The Voters Decide Monday

(An Editorial)

The important question of consolidating nine common school districts with the Cisco Independent School District will be decided by the nine communities and Cisco Monday.

There is more at stake in the election than a question of censolidation. Shall our school family be broken up after fifteen years of living together? Shall our children have the best schools that we can give them? Shall we destroy all that has been accomplished in twenty years of hard work?

In the election carries for annexation, the Cisco school family will remain the same, with this exception - it wil be one big, self-governing district, instead of a loosely federated group that does not even pay uniform taxes. It will be stronger in resources to take care of the future needs of a growing school population.

If 'he election does not carry, the common school districts will be consolidated anyway. But not with Cisco. At least not air of them. Most of them will be attached to other independent districts waiting eagerly to receive them. Cisco schools will shrink.

The increased resources are not needed to take care of present obligations. The Cisco bonded debt on present buildings is already being paid off on schedule. Taxes from the Cisco district as it now stands are enough for that. As we understand it, the 20c Cisco Junior College tax would not apply to the nine areas unless they vote for it at .. later date.

The children who come from the common school districts and the children who come from Cisco itself are entitled to better accomodations, better buildings, better equi, ment and better teaching. And even more so are the children who come after them - the children of tomorrow. Their numbers are increasing.

As one great district, each part of it bearing its fair snare of the cost, we can take care of this future.

Are we going to tell these children in the election Monday that we don't want to give them the best, that we West Texans with the Anglo-Saxon heritage strong in us, do not want to take care of our own, because we think more of our collars and our cattle and our cil wells than we think of them?

If Cisco and other communities over the country fail to take this opportunity the state will do it. And if the state fails the federal government, at a staggering cost in dollars and freedom, will do it.

The Cisco school district and these nine common school districts have an epportunity tomorrow to make a great Okra Church of Christ. Burial stride toward a magnificent goal. They can establish the foundations of one of the best school systems in West Texas. Or they can break up the foundations that have alrendy been laid - the beams and the piers that the people of Cisco and the people of these rural communities have laid down together in fifteen years of vision and working and planning.

That is exactly what can happen if very many of us vote by default in Monday's election. By staying away from July. the polls we can cast a vote that will help break up these foundations, discredit the vision and work of almost a generation, and say to these nine common school districts, and to others that may want to come later, "We don't want you. 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Statement

To Voters And Patrons On School District Election Monday

The election Monday, April 18. to consolidate the Cisco Independent School District and nine Common School Districts, has caused so much confusion and misunderstanding among both Cisco people and people of the common school districts involved that we feel it proper to make the following statement:

In the first place, this consolidation is NOT A CISCO PROGRAM. It was not started in Cisco. Neither the Cisco School Board, nor any Cisco School official nor any Cisco citizen started it.

It is a COUNTYWIDE PROGRAM, ordered by the Eastland County School Board — not the Cisco Board, but the EASTLAND COUNTY SCHOOL BOARD — and it covers the entire county. There are elections being held at R sing Star, Ranger, and Carbon at the same time to approve groupings in those areas.

The County wide Grouping was ordered by the Eastland County School Board under authority granted it by state law, for a very good reason. The reason is this:

UNLESS THESE DISTRICTS ARE GROUPED TO MEET CERTAIN STATE STANDARDS UNDER LEGISLATION NOW BEING ENACTED, THE STATE WILL REFUSE STATE AID ON THE CHILDREN FROM THE RURAL DISTRICTS. ALL THE SCHOOLS WILL SUFFER.

The following statement from the Eastland County School Board appeared in Thursday's paper:

Statement From Eastland County School Board

The County School Trustees of Eastland County have begun an annexation and grouping plan for the dormant school districts of the county. Under this program all school districts in Eastland County that have not been operating schools in their respective districts for the past several years have been grouped or annexed to other districts, or elections have been called for the purpose of annexing these dormant districts to some other districts for Rural High School purposes.

"The County School Trustees have tried to group or annex the districts, as far as possible of the districts to which they have been sending their children. In no case is a district being discontinued that is now operating a school. The county school trustees have the authority to group or annex districts without an election under Articles 2922a and 2922c, where the area involved is less than 100 square miles. If the area of the proposed Rural High District is over 100 square miles, an election must be called in the proposed Rural High School District. If a majority of the qualified voters in the proposed area vote for annexation, the districts will be annexed. The vote considered is the vote in the proposed area and not in each district.

The county school trustees have annexed Triumph, Elm, New Hope, and Grandview to the Gorman Independent School District. Lone Cegar and Union have been grouped with Olden. Regan and Colony have been grouped with Morton Valley. Elections have been called in four proposed Rural High School Districts of Cisco, Ranger, Carbon and Rising Stat. The election is Monday, April 18.

"Where districts have not been grouped or annexed to any Independent School District, this is due to the fact that the Independent District has not been serving any rural school districts. They are grouped or annexed to the independent Districts that have been furnishing them a school and transportation to their school. In each case where annexation was made it was made to a district that had bought buses and was transporting children under contract or transfer agreement.

If the proposed grouping of the districts now served by Cisco does not carry in the election Monday, then the dormant districts will be grouped with another school and the students will be forced to enter a different school. The school districts north of Cisco might be grouped with Moran and those in other directions would be grouped with smaller schools in the county. Cisco would lose the scholastics which now number near 300 and would lose the teacher for each 30 students.

The purpose of the regrouping is to assure every scholastic in Eastland County the best in educational opportunities and is not for the purpose of raising taxes or building one district over another. It is something that the County Board is doing before the State Board gues it?"

Will Be Consolidated Anyway

The nine common districts which will vote on a mexation with the Cisco School District Monday, are: Cottonwood, Sandy, Friendship, Bluff Branch, Bedford, Central, Grapevine, Shady Grove and Romney.

