NOT AN EASY JOB  
Flag Attendant At Cisco High School  
Stands High In Scouting And Classes

When it comes to shirking responsibilities, you might as well perish the thought when Eagle Scout Bill Mitcham, Cisco High School flag attendant, is in your presence. You see, Bill's a stout-hearted believer in carrying out obligations — without fail.

In Bill's capacity as flag attendant at the local high school, it is his chore to see that "Old Glory" is unfurled each morning over Cisco High and brought down after dismissal in the afternoon and put away. To him, well, Bill deems it a privilege to be called upon to care for and foster "Old Glory" like a small child.

Now don't get the impression that tending to the flag detail goes without problems — just what does? If you do, you'll change your mind after hearing some of Bill's accounts during the past two years he has handled the task. Bill and his "sidekicks," as he refers to them, have their hands full, especially after a junior and senior "squad" has been centered around the 55 foot flag pole, donated to the school by the Class of '41.

"So far this year," grinned Bill, "we have been lucky insofar as scraping grease from the pole is concerned. Last year, however, we got the Monday morning blues every time we took a glance at the pole."

"You see," said Bill, "the juniors and seniors were having their little differences over 'who's who' and they'd eventually wind up plastering grease on the pole."

As the tradition was, Bill explained, the class that could noist their colors, a makeshift and homemade affair, on the flag pole, and then keep it up, was considered the 'champs' at Cisco High.

"Now in order that the opposers couldn't skin up the pole, they'd slap buckets of grease on the steel pole, and that's where the rub came in. It was up to us to clean it off."

"Just in case the seniors, or the rivals, couldn't get the 'flag' down, they'd take a shotgun and blast it," Bill recalled. "And when they did, the blast would rip the rope into shreds and we'd have to order a new one."

Bill and his assistants, who are Freddy Smith, Vandell Weathers, H. K. McNeely and Bob Frost, after the chore is done, despite their trials.

Bill, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Mitcham, Sr., is a holder of more than 25 merit badges in Scouting and is presently striving for the Bronze Palm, one of Scouting's highest honors.

At 15, he has covered most of

scouting's phases in the three years he has been a member, a time which usually requires an additional two. He holds the rank of senior patrol leader in the troop, a job that requires patience and understanding.

The Case For Annexation

(An Editorial)

The Eastland County School Board has called an election for Monday, April 18, in order that the voters of the Cisco Independent School District and nine surrounding common school districts, now being served by the Cisco district, may vote on the proposition of consolidation.

Part of a county-wide reorganization program, the proposition is in keeping with recently enacted state laws. Purpose of the program is to give every student in Texas the same educational advantages.

The Press endorses the proposition and urges the voters of Cisco and the nine common school districts to give it their careful consideration. As we see it, the case is all for annexation.

More than 300 students living in the nine districts — Cottonwood, Salay, Bull Branch, Friendship, Romney, Lady Grove, Central, Bedford and Grapevine — are already attending Cisco schools and have been for years. So, there would be no change if consolidation is approved.

These students ride buses to Cisco for classes. These same buses bring students living in the nine communities to classes at Cisco Junior College — an extra service at no additional cost.

In some of the districts, minor adjustments would be made in tax structures under consolidation. Cisco property owners are paying \$1.30 per \$100 valuation. The rates in the nine areas are \$1.09 per \$100 with two exceptions, one pays \$1.20 and the other pays 70c per \$100. After consolidation, a new rate would be made to apply to the entire district. If it remains \$1.30, the additional cost to the common district property owners would be insignificant. For example, a 160-acre farm would only pay seven or eight dollars more per year in taxes.

It is important for the voters to back the proposition. The votes cast in each of the ten areas will be counted together, with the majority decision prevailing.

Consolidation would give Cisco an additional two million dollars or more in taxable property. It would enable the district's bonded debt to be systematically retired in half the time it would take to pay off under the present setup. If Cisco voters were to turn down the proposal, they would see some 300 students and 10 teachers taken out of the local school system.

Residents of the common school districts can be sure that by voting for the measure they will not be voting themselves into a debt-ridden district. Cisco's school system is paying off its bonded obligations — bonds due in 1950 have already been retired — in good order. Moreover, state laws strictly control the spending in every school district in the State of Texas.

By voting for Annexation, as the ballot will read, residents of Cisco and the nine districts will be laying the foundation on which a bigger and better school system can be built. Voters of Cisco will be voting to bring in good neighbors whom they have already been serving for years. And the voters of the nine districts, who have no buildings or facilities of their own, will be joining an organization that is now serving them and will be agreeing to pay their fair share of the cost.

Give this proposition your careful consideration. For the common good, present and future, it cannot be allowed to fail.

College Square Dance Teams Will Compete In Inter-College Contests

The Square Dance is staging a robust comeback in West Texas, avers a group of students and members of the Alpha Square Da Club at Cisco's Junior College.

Its expanding popularity will be demonstrated at the annual West Texas Square Dance Convention at Abilene on April 15, 16 and 17. It is a part of the Western Square Dancers Association, an organization that was formed last year for the purpose of uniting all square dancers in this section of the state.

According to reports, the folk dance club here is planning to hold a Mid-West Texas convention at Cisco Junior College a date to be decided by vote.

The Cisco Junior College Wrangler square dancers were preparing to send two teams to a meeting in Austin Friday but due to confusions, the convention was cancelled.

Jerry Westfall, first president of the college club here, has watched the old fashioned dance floor merriment climb in popularity and progress since the movement was first formed in February of last year.

"Square dancing at CJC seems to be a top form of entertainment on the campus these days something we didn't suspect would go over as well as it has," he said.

The organization started with no more than 20 charter members with only a few couples signing up. Now, the club is boasting more than 60 members, most of whom are representing a 75 mile radius around Cisco. The club has elected officers

and directors for the second year, and Charles Spicer of Anson was named president, Francis Surlis of Cisco, vice president; Ann Spenny, of Rising Star, secretary-treasurer; Patsy Anderson of Cisco, reporter, and Jerre Westfall and Robi Robinson, student callers.

The Alpha Square Da has been meeting every Monday, at which time the couples practice for forthcoming inter-college meets and conventions.

Victor Lawson and John Webb supervise the callers and instruct couples' routines. Music is furnished by records and occasionally by a quartet of college musicians.

### Cutworms Damaging Garden This Year

Cutworms are damaging nearly all garden crops this year. So if you have planted garden seed, be prepared to fight the cutworms. There are two ways to use a poison bait. The bait is made by mixing 5 pounds of wheat bran or shorts with one-fourth pound of Paris green or sodium fluoride. Pour into this mixture a pint of cheap molasses in between the plants and in the garden late in the afternoon, as at night is when the cutworm will do his damage. This bait is also good for sow and pill bugs.

The other thing that can be used to kill the cutworms is a 5% mixture DDT dust. This should be dusted just thick enough to cover the ground in the garden. If DDT dust is used, be sure and do not get it on any cucurbit crop as melons and cantaloupes.
