Local Lutheran Youths Hosts At Zone Rally Here

More Than 200 Are Expected To Attend Meeting Sunday

Rev. G. A. Obenhouse, pastor of Christ Lutheran Church six miles south of Cisco, announced today that the Walther League of the church would act as host for a West Texas Walther League Young People's Zone Rally at the Cisco Country Club Sunday.

The rally will begin at 2:30 p. m. and close that night. More than 200 young people from a wide area of West Texas are expected to attend the meeting which will begin with an inspirational service with the Rev. Schumge of Albany as guest speaker.

The afternoon services will consist Bible story telling and singing. After the dinner, which will be served at 6 p. m., there will be musical entertainment and youth activities.

All local young people were invited to meet with the Cisco Lutheran youths and League members from Abilene, Albany, Brownwood, and the smaller communities of the area.

The Walther League is composed of the young people of the Lutheran Churches who are banded together for the purpose of following Christ. The group meets regularly in their local churches.

Both Christ Lutheran and Grace Lutheran Churches will dismiss their evening services Sunday to permit members to attend the rally or assist with the entertainment.

Final Rites For Mrs. Leveridge Set For Saturday

Funeral services will be held Saturday at 3 p. m. at the First Methodist Church for Mrs. W. F. Leveridge, 79, who died Thursday at the home of her daughter, Miss Ethel Leveridge, 402 West 11th.

Mrs. Leveridge was born May Wilkerson on May 1, 1870, in Russell County, Alabama. At the age of six, she moved with her parents to Russellville, Arkansas, where she lived until her marriage to Lee Whitesides in August of 1894.

After her marriage she came to Texas with her husband and settled in the Nimrod Community. To this union was born two children. One died in infancy and the other, Mrs. E. H. Jones, lives in Eastland. Mr. Whitesides died in April, of 1897, and she continued to live on the farm.

On December 17, 1905, she was married to W. T. Leveridge of Cisco, who had four children. They are Miss Ura Leveridge and Mrs. O. L. Stamey of Cisco, Mrs. F. S. Boland of Scranton and Mrs. J. T. Morgan of Big Spring. To her union, with Mr. Leveridge three children were born: Miss Ethel Leveridge and John Leveridge of Cisco and a daughter who died in infancy. Mr. Leveridge died on May 26, 1929.

Mrs. Leveridge was converted and became a member of the Presbyterian Church at the age of 17 and remained in that church until she came to Texas. As there was no Presbyterian Church in her community she became a member of the Pisgah Methodist Church and was a faithful member as long as the church was in existence. After its abandonment, she was affiliated with the First Methodist Church in Cisco.

Survivors include her seven children, ten grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. Also surviving are two brothers and two sisters. They are Boykin Wilkerson of Lorraine, Preston Wilkerson of Eunice, New Mexico, Mrs. James Carlow of Texas, and Mrs. R. W. Merket of Cisco.

The funeral services will be conducted by Rev. Claude P. Jonse, minister of the First Methodist Church, and Rev. R. W. Crews, minister of the First Christian Church. Burial will be in the Pisgah Cemetery, Thomas Funeral Home of Cisco will be in charge of arrangements.

New Rules For Army Enlistments

A recent change in Army enlistment regulations will permit men with dependents to enlist or re-enlist in the US Army if they can enlist in the grade of sergeant or higher, according to Sgt. James Hendrick of the Eastland Recruiting Station. The change is effective May 1, 1949.

Since last October the enlistment of men with dependents has been limited to those men who could be enlisted in grade of staff sergeant or higher. Minimum enlistment period is for three years in any branch of service.

Local Group To Attend Convention Of VFW In Ranger This Weeknd

A large Cisco delegation was expected to attend the annual spring encampment of District 8 of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of Texas and the VFW Ladies Auxiliary at Ranger this weekend.

Registration for the convention will get underway at 4 p. m. Saturday at the Ranger American Legion Hall and at the Gholson Hotel. Posts in 18 West Texas towns will be represented at the convention and a full program of business and entertainment has been planned for the visitors. About 100 women of the various auxiliaries were expected for the session.

