ABILENE, April 23, - High School students may be able to complete soon in a contest to determine the boy and girl safe driving champions of Texas.

Such a contest will be proposed to officials of the Interscholastic League at a statewide Austin, it was announced here Chursday by Nat Williams. Mr. Williams is director for

school safety for this region of the Texas Safety Association which actively sponsors driver training in the schools throughout the state. The contest is being proposed jointly by the Safety Association, the State Department of Education and the Department of Public Safety.

The goal of the school safety program, Mr. Williams said, is for every high school graduate to get a crisp new driver's license along with his diploma. About half of the secondary schools are now teaching safety courses, but only a part of these give actual behind-the-wheel training.

The competition would follow the usual pattern, beginning with the local school and continuing through district , regional and state competition. Cars would be furnished to the schools by the Texas Automotive Dealers Association.
