fine print without the aid of glasses and she can thread a needle with dexterity. To entertain her grandchildren and great-grandchildren she gets out her old spinning wheel and spins endless string of cotton thread from bananized rolls of cotton. "Just like I used to do when I was a little girl," she explained as she peers across the top of the big wheel. "In those days, however, I was hardly able to reach the top of the wheel." "We've worn out four steel spindles on this spinning wheel in all these years," she said. "And I wouldn't even try to say how many corn husk socks." "When she was a girl, Grandma used the same spinning wheel to spin the cotton thread, wove her own cloth on hand looms and sewed this into clothing. "This spinning wheel is older than I am," she said. "Grandfather bought it for my mother before I was born. He paid \$8.00 for two of them." "Remember the Civil War?" she was asked. "Shucks, yes," she said. "Who do you want to know about it?" and she went on to tell many of her experiences. She is forever sewing, knitting, darning or quilting and she said she did not keep busy she would get old. She has been a widow for 17 years. She was married 75 years ago.

## Seed Sowing "Know How" Brings Up Sturdy Plants

A question which every home gardener should answer before he sows a seed this spring is: How many seeds should he sow for every plant he expects to grow?

It is not uncommon for a hundred seeds to be sown in space sufficient for ten plants. This means a crop reduced by crowding, unless much work is expended on thinning out the excess plants.

There is a good reason for sowing more seeds than will be allowed to grow; but when this is overdone, there is a waste of seed and work.

Seeds that germinate slowly, such as carrots, parsley, and parsnips, should be sown more thickly than others because the seedlings are feeble, and the force of many acting together helps break the soil crust and bring the sprouts to the surface.



Cover seed only with porous soil; it's the best way to use humus from the compost pile.

Liberty H. Bailey, dean of horticultural teachers, expresses this opinion: "Thinning is a process of selection, and the best are allowed to remain. It is evident the chances of securing the best are greater when the gardener leaves one plant out of ten, rather than one plant out of three."

But real selection is impossible if seeds are sown so thickly the roots of the tiny plants become entangled, and it is impossible to remove single plants, without disturbing neighbors. The thickest sowing therefore should allow each seed sufficient space to develop as an individual.

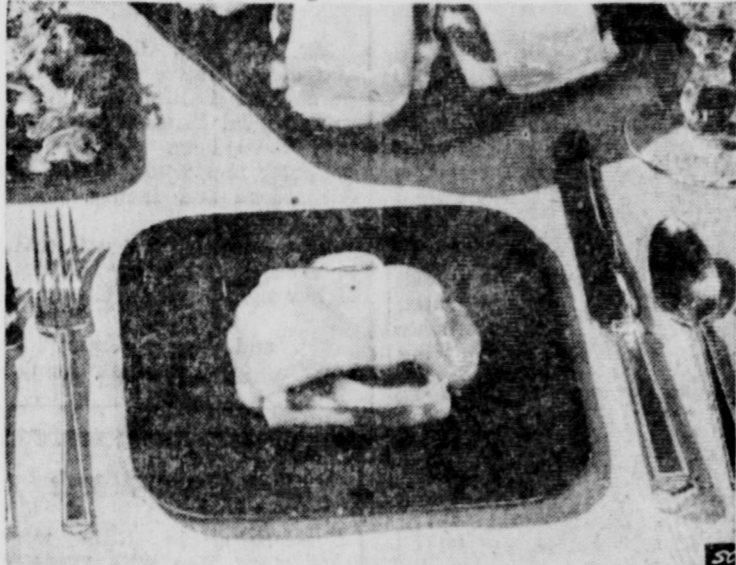
The surest way with small seeds

is to take a few in the hand, and let them fall through the fingers into the drill which has been prepared. Get close to the ground, and with a little practice you can quickly acquire control so that the seeds will be evenly distributed, each sufficiently distant from the next to prevent entanglement.

Keep the seeds in line as well as you can. It helps to let the garden drill which was used in making the drill remain in place until the seeds have been dropped.

It helps to mix the very small seeds with dry sand before you begin to sow, using two or three times as much sand as seed. This spreads the seeds out better.

## Try a Spanish Sandwich



For a bright change of pace in your meal planning, try a main dish sandwich with a Spanish air. This one is piqued with chili sauce, green pepper and onion rings, mellowed with lots of melted cheese.

A half pound of cheddar cheese supplies as much protein as a whole pound of average beef, and cheese is listed as a best food buy by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Make Spanish sandwiches for dinner tonight. Keep the recipe at hand for guest-night fare, for teen-age parties, and for the Lenten dinners you'll be planning.

### Spanish Sandwich

6 slices bread (crusts trimmed)	1/4 cup chopped green pepper
Mayonnaise	2 tablespoons butter or margarine
Onion rings	1/2 lb. American Pasteurized Process Cheese
1/2 cup chili sauce	

Toast the bread on one side and spread the untoasted side of each slice with mayonnaise. Top with onion rings.

