## City Is Waging War To Prevent Recurrence Of Mosquito Menace

The city has already begun an intensive campaign to curb the growth of mosquitoes this summer. Hal Lavery, city secretary, announced today. Up to the rainy period, workers had been fighting the campaign into operation.

Health Department workers are using a high test solution sprayed through automatic nozzles that "fog" the surface of stagnant water, instantly smothering mosquito wigglers.

Lavery said the chemical, called Multicide Spread, contains a mixture of poisonous ingredients, especially prepared for use against mosquitoes. The chemical is being mixed with kerosene instead of water as the former states.

The city plans to spray streets and creeks throughout the town whenever the occasion is needed, it was learned.

"There are any number of reasons why the mesquitos got the upper hand on the department last year," Lavery stated. "It wasn't until late in July that the pests got out of control, and that could be blamed on brisk winds blowing the insects and eggs from the lake and depositing them in the city."

Lavery said the city could "dump" oil into the streams that run through town since the drainage would carry the mixtures into nearby tanks and endanger livestock.

## Recruiting Officer To Be At Eastland Office Friday

Capt. Wayne Hall, commanding the U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force Recruiting Main Station at Abilene, will be at Eastland Recruiting Station on Friday, April 22nd, from 10 a. m. until noon to swear in persons interested in enlistment or re-enlistment in the Enlisted Reserve Corps or U. S. Air Force Reserve.

Capt. Hall also desires to interview all persons interested in Aviation Cadet flight training, Army or Air Force Officer candidate School, Women's Army Corps, or the Women's Air Force Veterans of any of the Armed Forces during World War II will be enlisted in the Reserve in grade held at the time of discharge.

Men now in the Reserves and whose enlistment will expire within 90 days are urged to take this opportunity to re-enlist to save future time and trouble. If enlistment has already expired, re-enlistment can be accomplished in a few minutes.

## School Annexation Carries In Ranger, Carbon, Rising Star

Eastland County School Superintendent Carl Elliott today reported that school annexation proposals carried in elections held Monday in the Ranger, Rising Star and Carbon areas.

Totals of the elections, which are still unofficial as the vote has not been canvassed by the Board, were not disclosed.

Elliott explained that "the election was held for the purpose of absorbing all dormant school districts in this county, and Monday's election completes the annexation of 16 common school districts within the past six months."

"It was part of the county board's reorganization plan of regrouping all dormant schools of Eastland County."

## Enlisted Reserves Needed By Army

AUSTIN, April 13 — There is an urgent need for qualified Enlisted Reservists to accept a 90 day tour of duty at various stations throughout the State of Texas, Colonel Oscar B. Abbott, Executive for the Texas Military District, announced here today.

ERC's accepting this 90 day tour of duty will have their choice of station as almost all of the Organized Reserve Corps Instructor's offices throughout the State are in need of administrative enlisted men and chauffeurs. Also, the OR summer camp staff at Camp Hood will need men from May 9th through September 23rd and Fort Bliss from May 23rd through September 7th.

