Moisture Condition Is Good In Most Sections Of State

The moisture condition over most of Texas was good, according to reports issued by the Department of Agriculture, but in some areas, particularly in the Low Rolling Plains counties, surface moisture was needed. Field work made good progress over most of the state but in low bottom areas and much of the upper Coastal country, it was too wet to work. Wheat made good growth during the week and prospects were still good. Oats were beginning to head out in some sections and rust damage was heavy in places. Planting of corn was complete over most of Texas but cool nights were retarding growth. Gardens looked good in most sections and fruit prospects were favorable in most areas. Grasses and edible weeds were supplying an abundant supply of green feed for cattle over most of the state but cool nights retarded growth in some sections. Calves and lambs made rapid growth and the flow to market was steady. Sheep shearing was underway in most sections.

Bob Elliot, who served as vice president and program chairman of the Cisco Rotary Club during the past year, was unanimously elected to the presidency of the civic body at an election held at the regular meeting Thursday in the Victor Hotel.

C. W. Henry was elected vice-president and W. W. Fewell was re-elected secretary. G. R. Nance, R. L. Ponsler and W. P. Guinn were elected to serve as directors.

Elliot will fill the office now held by J. E. Proctor and Henry will step into the office being vacated by Elliot. Retiring directors are Charles Graham, Haywood Cabaness, J. W. Slaughter and O. J. Russell. Jess Proctor will serve as Ex Officio director.

Haywood (Doc) Cabaness was in charge of the program for the meeting and relinquished a part of his time to Carl Elliot, County School Superintendent, who told Rotarians and guests of the plans of the County School trustees to consolidate all dormant school districts in the county.

Following the talk by Mr. Elliot, Cabaness gave a classification talk on "Insurance." He told of the value of being fully covered and of the causes of most fires.

"The simplest things," Cabaness said, "sometimes cause the worst fires." He warned Rotarians to exert care in the use of matches and stressed the danger of placing pennies or slugs behind fuse plugs. He urged those present to check the plugs in their homes to see if some one previously had placed an object behind one of the fuses.

He also stressed the danger of overloading the electrical circuits in the home and urged the use of appliance cords which bore the underwriters' label.

Cabaness, at the completion of his talk, gave each Rotarian a copy of "Service is my Business," a book published for Rotarians.

Rotarians Bert E. Low of Brownwood and Glenn Dugan of Abilene were visitors at the luncheon. Other visitors included Dr. B. K. Tenney of Fort Worth, Carl Elliot of Eastland, John W. Spiers of Cisco and J. C. Poe of Eastland.

API Gives Oil Report For Week

The American Petroleum Institute estimates that the daily average gross crude oil production for the week ended April 2, 1949, was 5,072,400 barrels and that the amount of lease condensate production mixed with crude losing its identity as such averaged 57,400 barrels daily, a total of 5,129,800 barrels of crude and lease condensate.

Reports received from refining companies indicate that the industry as a whole ran to stills on a Bureau of Mines basis approximately 5,269,000 barrels of crude oil daily and produced 17,635,000 barrels of gasoline; 1,958,000 barrels of kerosene; 6,658,000 barrels of distillate fuel and 8,351,000 barrels of residual fuel oil during the week; and had in storage 127,769,000 barrels of finished and unfinished gasoline; 17,915,000 barrels of kerosene; 48,556,000 barrels of distillate fuel and 58,710,000 barrels of residual fuel oil on April 2.

Edwin L. Jackson, Texas Tech student and son of Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Jackson of Cisco, is among 12 Central Texas youths selected for the Navy ROTC program that will furnish four-year college education, it was learned here today.

Statement

To Voters And Patrons On School District Election Monday

The election Monday, April 18, to consolidate the Cisco Independent School District and nine Common School Districts, has caused so much confusion and misunderstanding among both Cisco people and people of the common school districts involved that we feel it proper to make the following statement:

In the first place, this consolidation is NOT A CISCO PROGRAM. It was not started in Cisco. Neither the Cisco School Board, nor any Cisco School official nor any Cisco citizen started it.

It is a COUNTYWIDE PROGRAM, ordered by the Eastland County School Board — not the Cisco Board, but the EASTLAND COUNTY SCHOOL BOARD — and it covers the entire county. There are elections being held at Rising Star, Ranger, and Carbon at the same time to approve groupings in those areas.