It the election Monday does not carry for consociation it will not mean the nine common school districts will be left as they are. The County School Board will take it to mean that they don't want to be consolidated with Cisco. The County School Board will then break them up into smaller groupings and place them with other independent school districts. Some may be placed with Rising Star, some with Carbon, some with Eastland or Morton Valley or Moran.

The Cisco School family — a family that has been living together for fifteen or more years—will be broken up.

The Eastland County School Board is giving people a chance to decide whether or not they want their children to continue to attend the schools that they have been attending all along. If they vote against it, they will be assigned to other groups.

FORCED TO ACT

The Eastland County School Board realizes that unless it acts the State of Texas will force it to act. The state will do so by refusing aid, and by other powers under legislation now being enacted. Throughout the state a great reorgan ization is under way. The day of the common school district is almost gone. It is gone just as the horse and buggy are gone, replaced by the automobile and good roads. Larger schools with better plants and better teachers are taking the place of the one-room and two-room schools. Educational opportunities are being equalized. The common school district isn't large enough to give the kind of education that the state wants all the children to have.

Uchind the state is the threat that unless the state acts the federal government will take over and run our schools out of Washington. That would be dictatorship sure enough.

ALL OVER STATE

The County School Board realizes that. It has been forced to act, as County School Boards all ever the state are acting, to consolidate districts and make possible better school systems.

THE ELECTION MONDAY IS NOT A TAX ELECTION. The tax rate will be determined in another election. The election Monday is only to say whether or not ten separate districts—the Cisco Independent School District and nine common school districts—shall become one large self-governing district.

WILL HAVE A VOICE

If it carries the people in the nine common school districts will then have a voice in how the Lisco school system is run. They will vote on trustees and tax matters and all other matters on which the district will vote.

Cisco Pecple Are Not Trying to Force the People of the Nine Common Schools Districts To Come to Cisco. It is not their program.

BUT SINCE THESE DISTRICTS ARE GOING TO BE CONSOLIDATED WITH SOME INDEED FINDENT DISTRICT WE WANT THEM TO BE CONSOLIDATED WITH CISCO.

A Statement

The Citizens Of Cisco

We, the trustees of the rural districts included in this so-called consolidation plan, wish to make the following statement:

First, don't be mislead; the tax rate in out districts will be \$1.50 instead of the \$1.30 as has been stated because the law states that the tax rate must be unjform and it is now \$1.50 in Cisco, 20c of which in Junior College tax. Futher. more, our valuations can be doubled or even more since the board of equalization will be appointed by the Cisco School board and the County Beard of equalization will have nothing to do with valuations.

Second, don't be mislead; if the County Board drew up all of this consolidation plan without the Cisco School officials and school board knowing anything about it, how did said county board know just what districts to include and how did it happen that Dothan, one of the first districts to start coming to Cisco by contract, was the very one which is left out of this consclidaton plan? Couldn't it be because Dothan happens to be the home of the Cisco Superintendent of Schools and his father? The County Superintendent states that he wishes to increase the educational opportunities of the rural pupils, when as a matter of fact, we would have exactly the same educatonal opportuni-ties with consolidation as we have had for the past ten years or more that we have been coming to Cisco Schools. Does n't t occur to you that the County Superintendent might be more interested in the large vote which he would hope to get from Cisco in the next election than ne is in the educational advantages of rural children.

Third, don't be mislead: if the school officals and beard in Cisco knew nothing about the County Board's plan, why did not they repudiate the action of the County Board when they learned of it, as they could have done? Futhermore, if it is a fair and legimate plan, why were several meetings called in Cisco to discuss the consolidation program with the people of Cisco while the people of the districts were not invited to attend and knew nothing about the meetings except what was heard on the streets? Doesn't that sound like a premeditated and unfair scheme since the people in the districts are the only ones directly affected?

Ve also wish to state that we have expected from the first to pay our children's way to school in Cisco. We have not, and are not now asking that our children's education be a gift from the Cisco Schools. We have bought it from the first and pay for it yearly. We appreciate the opportunity which the school offered and have cooperated in every way to have this advantage and at the same time be a financial asset to the Cisco Schools. A lew years after we contracted to come to Cisco, it was shown us that the Cisco Schools were not breaking even on some of the districts and we were asked to raise our tax to \$1.00. We did this willingly and practically unanimous in every district. Sandy and Cottonwood were not asked to raise their tax because they had enough money to pay this increase in operation since they were not state aid schools. Our local tax, plus the state aid which Cisco draws on our children, plus transportation aid, should certainly be enough to pay our children's way. If it is not, as has been stated, why did not the officials call our attention to this fact before the County Board's said action in planning consolidation? Why did they not show us figures to substantiate this assertion which they have since made? If it is not unfair, why is Cisco's vote of a possible 1000 in her Independent District to be totaled with the meager 200 or less in all of the districts combined? We are the ones to pay the tax, then w aren't we the ones to vote it. How would you like for us to dictate the amount of tax you in Cisco should pay?

Citizens of Cisco, we are depending on you to be democratic in the face of this highly undemocratic proposition. Most of us do uor trading in Cisco, but Mr. Business Man, how long would you stay in business if you took advantage of your customers in comparison to the way we are being taken advantage of in this proposition where we have at best a 200 chance against 1000. Good business men do not practice such tactics. We do not believe that you approve of such in any busiress especially in the schools where democracy is supposed to be taught and practiced. We, as a group, are asking only that you awake to the unfairness of this consolidation plan which is being thrust at us; and that you vote Monday against consolidation; then the teaching of the Golden Rule will have been applied "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you."