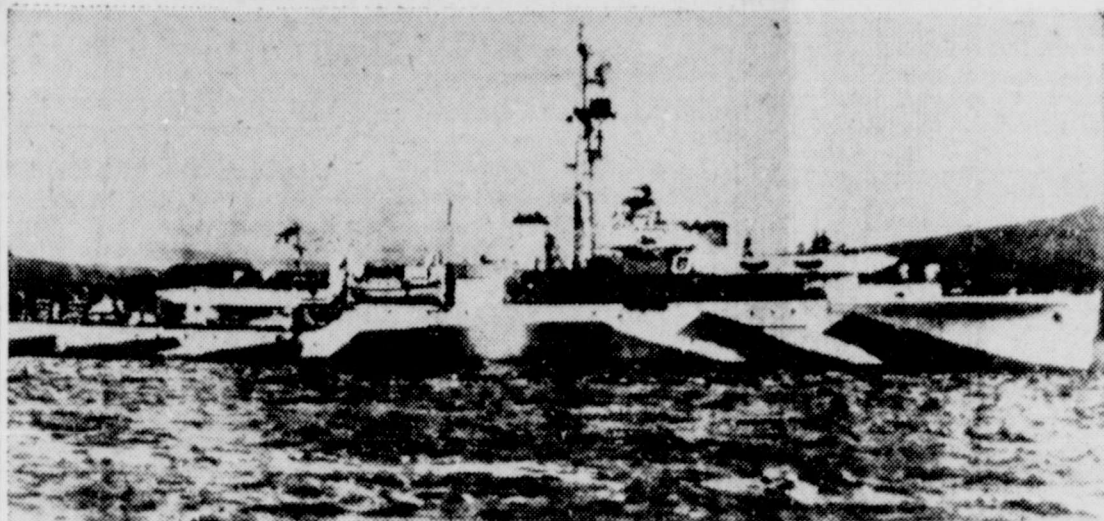

## Warning Issued On The Observance Of Rules Designed To Combat Polio

Parents were reminded this week of five basic health rules designed for the purpose of combatting Polio which already this year has struck three times as many as in the same period in 1948 — the state's worst epidemic year on record.

Although no cases have been reported locally, the latest 1949 Texas count (April 9) was 123 cases. Only 39 cases had been reported up to April 9, 1948.

Four of the five rules designed to stop a polio epidemic before it starts apply especially to children. They are the same rules that were hammered at the public so hard last year. The rules are:

1. Avoid crowds.
2. Avoid fatigue. It may result from over-active play or

exercise or from irregular hours.

3. Avoid swimming in questionable waters. Use only pools that have been declared safe by local health officials.
4. Avoid sudden chilling.
5. Observe the golden rule of cleanliness. Keep food covered, safe from flies and other insects. Garbage should be covered tightly and where disposal service is lacking, it should be buried or burned.

Symptoms of polio are headache, nausea or upset stomach, muscle soreness or stiffness, and unexplained fever.

Parents who suspect polio or whose child develops any of the above symptoms should waste no time in consulting a doctor, for early discovery aids recovery.

## Swimming Pool At Lake Cisco Will Open Monday If Weather Permits

W. J. Foxworth, president of the Lake Cisco Amusement Co., announced Thursday that the swimming pool at Lake Cisco would open Monday, April 25, under the management of Bee Clearley. Bad weather, he added, might delay the opening.

Arrangements for the opening were completed after directors of the company reached an agreement with city officials on the use of water from Lake Cisco.

The agreement calls for the opening of the shallow part of the pool only at the present. It also provides that should sufficient water be caught in the lake section of the pool and if the water level of the lake recedes to the danger zone the pool will be closed.

The amusement company is installing equipment on the retaining walls whereby the water can be held in the shallow section and drained when needed. The equipment being installed will assure patrons of a safe place to swim.

### Freight Losses Discussed By Lions Speaker

The efforts of the Texas and Pacific Railroad to prevent damage to freight in shipment were outlined here Wednesday by H. B. Newton of Dallas, superintendent of claims for the railroad, in a talk at the weekly Luncheon meeting of the Cisco Lions Club.

"The T. & P. alone paid out about a million dollars in claims last year," he said. "This is an enormous amount of money wasted. It is money that could have been put to good use. It would have built a sizeable building in any community, a building that all would have been proud of."

Mr. Newton pointed out that everybody lost on damage freight. Besides the railroad's loss, merchants to whom the freight was shipped made no profit on it.

"Ninety per cent, if not 100 per cent, of the loss and damage to freight is due to carelessness human error," he said. "So it follows that any steps taken to overcome it are steps in the right direction and will pay dividends."

"The railroad is doing everything possible to prevent this loss. We have a department whose only and sole duty is to try and prevent loss and damage to freight."

Mr. Newton was introduced by President A. R. Westfall, R. J. Stevenson, Cisco T. & P. Agent, was guest of the club.