The County wide Grouping was ordered by the Eastland County School Board under authority granted it by state law, for a very good reason. The reason is this:

UNLESS THESE DISTRICTS ARE GROUPED TO MEET CERTAIN STATE STANDARDS UNDER LEGISLATION NOW BEING ENACTED, THE STATE WILL REFUSE STATE AID ON THE CHILDREN FROM THE RURAL DISTRICTS. ALL THE SCHOOLS WILL SUFFER.

The following statement from the Eastland County School Board appeared in Thursday's paper:

Statement From Eastland County School Board

The County School Trustees of Eastland County have begun an annexation and grouping plan for the dormant school districts of the county. Under this program all school districts in Eastland County that have not been operating schools in their respective districts for the past several years have been grouped or annexed to other districts, or elections have been called for the purpose of annexing these dormant districts to some other districts for Rural High School purposes.

The County School Trustees have tried to group or annex the districts, as far as possible to the districts to which they have been sending their children. In no case is a district being discontinued that is now operating a school. The county school trustees have the authority to group or annex districts without an election under Articles 2922a and 2922c, where the area involved is less than 100 square miles. If the area of the proposed Rural High District is over 100 square miles, an election must be called in the proposed Rural High School District. If a majority of the qualified voters in the proposed area vote for annexation, the districts will be annexed. The vote considered is the vote in the proposed area and not in each district.

The county school trustees have annexed Triumph, Elm, New Hope, and Grandview to the Gorman Independent School District. Lone Cedar and Union have been grouped with Olden. Kegan and Colony have been grouped with Morton Valley. Elections have been called in four proposed Rural High School Districts of Cisco, Ranger, Carbon and Rising Star. The election is Monday, April 18.

Where districts have not been grouped or annexed to any Independent School District, this is due to the fact that the Independent District has not been serving any rural school districts. They are grouped or annexed to the Independent Districts that have been furnishing them a school and transportation to their school. In each case where annexation was made it was made to a district that had bought buses and was transporting children under contract or transfer agreement.

If the proposed grouping of the districts now served by Cisco does not carry in the election Monday, then the dormant districts will be grouped with another school and the students will be forced to enter a different school. The school districts north of Cisco might be grouped with Moran and those in other directions would be grouped with smaller schools in the county. Cisco would lose the scholastics which now number near 300 and would lose one teacher for each 30 students.

The purpose of the regrouping is to assure every scholastic in Eastland County the best educational opportunities and is not for the purpose of raising taxes or building one district over another. It is something that the County Board is doing before the State Board does it."

Will Be Consolidated Anyway

The nine common districts which will vote on annexation with the Cisco School District Monday, are: Cottonwood, Sandy, Friendship, Bluff Branch, Bedford, Central, Grapevine, Shady Grove and Remney.

If the election Monday does not carry for consolidation it will not mean the nine common school districts will be left as they are. The County School Board will take it to mean that they don't want to be consolidated with Cisco. The County School Board will then break them up into smaller groupings and place them with other independent school districts. Some may be placed with Rising Star, some with Carbon, some with Eastland or Morton Valley or Moran.

The Cisco School family — a family that has been living together for fifteen or more years— will be broken up.

The Eastland County School Board is giving people a chance to decide whether or not they want their children to continue to attend the schools that they have been attending all along. If they vote against it, they will be assigned to other groups.

FORCED TO ACT

The Eastland County School Board realizes that unless it acts the State of Texas will force it to act. The state will do so by refusing aid, and by other powers under legislation now being enacted. Throughout the state a great reorganization is under way. The day of the common school district is almost gone. It is gone just as the horse and buggy are gone, replaced by the automobile and good roads. Larger schools with better plants and better teachers are taking the place of the one-room and two-room schools. Educational opportunities are being equalized. The common school district isn't large enough to give the kind of education that the state wants all the children to have.

Behind the state is the threat that unless the state acts the federal government will take over and run our schools out of Washington. That would be dictatorship sure enough.

ALL OVER STATE

The County School Board realizes that. It has been forced to act, as County School Boards all over the state are acting, to consolidate districts and make possible better school systems.

THE ELECTION MONDAY IS NOT A TAX ELECTION. The tax rate will be determined in another election. The election Monday is only to say whether or not ten separate districts — the Cisco Independent School District and nine common school districts — shall become one large self-governing district.

WILL HAVE A VOICE

If it carries the people in the nine common school districts will then have a voice in how the Cisco school system is run. They will vote on trustees and tax matters and all other matters on which the district will vote.

