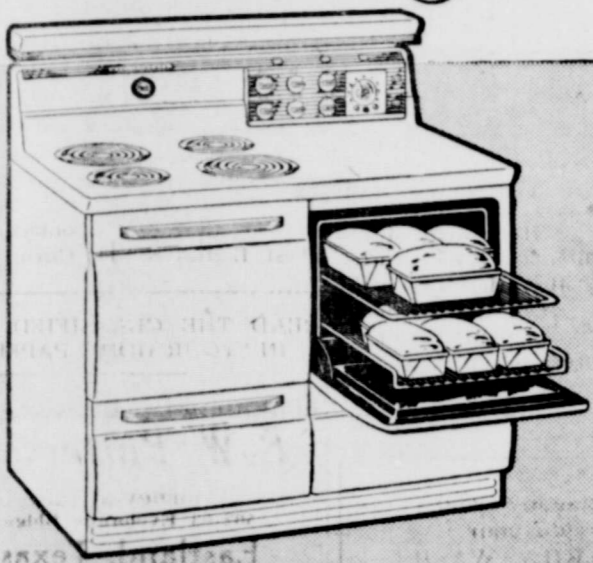

New Models Keep Bean in Lead as Garden Champion

Remarkable progress is being made by plant breeders with snap beans. New varieties are being introduced so fast, it might be said there is an improved model every year, as with automobiles.

Streamlining is favored by the bean designers. Their first big improvement - years ago - was to breed out the string. Some folks still ask for "string beans," like grandmother used to cook after laboriously removing the strings. Quality snap beans this year have pods six inches or longer, straight, round, filled with tender flesh. Pick them before the seeds have begun to show in the pod, and cook them within an hour or two, and you will understand what the breeders have in mind.

Beans should not be planted until the ground is warm. They are very tender to frost or to cold cutting winds in their younger stages. Gardens with light, warm, sandy soil can get an earlier bean start than those with heavy cold soil.

The first crop, in which you take a gamble with the weather, should be given the warmest, mellowest, and best drained patch in the garden. Later on when the frost danger is past it will make little difference, as the bean is the most obliging of vegetables and will even produce a fair crop in positions

much more shaded than some other vegetables will tolerate.

Both green beans and wax beans have their advocates as to superiority of flavor. Round pods are thicker and filled with flesh and have higher table quality, but the flat pods yield a larger crop.

The one warning concerning their cultivation is not to work the patch while the leaves of the beans are wet, either with dew or from rain. Rust seems to follow. A rust spotted pod ruins it for culinary use and this is about the only disaster likely to happen to a pod bean.

Pole beans are the heaviest yielders of the family, and in the small garden will give more food for the space occupied than any other crop.

They are later in season and more tender than bush beans. They should not be planted until the weather is settled and the ground warm. Plant six to eight seeds in a hill, and thin out to the four strongest. The hills should be two feet apart.

Kentucky Wonder is a favorite pole variety. It will produce pods ten inches long, if you wish, but these pods will have strings. If they are picked half grown the strings will not bother and the quality will be much better.

Health Officer Warns Against Typhoid Fever

AUSTIN, April 14. — The month of April usually brings

the first days of near-summer weather to Texas, and literally thousands of Texans commence to make serious and detailed plans for their annual vacation which is of great importance to the health and well being of every man and child.

A vacation can relax nervous tension, bring renewed vigor, and usually supplies an opportunity for more sunlight and outdoor activities than is customary for office workers and those of sedentary occupations. But traveling to vacation spots for the purpose of "roughing it" can also bring a serious health menace in the form of typhoid germs from impure water supplies, and for this reason, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, advises all persons contemplating such a vacation to first be inoculated against typhoid.

"Persons planning a vacation where sanitation standards may

not be carefully observed, should protect their health by typhoid inoculation, and thus

avoid the risk of serious illness from this debilitating and sometimes fatal disease," Dr. Cox said. "An individual not previously rendered immune, can establish immunity by having one typhoid vaccine injection administered each week for

three weeks; if he has kept his immunity from a previous inoculation, one 'booster' shot each year will keep him protected from typhoid."

Dr. Cox warned that impure water is not the only means of spreading typhoid, and cautioned against the careless exposure of food and milk to flies, roaches,

rodents, and other germ-spreading pests.

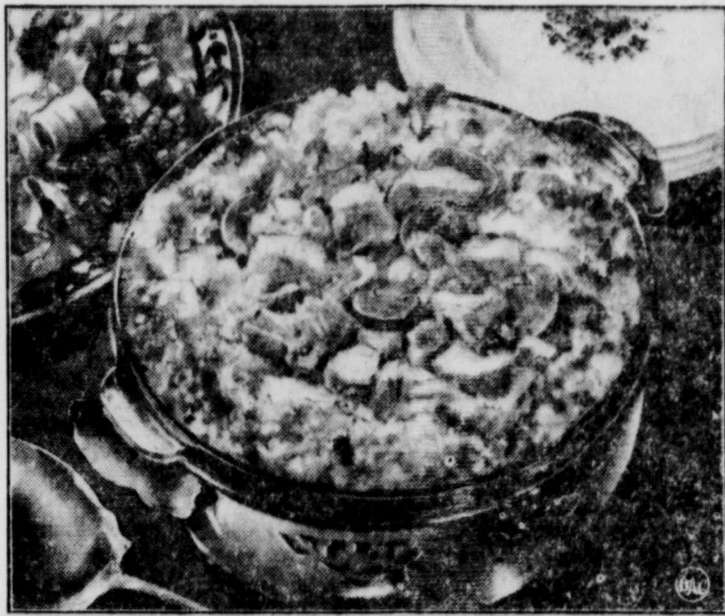
his youthful followers.