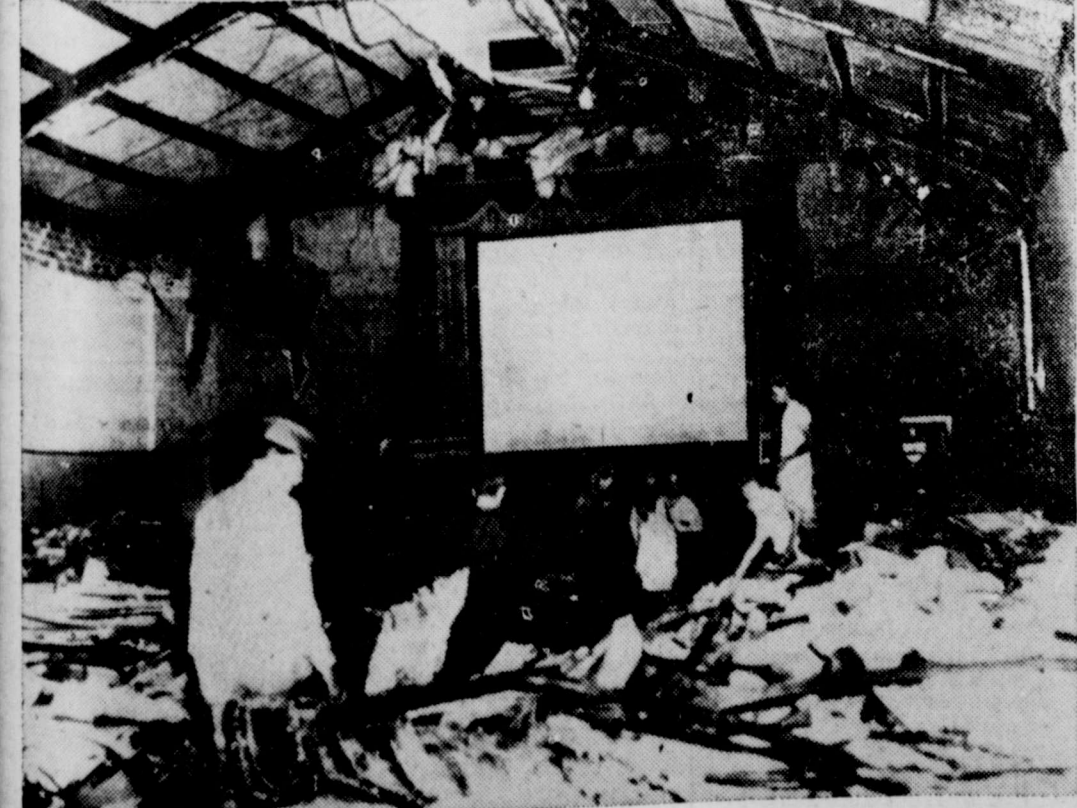
Thousands of visitors, including noted artists from all parts of the country, attended the exhibition during the time it was on display.

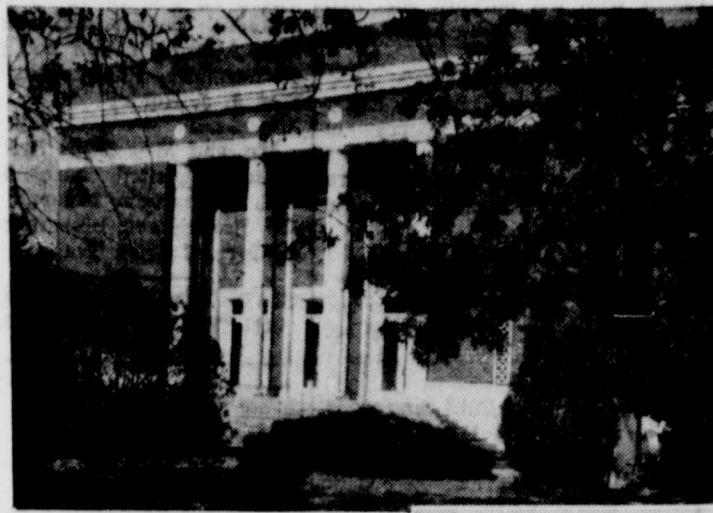

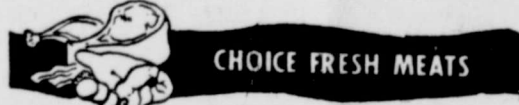
