Layne-Wells Co. Official Talks At Rotary Meeting

"Contrary to earlier ideas, physical science has proved that the atom is not the smallest particle," said Courtney J. Ritchie, manager of the Layne-Wells Oil Well Testing Co. here, in a talk before members of the Cisco Rotary Club Thursday at the Victor Hotel. The guest speaker, introduced by Rotarian Willard White, local attorney, briefly sketched the background and history of the Layne-Wells Company and the part it plays today in oil development.

"Layne-Wells is licensed under patents of Well Surveys, Inc., of Tulsa to operate radioactively well logging service in the United States and Canada," he said. Ritchie pointed out that his company's radioactivity well logging service utilized the first successful attempt or method of obtaining stratigraphic information from a borehole through casing. The service also permits study of the fluid contained in the rocks surrounding the cased borehole. A complete radioactivity test consists of two curves — a gamma ray curve and a neutron curve, he explained. He described a gamma ray curve and the neutron curve and showed the part they played in oil well analysis.

Prior to the main program, President Jess Proctor announced that the Cisco club would hold the annual election of officers Thursday, April 14. Nominations have been under study for the past three weeks, he stated.

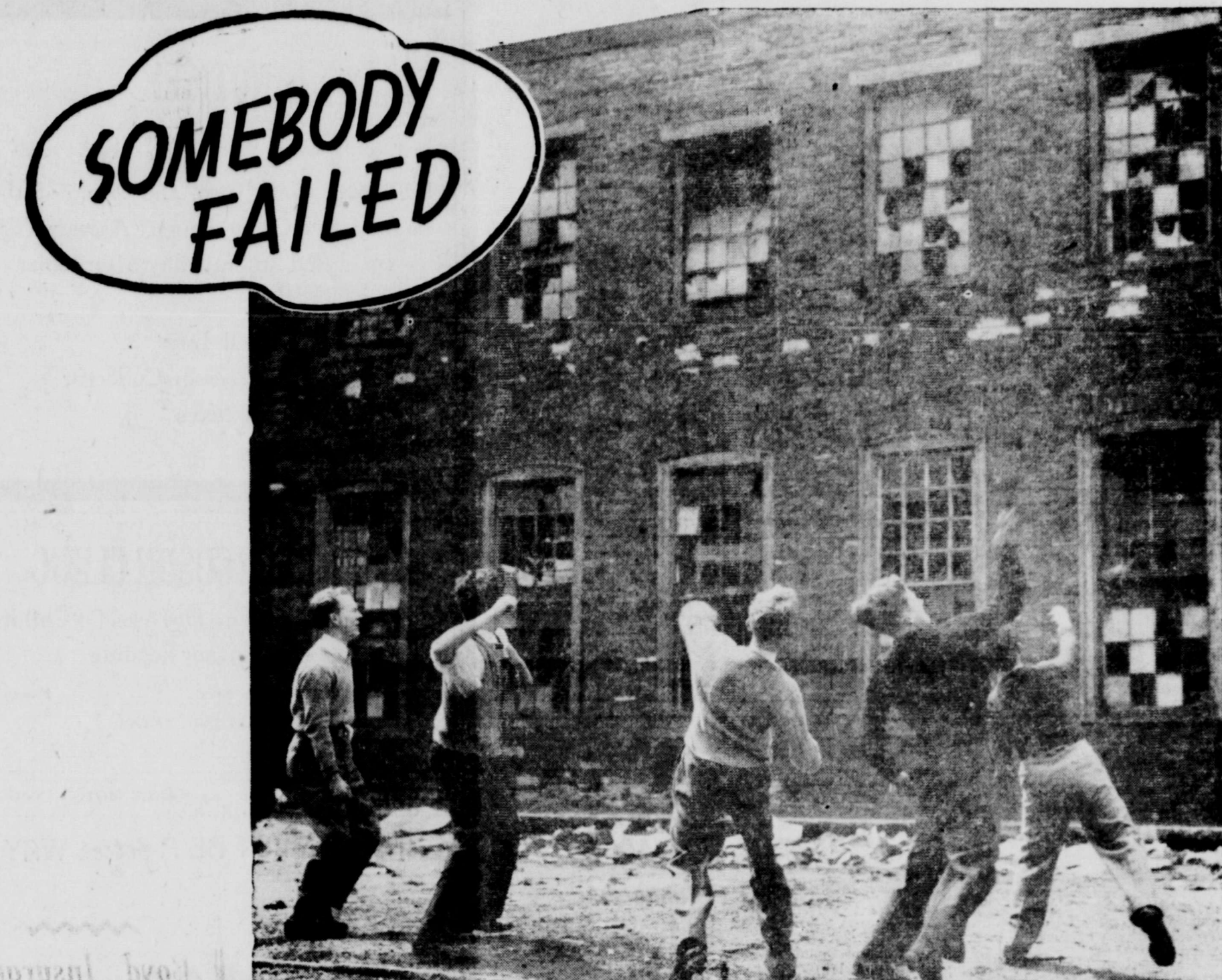

THE CHURCH NEEDS YOU — YOU NEED THE CHURCH



"WHO THREW THAT ROCK?"

The irate community wants to know whom to blame for the wrecking of the school house. The police want to know and the judge demands to know. Society will punish the boy who destroys property that belongs to others. Everyone has a right to know who threw the rock that damaged public property.

From the broken panes of glass and the wrecked house we go to court. Witnesses join with the officers to present the case to the judge on the bench. He rises to pronounce judgment. But another Judge takes over; his verdict is the important one.

The Heavenly Judge speaks: "I condemn first the father who went to the golf course on the fishing hole on Sunday morning when he should have taken this boy by the hand and led him to Sunday School and Church. He should have taught him reverence and integrity and the worship of God. The boy does not know the scale of values by which a good society operates.

"I condemn second, the mother who forgot to teach a son to whisper, 'Now I lay me down to sleep.' She was in too big a hurry to make the club or to join her friends in the evening of play. She really threw that rock the day she chose her own immediate pleasure at the sacrifice of her task in the home.

"I condemn a community and an age that has made prosperity its chief goal. Homes that are sleeping places for overweary women and men who chase the ever-fleeing dollar, do not deserve to have the training of eternal souls. Automobiles and clothes and rich foods and extravagant things are but refuse compared with precious human beings. The boys will go to reform school or to jail. But sorrowing hearts at home will grieve that too little time was given to share the best with these boys. We gave them clothes and food and shelter; we failed to give them ourselves. Now they suffer and we suffer and society misses the high service which they were capable of rendering.

Let's put more in the minds and hearts of our children, even if we must put less in their mouths and on their backs. God expects better things of us. What will the all-seeing Judge say to my boy and to me?

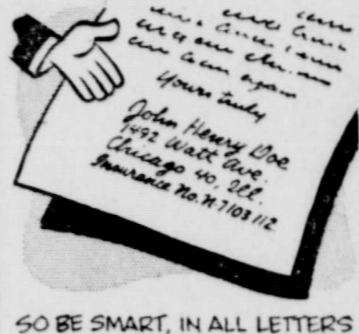