Canned Tuna Takes to Casseroles



Canned tuna is versatile. Its flavor and texture make it popular by itself and account for the fact that it may be fixed in almost as many ways as chicken.
A casserole main dish that will suit all the family combines luscious chunks of canned tuna, mushroom slices and egg noodles in a white sauce. Just as canned tuna may be fixed in many ways, this recipe itself has variation possibilities. If you don't want the bother of making the white sauce, a can of mushroom soup may be substituted. For another ingredient substitution, you may use cooked rice, elbow macaroni or spaghetti in place of the noodles. And if you wish to serve the creamed tuna over toast or potato chips, omit the bread crumbs called for in the recipe and skip the baking procedure. Just beat all the ingredients in a saucepan... except the bread crumbs... and serve over toast.
Thanks to the tin can, tuna may be enjoyed the country over and at all seasons of the year. The tin container brings it processed, safe,

rich in flavor and ready for a favorite service. Here is the recipe for delicious tuna and noodle casserole.

Tuna Noodle Casserole
1 6-ounce package 1 1/2-ounce can noodles
3 tablespoons 1 1/2-ounce can butter or margarine
3 tablespoons Milk
4 tablespoons 1/2 teaspoon Tabasco
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup buttered bread crumbs

Cook noodles according to directions on package; drain and place in 2 quart casserole. Mel butter, blend in flour and salt. Remove from heat. Drain tuna fish and mushroom liquid into measure, and milk to make 2 cups. Add gradually to flour and fat mixture and return to heat. Cook, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens and boils. Break tuna into pieces and add with mushrooms and Tabasco to sauce. Combine sauce with noodles in casserole. Sprinkle buttered crumbs over top in half around edge of casserole. Bake in moderate oven (375 F.) 30 minutes. YIELD: 6 servings.

children under contract or transfer agreement."
Elliot went on to explain that Cisco Independent School District trustees had nothing to do with the proposal. It was strictly a matter of getting the job done before the State board sent some one who was not familiar with the county to do the job.
He pointed out that the districts would be consolidated even though they voted against entering the proposed districts. The purpose of grouping the schools in the manner in which they were placed was to keep them in the districts where the children are now attending school.

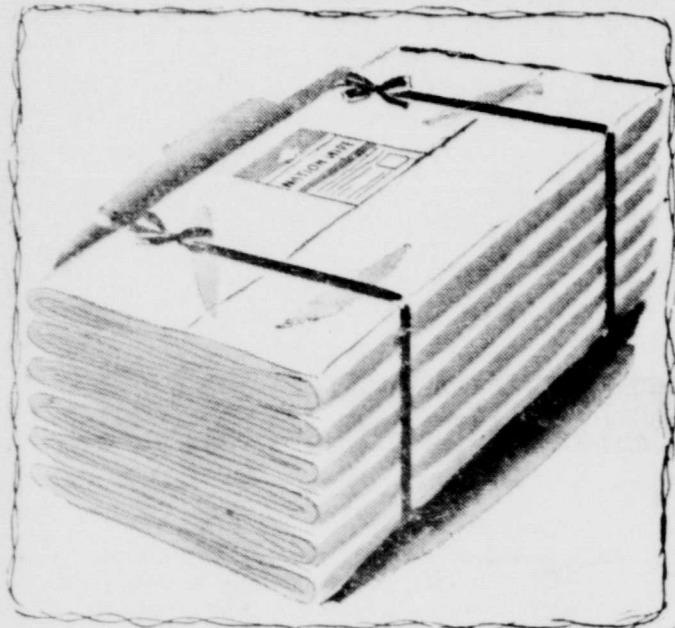

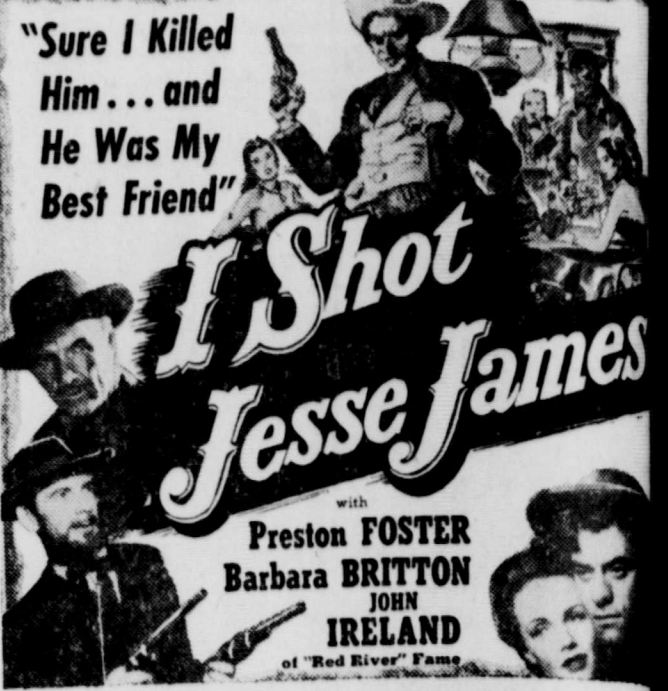
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