Mix the chili sauce with the green pepper which has been sauteed in the butter or margarine. Spread two tablespoons of this mixture over each sandwich.

Cover with a slice of the cheese cut lengthwise of the loaf. Place in a moderate oven, 350°, or under low broiler heat until the cheese melts.

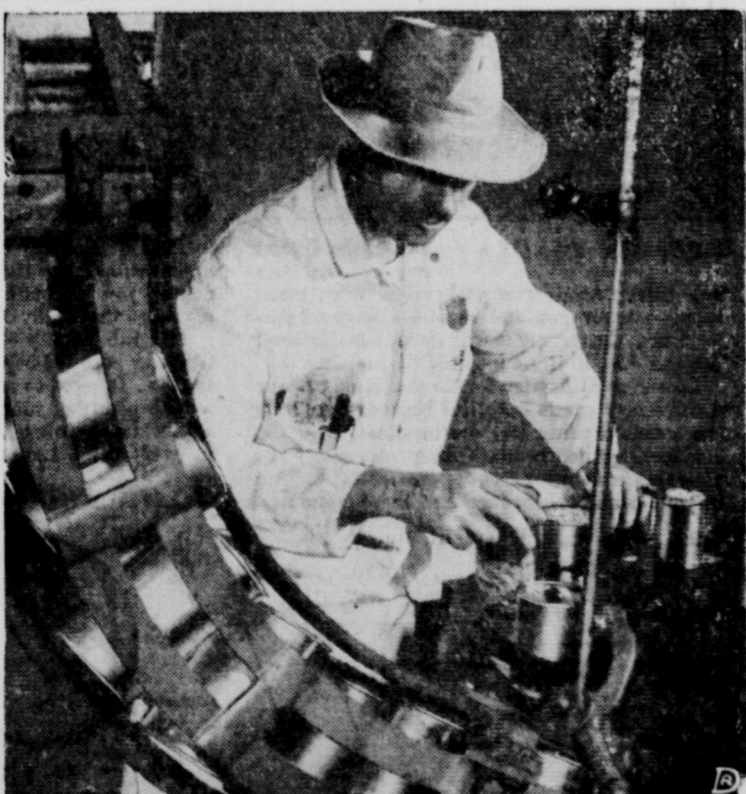

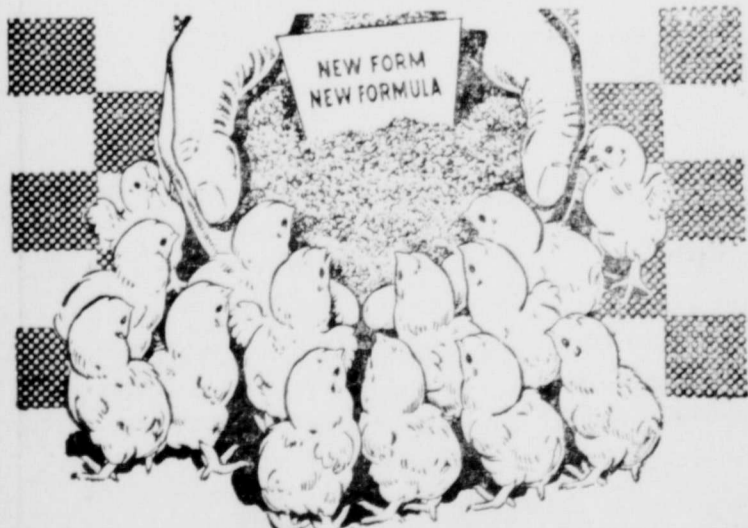

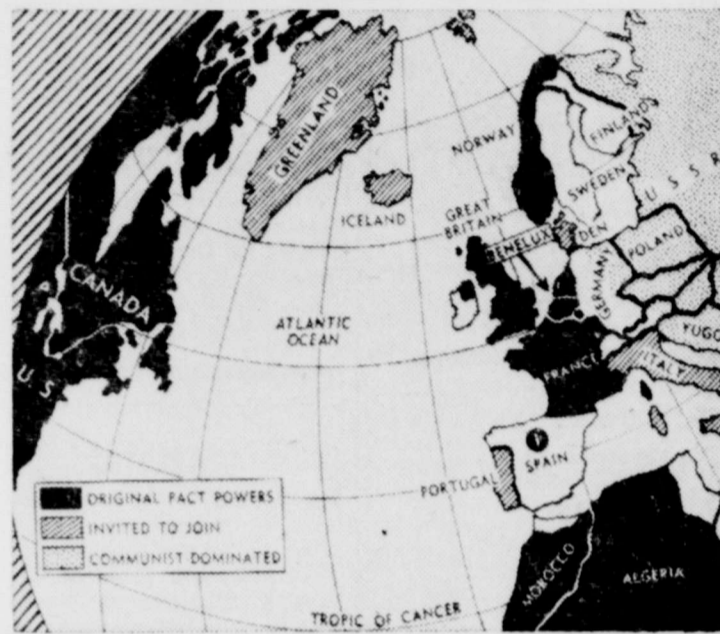