Cisco People Are Not Trying to Force the People of the Nine Common Schools Districts To Come to Cisco. It is not their program.

BUT SINCE THESE DISTRICTS ARE GOING TO BE CONSOLIDATED WITH SOME INDEPENDENT DISTRICT WE WANT THEM TO BE CONSOLIDATED WITH CISCO.

WE WANT TO KEEP OUR SCHOOL FAMILY TOGETHER.

It is important that Cisco people vote in this election Monday. If they do not vote, it can be taken to mean that they do not want these common school districts to continue to come to Cisco schools. It will force these districts to send their children to strange schools.

Texan Has Part In Drug Discovery

DENTON, April 12.—A chemical formula for chloromycetin, science's newest miracle drug which may stamp typhus and typhoid fever from the earth, has resulted from research done by five scientists, including one North Texas State College student.

Dr. Loren M. Long, Jr., NTSC graduate, worked with four others at Parke, Davis and Company to perfect the chemical formula for the most potent

germ-fighter since penicillin. Before the formula was perfected, the new drug could not be produced fast enough even for emergency needs. The formula will allow it to be produced on a mass scale.

Scientific reports say the drug will cure typhoid fever, typhus, Rocky Mountain spotted fever, undulant fever and certain urinary tract infections. It has shown promise against virus pneumonia and is being tested against a number of other diseases which penicillin cannot cure, including whooping cough.

Acreeage Figures For Crops Asked

In order to maintain price supports and production figures on the various crops the government is now asking for the acreage of all crops grown on every farm in the county for the years 1945 through 1948. These figures must be obtained for every farm in the county. It is very necessary that the correct information be submitted for every farm or it may cause a delay or ineligibility as to participating in future price

support programs on cotton, wheat, grain sorghums and other farm crops.

This is the farmers program and their co-operation will help all other farmers in Eastland County. In order to save time and driving, members of the AAA Office will bring the forms to community centers for the sign-up programs. Each farmer will be notified in the next few days where their community meeting will be held.

The first meeting for communities E and F will be held in Eastland, at the AAA Office in the basement of the County Courthouse on April 18-19-20,

1949. Only the farmers in communities E and F will be executed at that time. No other applicants will be accepted.

On April 21-22, at the Chamber of Commerce in Cisco, the sign-up program for communities H, I and L will be executed. This is vitally important as this is a farmer's program. Each

farmer is asked to do his part in giving the correct information on his farm at the time it is requested.

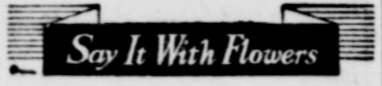

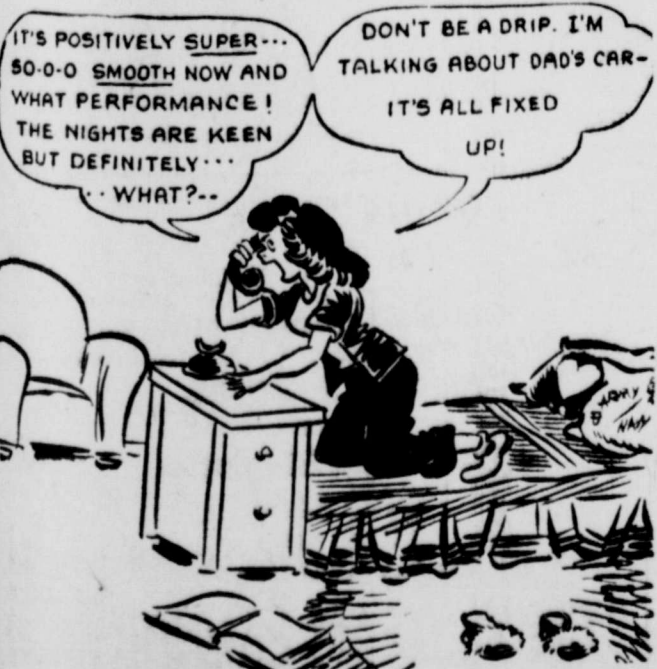

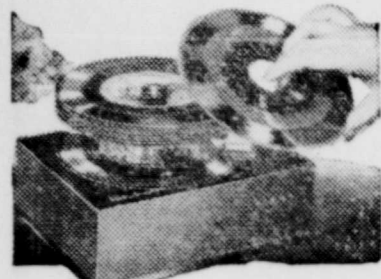
