Last Matches Feature Boxing Bouts At City Gymnasium Friday Night

Whirlwind swinging, double TKO's and thrilling slugfests highlighted the first of a weekly series of local talent boxing bouts Friday night at the City Gymnasium sponsored by the Cisco High School athletic department.

The eleven bouts were staged last Friday evening before a crowd of more than 175 persons who yelled, stomped and cheered judges' decisions without ceasing as they watched through the tournament's three one-minute rounds per match. In the first two fights ranging from small poundweights to brawny 190 pound heavyweights.

The fights were staged by athletic director Jack Everett assisted by Gene Milner and Joe Ed Bacon, judges; Roy Trapp, Timekeeper, and Dean McDaniels, announcer.

One of the most outstanding matches during the hour and a half contest was between Benny Phippen, 115 pound welterweight, and Dick Kimbrough, 115 pounds. Phippen carried the mix-up to Kimbrough from beginning to end, knocking the latter to his knees in the first round. In the second, Kimbrough tried to rally, but Phippen sent a left jab to the stomach, leaving Kimbrough stunned. Phippen won the bout.

A double TKO left the crowd holding its sides when gnatweights Jim Brayton and Terry Maxwell slammed each other with a right to the jaw, drawing blood to both boys' lips. The fight lasted 30 seconds.

A brief summary of Friday night's bouts follows: Johnny Mitchell, 70 pounds, won by a TKO over John McCanlies, 100 pounds, in the first round after the latter tripped and hurt his right foot. Max Farmer and Joe Gilmors, both 95 pound contestants, struggled to a three round draw after both exchanged a barrage of blows to the face.

John Farley, 140 pound lightweight, pounced Arbie Smith, 155 pounder, into submission late in the third round, winning a decision. Everett Blair, 152 pounds, cinched a TKO over James Ricker, 151 pounds, seconds after the first round commenced.

Sunny McCrea, 95 pound hustler, proved the better fighter over Tommy Barton, 95 pound contender, after going three rounds for the win. Arthur (Boy) Gallagher, 106 pounds, opened up on John Simmons, 106 pounds, in the second round with a barrage of clean uppercuts, taking the decision. In a second welterweight novice bout, Sonny Bosworth, 107 pounds, outpointed Buddy Seaborn, 104 pounds, in the first and third rounds. The Joe Marsh, 130 pounds, and Tommy Barker, 140 pounds, bout wound up a draw.

Although he was spotted 15 pounds, Harold Jones, 140 pounder, held his own against Blackie Greer, 155 pounds, who had both height and reach. Jones failed to carry through a KO punch early in the final round when he crashed a sizzling left into Greer's stomach. The judges decided a draw. In the final bout, heavyweights Pat Tillery, 190 pounds, and Leo Farmer, 182, fought out a three round draw. A second of the Intra-City boxing contests will be held at the city gym Friday.

Credit Buyers Get 24 Months To Pay For Installment Purchases

The Federal Reserve Board Friday lengthened to 24 months the time limit for completing installment purchase payments and at the same time cut the down payment to 10 per cent on everything but automobiles, according to an announcement by the Merchants Credit Association.

The new 24 month time limit, which replaces the 21 month limit that has been in effect since March 7, will become effective April 27. The 10 per cent down payment replaces the 15 per cent requirement also in effect since March 7. In addition the board exempted from control requirements furniture, radios, and refrigerators and other now-controlled items costing less than \$100.00. Previously the only items exempt were those costing less than \$50.00.

Contest Planned For High Schools

ABILENE, April 23. — High School students may be able to complete soon in a contest to determine the boy and girl safe driving champions of Texas.

Such a contest will be proposed to officials of the Interscholastic League at a statewide meeting of delegates May 7 in Austin, it was announced here Thursday by Nat Williams.

Mr. Williams is director for school safety for this region of the Texas Safety Association which actively sponsors driver training in the schools throughout the state. The contest is being proposed jointly by the Safety Association, the State Department of Education and the Department of Public Safety.

The goal of the school safety program, Mr. Williams said, is for every high school graduate to get a crisp new driver's license along with his diploma. About half of the secondary schools are now teaching safety courses, but only a part of these give actual behind-the-wheel training.

The competition would follow the usual pattern, beginning with the local school and continuing through district, regional and state competition. Cars would be furnished to the schools by the Texas Automotive Dealers Association.

protecting the soil from the hazards of wind and water erosion while the peanuts are young.

Mr. Starr called the group of farmers together, for the purpose of trying out various methods of preparing the land for planting, while at the same time leaving the soil as well protected as possible.

W. L. Garner, of the Rising Star Soil Conservation Unit, showed pictures, and discussed the results of trashy mulch tillage in the Romney No. 1 Conservation group last year, where a 70 per cent increase in yield was secured by good trashy tillage methods.

Similar methods were tried by the group, with equipment furnished by the Shults Implement Company of Rising Star. An excellent job of killing the cover crop and leaving the residue on the surface was done, both by using 24" flat sweeps on planter foot pieces, and with spring-tooth attachments for tool-bar planters, carrying 12" high speed sweeps. Planting will be done later, by pushing the trash toward the middle

sweeps, and planting in a shallow clean row.

J. M. Cooper, County Agricultural Agent, Perry Spenny, and James Starr of the Veteran's Vocational School, Clint McCain of the Production Credit Association, Cecil Shults, local implement dealer, and R. C. Moore, Jr., of the Soil Conservation Service assisted in the meeting, in addition to the Dan Horn and visiting group farmers.