Saturday night the Ranger post will entertain the convention with a dance at the Ranger Country Club. Sunday's activities will begin at 9 a. m. when special instruction will be given to post services officers by R. H. Claypool, national VFW claims officer. The session will be held in the VFW headquarters building.

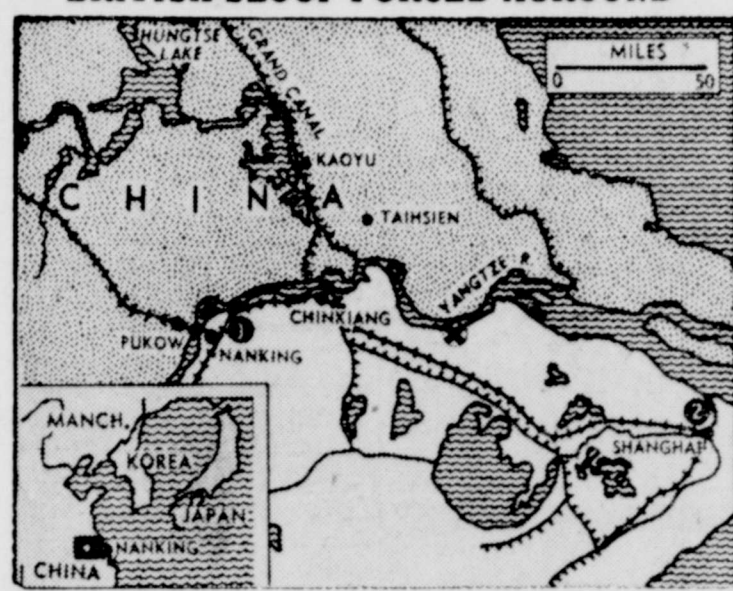

Funds To Be Raised For New Buildings

Plans for vast improvements on the present buildings at the Presbyterian Camp at Lake Cisco and for the addition of new buildings were approved at the spring meeting of the Mid-Texas Presbytery held in Cleburne this week, according to Rev. Stuart McC. Rohre, local minister, who attended the meeting.

The Presbytery authorized the raising of funds immediately in order that improvements could be made on the present buildings before the Camp opens on June 1. The store rooms will be rat and vermin proof and will be used during the winter months to store bedding, kitchen equipment and sports equipment. They will also be used to protect the grand piano which was given to the encampment officers recently.

Rev. Leland H. Murphy, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in Abilene was elected Moderator of the convened Court. It was voted to hold the fall meeting of the group in the Westminster Presbyterian Church in Fort Worth.

Rev. Rohre is manager of the Presbyterian Camp and is on committees dealing with youth training.

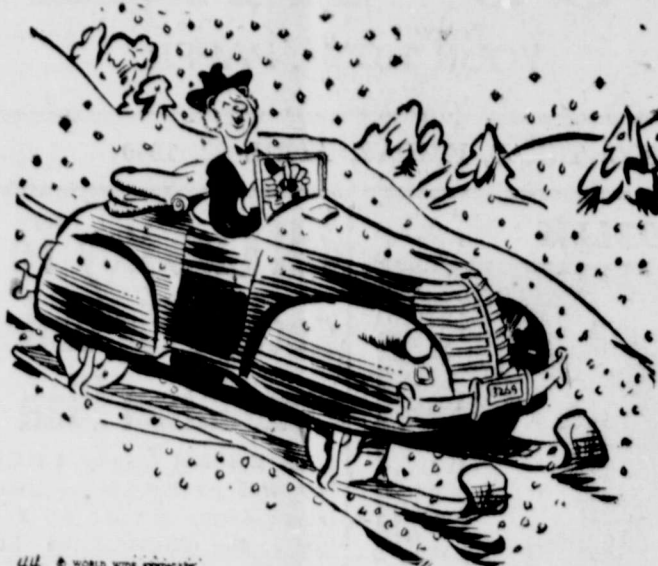
