She was also one of the top four mothers in Texas considered for the title of Honorary Texas Mother for 1949. Mrs. E. A. Gillis was selected for the nonor and was later selected as Honorary American Mother. She is in New York where she will appear in special ser

The Mother's Day activities here will be confined to private gatherings and special programs in the local churches.

The First Methodist Church will have a special program with appropriate musical numbers honoring all mothers. The Baptist Churches will take a special offering on Mother's Day to be used in the hospital work
